

These events were very successful.



The peer support programme works well in assisting the transition to College relatively smoothly and our year 9 students enjoy it too.

I had the pleasure of attending the Kiwi Forever Programme and I joined the team as they ran science experiments on the 'other side' of one of the aqueducts to measure water quality, plant life and ph in the river flow beyond. The streams and rivers often disappear down aqueducts for the purposes of electricity. It was pleasing to see a stream recovering after being a dry bed for many years. I also enjoyed attending the first day of the Waka Ama competition at Lake Tikitapu (The Blue

Lakes) in Rototua. It was exciting to be part of the Waka Ama powhiri for all the schools



The arts were well patronised with the drama production of 'A Tomb with a View', which was outstanding, the visit from the New Zealand Navy Band who played theme tunes from popular movies, our International Day with excellent food from around the world created by students, and the visit from inspirational speaker John Coutis. He came on a skateboard as he has no legs, speaking about his challenges and how he overcame them. We continue to have students in bands and playing instruments.

The sport in our school was very busy as usual this year. I was part of the snow academy and took a group of ski racers that trained at Whakapapa. We have some great skiers coming up in racing, slopestyle and freestyle with some of our competitors in the international arena. Our female snowboarders came 2nd in the Secondary Schools Snowboarding Competition. I have seen the passion and the commitment as to what makes a top competitor. Tui Wikohika's speech at the sports breakfast, talking about his very own challenges, was outstanding.

This year we have revamped C Block from Mr Prasad's room up to the art room. It is nearly completed as I write this. We look forward to being in the freshly renovated part of the school next year.

I would like to wish our year 13s every success as they head out into the wide world. The school magazine provides years of enjoyment in the year it is issued and many future years. Ruapehu College begins a round of renovations which will affect 6 C Block classrooms including Mrs Stuckey's Art room, all the way down the corridors past the digital technology, Te Reo and Social Studies rooms to Mr Prasad's Maths room. These rooms will have a major revamp. This has meant a clean out of resources and some upheaval such as moving desks and cupboards. There are also 4 resource rooms in that area as well.




the island itself. Students got to jump from the rocks into the sea below. After this, they kayaked back to camp. Again the weather was perfect.

### TRAVEL AND TOURISM

Tourism is a growing industry in New Zealand, generating \$39.1bn and employing over 216,000 people. We have in our region world class attractions such as Koro Ruapehu, our awa tupua and our national parks to name a few. Something to feel quite proud of. The number of students taking Tourism is steady with a very high rate gaining all credits on offer. The majority of the program is self directed as student assessments are open book enabling personalised research to be conducted at each student's individual pace. There are opportunities for students to visit industry providers with the STAR Tasters program via the NZ School of Tourism, studying industry areas such as hotel management, flight attending, travel and tourism, and Walt Disney World (sorry but this isn't a trip to Disneyland). There is also a Maori Tourism program that delivers Maori focused tourism skills where students gain industry

standards at level 3 over a week long wananga. Students get to select their sites for the wananga either at Waiheke Island, Kapiti Island or Waitomo. Exciting stuff! One of the highlights for the 2020 Tourism class is that they will be planning a trip next year, and putting into effect industry skills to make this happen, so watch this space.

#### SECONDARY TERTIARY ALIGNMENT

RESOURCE (STAR)

This year the College once again utilized the STAR funding to facilitate short courses that helped to enhance students' skills and knowledge in a variety of work areas provided by industry experts. The funds were also used to provide useful resources to enhance classroom learning within the areas of Hospitality, Life Skills, Career Preparation (includes work on understanding job applications, careers and building their own portfolio to present to potential employers). We were able to run our popular courses in Barista Training, Food Safety in the Workplace, First Aid in an Outdoor Environment, Outdoor Education (Kayaking) and Workplace Health & Safety.

New this year the school introduced a course over four weeks to prepare students to take their Driver Learners Licence Test. We are delighted that of the three courses run in school across Terms 1, 2 and 3 we achieved a 100% success rate and all thanks to the tutor Rauna Te Huia and, of course, the students being committed and motivated, well done them.

