

Mr Mather has been employed in the Phys Ed and Science Depts and is a keen rugby player. After a year here, we know he is well settled into teaching.


Miss Rie Ishiura returned to Japan at the end of term one after being with us for six months, and her place was filled by Miss Mai Sakamoto near the end of







Virginia Morris' entry in the 'Light up your Life' section, Solar Flair, sparkled with stars on the dress and the train from the shoulders, depicting the milky way under the light.

The 'Welcome to the 21st Century' section had two entries. Computer Whizz, constructed by Abby Bennelick, Alex Davey, and Vicki Cranston, was an ensemble of skirt made from floppy disks and a bodice covered in 'threads of ribbons' from cassettes. With a hat also made from disks, this wearable art entry took the judges eye and was named as a finalist. Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow, by Angie Stewart-Mott and Rebecca Lind was a white, black and silver creation of handker-chief skirt, a cropped bodice and cape lined with wire netting, which posed a challenge to move in as well as transport to the show.

Shantal Hemara, in the 'Simply Salvage' section named her outfit Ruapehu's Millennium Meltdown, and used shopping bags to make pants, which was worn with an overskirt of lolly papers stitched together, and a bubble plastic vest

The only entry from our school in the Young Designer Award was Shantal Hemara's jacket made with a variety of techniques: patchwork, appliqué, fabric manipulation, embellishment, quilting and stained glass window. This creative entry gained the third place prize in the show. It's fun to be doing something different to the usual daily, timetabled classes. Make the most of next year's opportunities.



School Certificate Design Technology Textiles and Sixth Form Certificate class

Our class is strongly practical with lots of hands-on work. Internal assessment is made up of 55% practical projects, 25% related studies and 20% concepts and drawings. It is a subject which includes many disciplines so is a subject where there is an all round learning.

This year we used natural objects to draw up designs and develop into a practical garment for the upper body. The investigations included dyeing, fabric manipulation, layering and embellishment. The related studies project associated to this practical covered safety in the workplace and the techno-

logical development of the sewing machine on society.

The second practical garment was either to be recycled from pre-loved clothing or an exhibit for the wearable art show. An in-depth fibre study was the related project. As the time looms for all the work to be submitted for assessment, projects being finished off are the wall hanging and the related studies project on the history and use of dyes in the textile field. Long hours after school and a stayover may be needed to complete all work to the students' satisfaction.

This is a good subject to take, as from the first hour you start in class you are building up marks for your end of year final mark, and there is NO EXAM.

It was preparation time for recycled garments and/or wearable art. I got the ten or so bags of used clothing and fabric pieces that had been sent in by various kind people and put them in the middle of my room.

With the students gathered round I showed them what I had been doing to two quite plain dresses to give them more class. I talked to them about thinking recycle, transformation and opening their minds to ANY possibility. I told them they were allowed to look through the things and reserve what they wanted to have but they had to prove to me that they were able to show what they were going to make before they actually cut into anything. In the bags were jeans, skirts, a full length cape with hood and lining, clothing that had been cut out but not finished, pieces of fabric, offcuts of all sorts especially crimplene from the 70s, dresses of the most interesting colour combinations, dresses with frilly collars, pleats and folds, and pieces of jersey. There was something for every colour preference if not style. Letting the class go and look was not the passive thoughtful act that it usually is after a presentation before asking the students to go and carry on with their work. This time it was action, almost reminiscent of a closing down sale I went to in the early sixties, at Burkes Drapery on Thames Street, Ohakune Junction, and as a teenager I had waited in line for some time hoping for some fabric and clothing bargains, and in which only minutes after entering the shop and lifting up a likely purchase I had it whipped out of my hands by an excited and frenzied 'lady', imagining, I guess, that as my once senior neighbour, she had more right to the item than I did.



The girls pored over the fabric and clothes, they tried items on then went and looked in the mirror, draped garments on themselves, modelled around the room, often losing themselves in the playfulness of "dressing up". There was excited talk about colours and the fashion. The 70s things were "in". They had fits of thoughtfulness, like saving two purple pieces for Mindy because they knew she liked the colour, and seeing some fabrics that "Sarah would just love".

They were planning what they could make with this stuff that had been sitting languishing in someone's cupboard for so long, their owners having given up on starting or finishing



the garments or having tired of wearing them. These student were able to see a fresh beauty in some of the pieces, with comments like, "this is like a flower garden", "this is so modern", "look at me Miss, don't I look cool?". The full length cape was part of a plan to be restored to its former elegance and was going to be worn to the ball, perhaps with the addition of feather or trims. They asked questions about clothing that could not have been taught without the examples. It was a busy, busy hour, and SO MUCH FUN! We had visitors who saw the action and had to come and share some of the excitement. For one who loves fabric, it was a joy to see others so young with a fresh and uninhibited appraisal of a collection of someone else's cast offs. Let's hope that the assignment continues to bring pleasure to these participants.

We in the textiles area are very grateful to the people who sent so much. I hope you will know how much it is appreciated.


Economics


Correspondence