Another new addition this year was the Toastmaster Senior Students programme run at National Park. The aim of this programme is to enable young people under the age of 18 to develop their communication and leadership skills through practical experience. Invaluable in helping to develop our Future Leaders.

Where possible we try to maximise all STAR activities and short courses to provide students with the opportunity to gain industry Unit Standard Credits which are recognised by employers and NZQA (and count towards NCEA Qualifications as well as Vocational Pathways).


#### ART










## AGRICULTURE HORTICULTURE













This year we had a combined year 11, 12, and 13 class. We started off with practical investigations finding the optimal way to grow our crops. Next we took a new pathway researching the myth of recycling in NZ and how to stop our farmlands turning into landfills. We came up with the transformative action of collecting plastic bottles destined for landfill and turning them into a recycled greenhouse to grow organic plants. We didn't quite finish so the challenge is for next year's class to complete the job.

Andy took a group of the boys and constructed a riparian fence on the school paddock to protect our stream from cow effluent. Finally we did a lot of gardening projects including some over-the-top mulching. We have a great bunch of potential ag-scientists, market gardeners, farmers, landscapers, fencers, and professional mulchers ready to ascend on the community. Ki Te Ao (feed the world)

#### SCIENCE

Miss Wilson has continued to implement her changes into the Junior Science Programme, we are seeing our students starting to think for themselves. They are turning into real Scientists.

Some senior students also took part in the 2018 Kiwi 4 Ever programme in term one. They did well and thoroughly enjoyed their experience. It is a wonderful programme sponsored by Untouched World, which helps our students to see their place in the natural world as conservationists.

Year 12 Science continued this year leading on from Practical Science in year 11. This is for students with an interest in Science in general but not wanting specialist Sciences. The year 12 Chemistry students travelled to Massey University in term 3 and enjoyed doing practical with the bigger toys they have in their Chemistry Labs.

The Junior classes have followed a programme this year with lots of practical work and learning how to infer from their observations. One year 10 class looked at designing their own investigations in Metal Chemistry as part of a level 1 NCEA internal assessment trial in term 4.

Some of Year 10 was able to travel to Palmerston North at the start of term 4 to a Year 10 Day at Massey University. They enjoyed four sessions in the university labs, seeing and experiencing many new things. Making a solar cell using blueberries in Chemistry, playing with liquid nitrogen in Physics, playing a probability game in Statistics and the cool fruit flies in Biology.

Rachel Wills, our great Lab Tech continues to manage us and our resources. We continue to value her contribution and thank her for her diligence. Without her help the staff would not be able to do so much practical work with their classes.

Science is very relevant to all aspects of our lives and will be increasing in importance in our futures. Work hard and enjoy as you study and understand your life and the connections and influences involved in living.

This will be the last report from Mrs Buck as she stands down from the Head of Department role and takes a smaller part in College life. Many hundreds of students have moved through her classes, many of them learning much about the joys and intrigues of Science. All the best to Miss Wilson as she takes over as Head of Science.

#### KIWI FOREVER

This fantastic opportunity was held in the middle of March. We were fortunate this year to have 7 year 12 students participate. They were Samuel Lyon, Te Taumata Neilio, Levana Paul, Legacy Hiroti, Takarangi Metekingi, Pau Stevens and Shaquana Taylor. The 6 day programme aims to enhance students' understanding about the challenges of conservation and also understanding Ngati Rangi views on conservation and values. Students can take this learning and share with others and also help contribute to conservation and environmental sustainability.

Students arrive on Sunday, where they are welcomed in a powhiri to Tirorangi Marae in Karioi. After a celebration lunch and icebreaker games, we then go on a Hikoi to the Karioi Lakes. This year was still very summery, and many students appreciated the cooling waters of the lake. Monday involved going to the alpine zone of Mt Ruapehu behind the Karioi Pulp Mill. Here we were able to appreciate the journey of the waters of the Whahianoa River and her ability to change her flow depending on the rainfall. Students also came to understand the vulnerability of water management through the Genesis Hydroelectric power scheme. Students then went and did some solid mahi by building traps with the Department of Conservation.

Tuesday and Wednesday involved working with DOC to check trap lines and also to set tracking tunnels to find out if there were any predators (stoats and rats) in the alpine zone of Mt Ruapehu. This was a unique experience to go off trail and find some amazing hidden waterfalls.

Thursday is the ultimate experience with two unique species of bird, whio and kiwi. Half our students were at the release of whio on the Mangawhero River. This was a pretty cool experience as many hours of trapping enabled this to occur. The other students went to the Tongariro forest where they were involved in a Kiwi release. Two kiwi from Christchurch were released to the wild population of Kiwi, hoping to add more variation to the gene pool and further increase the population numbers. Another highlight this year was planting plants at the Ohakune Lakes reserve. It will be great for the students to go back there and see how they have grown and contributed to the restoration of the reserve.

As always we are appreciative of Ngati Rangi, Department of Conservation and Genesis for allowing the programme to continue. Students are encouraged to share their learning with others and be part of actions that will contribute to a sustainable future for New Zealand and especially our Native Birds. We are also lucky enough to be hosted by the Woods family and appreciate the way they look after us so well. Great job to our students this year, they pushed themselves out of their comfort zone, made new friends and faced many fears! Thanks to Liz Brooker from Toi communications for some of the photos.

#### DESIGN AND INNOVATION

Design and Innovation - Resistant Materials and Design and Visual Communication.

The emphasis of the subject is very much on developing the critical thinking and creativity of the students using resistant materials. This year there was more work done in the engineering/metal area with the introduction of standards in engineering at level 2 and more Year 11 students using metal in their design and make projects.

Senior students were involved in the making of a model makers vice and adjustable spanner. Year 11 worked on individual projects having studied a particular design style and applying that to projects involving furniture and lighting. Styles included Post Modernism and Art Nouveau. The Junior school has been involved in a number of smaller projects to develop their skills and knowledge in the subject, including, lighting, phone holders, clocks and chocolate moulds using vacuum forming. A large group of 24 Year 10 were entered into NCEA for one standard, making the Bluetooth Speaker lamp. This is going very well and ensures that the students begin next year with 6 NCEA credits.


















# DESIGN AND INNOVATION TEXTILES TECHNOLOGY



#### **ENGLISH**

English is about reading and writing. It is what we do.

At college level, reading and writing are hand in hand, Hansel and Gretel, bow and arrow. We want our students to show us that they understand something they have read. We want them to show us that in writing, because being able to write is important.

We will teach them the best ways to put words together. We will introduce them to new words, point out word associations and help to build their vocabularies. They will be introduced to classic novels, magazine opinion pieces, poetry, oratory and mythology. They will study the New Zealand greats; Katherine Mansfield, James K Baxter, Hone Tuwhare, Patricia Grace, Witi Ihimaera.

The thing is, it all works best when students are properly prepared for the requirements of college as we work through the levels. We are meeting too many reluctant readers and resistant writers. It is important that parents intending to send their children to Ruapehu College recognise that reading and writing are a couple of pretty big features of our English course. We are one-armed paper hangers when we do not have the support we need from home.

Our English course is designed as a four to five-year exploration of English. We touch upon Shakespeare, we do New Zealand, we study modernism and track it through to post-modernism.

Currently our Year 9 classes cover themes of place; where we are, and the individual; who we are. They read short stories and poetry by New Zealanders. They watch New Zealand films and they learn how to write about their understanding of what they have read.

The Year 10s go a little wider. They look at themes of belonging, or not. Stereotyping and prejudice. "The Outsiders" and "Of Mice and Men" have been the novels for this year. Plenty of interesting short stories on the same ideas have led to more writing. At Level 1 students look at our place in the world. They read about war and conflict. They also step

up in their analysis of writing. They learn about the tools of writing and how they are used. Most Year 11 students will face their first English external examination (which is pretty easy really and should be approached as a challenge to do well in).

In Level 2 we look at society. What holds it up? What if it fell down? We read the warnings of dystopian literature and we witness a group of boys going feral on a desert island. Through it all, students build a portfolio of crafted writing.

Level 3 will prepare students for tertiary study. That means reading. We connect with Katherine Mansfield and we get mad with a mental asylum. We compare Hone Tuwhare's words to Ralph Hotere's pictures. We learn the techniques of critical analysis. We establish your ability to express yourself and your understanding of others at a high functioning level.

So, yes, we do reading and writing. They go together all the way. Being able to express yourself is the best thing you can ever take from college.

#### Debating

The Debate Club reconvened this year with a few old hands and a group of new debate enthusiasts. Captain Kayla Jordan organised her troops and some very smart arguments were prepared, both for and against the changes we have recently experienced in the operation of RAL. Unfortunately, the debate for the Ruapehu Cup could not go ahead due to illness at the Taumuranui end. The silver lining is that the Ruapehu Cup stays in our cupboard for another year.


#### PERFORMING ARTS

The opportunity to see, hear and experience professional Performing artists in full flight is rare for our students, so we are very grateful to those that make the journey to share their skills with us.







Our annual performance excursion took us to Auckland this year to see "The School Of Rock: The Musical". Based on the popular film staring Jack Black, the Australian cast was very impressive. It was a long day for our 20-odd students, mostly Year 10 with a few lucky Seniors and Year 9's. The sold-out Ruapehu College Production of Norman Robbins' A Tomb With A View ran for five performances between the 11th and 15th of June, including a preview performance and a closing-night show on the Saturday. It was a massive undertaking by the Director and his young thespians with 80 pages of witty dialogue and an intimate theatre setting. This required the students to work very hard as performers and actors, being careful not to have a single eyebrow raised out of place. The focus and composure demonstrated by the students was exemplary, thus the show was a resounding success. Timing was everything with this one. Dark comedy-thrillers require careful attention to detail, as you can never tell how the audience will respond to certain plot points, innuendo or characters.

The play itself is about an eccentric family, all of whom have gathered at the family manor (Monument House) for the reading of their late father's will. As is predictable of such a title, the basic plot is a familiar one. Keeping the audience guessing were multiple twists and turns to be had as the story was told.

The unpleasant and arrogant eldest sibling Lucien Tomb (Dalton Jordan), who was greatly concerned that someone might discover his laboratory and God-knows-what kind of experiments, is very keen to see his rightful share of the family fortune as the eldest of old Septimus' children. Dora Tomb (Brianna McKenna/Keri Baker) is the whispy, flighty, wine-making spinster who suffers from paranoia – with good reason, as it turns out. Emily Tomb (Silas McNaught) is a sharp-tongued, mannish-woman sort of creature; there to make darned sure she gets what is coming to her. Marcus Tomb (Cameron Smith), the youngest of the siblings, is ever so slightly disturbed believing full well he is Julius Caesar, speaking only from the works of Shakespeare. Monica Tomb (Nazomi Groot/Justice-Rose Dennison) uses her feminine allure to achieve her means and will let nothing stand in her way.

Of course, every aristocratic family must have at least a couple of faithful family retainers, and the Tombs are no exception. Family solicitor Hamilton Penworthy

(Mackenzie Charlton, Emma Burnard as Harriett Penworthy) is desperately uncomfortable about the reading of the will. Penworthy knows that some particular provisions therein will make some of the beneficiaries spectacularly unhappy.

The ancient housekeeper Agatha Hammond (Kayla Jordan) has been with the family forever. She knows where all the bodies are buried, you might say, and all of the family secrets except for the provisions of said will. The unassuming Nurse Franklin (Kate Rowe/Korbyn Garland) takes care of Marcus and has no problem voicing her opinion to anyone who will listen.

In the midst of this arrives famous author Freda Mountjoy (Jenna Jones/ Grace Burnard) with her timid, but handsome secretary Peregrine Potter (Ryan Burton) in tow. The late Mr. Tomb left her a bequest of some kind, and the entire family is literally dying to find out what it is. Suffice it to say that Ms. Mountjoy and Mr. Potter have an agenda, and secrets, of their own.

The ability and skill level of the Drama students continues to grow at Ruapehu College. Grace Burnard (Year 9), Cameron Smith and Kayla Jordan (Year 10) each performed with confidence and enthusiasm. Silas McNaught, also in Year 10, performed consistently well giving memorable performances as the bolshy and brash Emily Tomb. A number of Year 11 students (Jenna Jones, Emma Burnard, Dalton Jordan, Keri Baker and Brianna McKenna demonstrated their







growing dramatic ability gaining 'Merit' and 'Excellence' in the new NCEA Level 1 Drama course. Dalton developed his character particularly well as Lucien Tomb. This was the role the Mr. Sims had played at the same age in 1997, so he had a tough task from the outset in trying to impress the Director. Year 13 Justice-Rose Dennison gave demure and sultry showings as Monica Tomb and Nazomi Groot also gave fine performances in her turn as the man-hungry vixen. Ryan Burton was very convincing as the hapless and timid Peregrine Potter, showing fantastic maturity and energy in playing the lead male role. Mackenzie Charlton and Kate Rowe delivered some outstanding character acting. Mackenzie was every bit the slimy, sneaky lawyer as Hamilton Penworthy, his character played with conviction whilst maintaining great comic timing

until his eventual demise. In the role of Nurse Anne Franklin, Kate Rowe was just another potential victim until her character turn revealed her true colours. Kate and Korbyn

Garland (Year 11) both worked very hard on not giving the game away as the eventual villain. This was of upmost importance as it was crucial that the audience remained unaware of their potential evil during the unfolding of the plot. Concealed until the final scene, both girls did exceptionally well to manage the workload. Kate's experience on stage allowed her to deliver particularly

gripping performances each run. Backing up our stellar cast this year was Shizuki Okumura (Year 12) who ran the sound effects and lighting for the show adding the finishing touches to what was a very slick

production in general.

Having dual casting of some roles in the production meant rehearsing everything with multiple combinations of players. For the Director and the cast, this was very challenging. It did however, give the students some freedom with their other commitments, being able to have another actor fill in. Of most benefit was having actors work together towards common direction, but bringing their own unique interpretation of each shared-role. Because of this, each combination of performers made for different highlights within each performance.



It was an enormous amount of work for all involved, but totally worth it. As usual, it would not have been possible without those behind the scenes, including Marama Groot (Year 9) and Rose Collett (Year 12). I would like to personally and publically thank Mr Aiko Groot (Set Construction), Barbara van der Woerd (Videography and Photography), Miss Nicole Jaquiery (Wardrobe) and Mrs Leah Sims (Miss Rogers at the time - assistant to the Director). 








## WELLBEING WORKSHOP

A small group of ski races headed to Whakapapa for ski training. The rationale for this was RAL had said training was to occur at Whakapapa and NISSSC slalom racing competition would be held on that field. The weather for most of the six lessons was not great with only a couple of opportunities to utilize the whole mountain. Our encouraging instructor, Lyall Crump, made the most of the situation always remaining positive and creative, thinking of appropriate skiing skills to challenge the students. They worked hard and were very competitive even when confined to Happy Valley. Most of the students were also part of the Ruapehu Snow Sports team so had extra training in the weekend. They also attended competitions on Ruapehu and in the South Island.

Our new group that was part of the academy was the freestyle/ freeski skiers. They were coached by Joe, an exceptionally great coach who balanced his time between the different levels of ability. He was great at supporting and encouraging students to get out of their comfort zone and try new things. Though the weather didn't play the game as well as we would of liked, that didn't dampen their spirits, we still had a great time." Said Miss Rogers.

The Snowboarders were coached by the very talented Tommy from Austria. Unfortunately we only had him for 5 of our lessons, but he encouraged and pushed the students on the freestyle features that were available. Our students also introduced Tommy to the thrill of sledding, not something he has done before. It must be a Kiwi thing. Students worked on boxes and street style rails. Tommy had the students jumping and starting to do some spins. The weather only allowed us one day when we went up the High noon express, so he taught them many skills that have improved their riding as well as being fun days.

Ruapehu Alpine Lifts gave all Ruapehu College students the opportunity to have a season pass for \$100 and quite a few took up this offer. RAL also offered us high level coaches and transport at discounted rates. We were also able to sell chairlifts, the funds from these have gone towards all students in the Academy as part of their training. We hope that they continue their support and look forward to the 2020 season! Thanks to the students for still smiling, being on time, upholding the values of ROCK and representing our school. We must be due for lots of snow, plenty of bluebird days and getting more air time off the jumps!
