# LEARNING SUPPORT

Throughout 2024, Ruapehu College has implemented and continued a range of tailored learning support options to meet the diverse needs of our students.

To enhance one-on-one assistance, teacher aides have been integrated into core classes. This strategy not only provides students with more direct support, but also enables teachers to offer more individualized instruction, with the added benefit of an extra set of hands to manage alternative learning activities.

The Year 9 and Year 10 cohort have a targeted literacy and numeracy program, designed for students based on their specific needs. Students in this program engage in personalized learning plans that focus on addressing key areas for improvement. To facilitate accelerated learning and ensure close monitoring of progress, class sizes are kept small, allowing for more focused and effective instruction.

Our teacher aides play a vital role in this process, bringing adaptability and a strong commitment to supporting both students and teachers throughout the year.

This year, we proudly established the Piwakawaka Unit for our ORS-funded students. We are thrilled





to announce that a brand new classroom will be arriving at the end of November to further enhance the learning environment for these students. Throughout the year, our ORS students have embarked on a variety of exciting adventures, including visits to the Army Museum, the climbing wall, Carrot Park, farm visits, and more activities still to come. With the Piwakawaka Unit now in place, we are excited to offer tailored learning opportunities that cater specifically to the needs of our ORS students.

This year saw significant changes within the Social Sciences Department. Mrs. Leigh-ana Beard joined the College in 2024 for her first year of teaching. She taught Junior Physical Education & Health as well as Social Studies and had proven to be an invaluable asset to both the College and the department. Mr. KJ Allen continued teaching Year 9 Social Studies while also sharing his expertise in other areas of the school. Mr. Conor Whitehead also joined the College at the start of 2024 as Head of the Social Sciences Department. Prior to this, he spent three years teaching at Taumarunui High School and completed his teaching placement at Ruapehu College in 2020. He teaches Year 9 and Year 10 Social Studies, as well as Level 1 and Level 2 Geography.

Students studying Social Studies are encouraged to explore the why, where, and how, questioning what they don't understand. The subject is full of theories and hypotheses that invite further exploration. In Years 9 & 10, Social Studies continues to reinforce the strong values of the College, emphasising that poor behaviour has consequences and helping Junior Students understand what is expected of them.

In Year 9 Social Studies, students covered a range of topics, including financial literacy and economic activity, human rights, and disasters or challenges. At the end of Term 2, students had the opportunity to go on a field trip to the National Army Museum and The Majestic Theatre in Taihape for a screening of the movie Cabrini. This field trip tied into the learning on human rights, which was explored through major historical events and their impact on human rights.

In Year 10 Social Studies, students started the year by exploring different systems of government, including how our own system functions. They also studied Aotearoa/New Zealand history, focusing on pre-European life and key events leading to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. For their assessment task, students created impressive visual displays on significant figures from our country's early history. In Term 3, they shifted focus to Antarctica, studying its "Frozen Paradise" while developing important skills in mapping and graphing.

This year, Level 1 Geography students completed three assessment tasks from the new NCEA Level 1 Geography standards. In Term 2, the Geography department collaborated with the Science department to support students with an assessment task requiring them to explore an environment using data. This work aligned perfectly with the Year 11 Science stream's health perspectives field trip, which was supported by Liz Brooker from Project Tongariro, Horizons Regional Council, and the Ngāti Rangi Tajao team. Scientists from these organisations helped students learn about the health of the Mangawhero River. Students collected a variety of data on the river and used it in their assessment task to draw conclusions about its overall health. Through this hands-on research,








General Science classes and Biology and, after two terms of relievers, Mr Mahlatini finally joined us from South Africa to teach Agriculture and Horticulture and some General Science. We were also blessed to have had Miss Mallory Brown join us in term 3 for her teacher training placement.



### Highlights

Some of the highlights this year included Liz Brooker from Project Tongariro being involved in many of our teaching and learning activities. She came into school and went through plant identification and trapping with our year 9 classes. Liz made a big impact with the year 11 Stream Health perspectives unit. She engaged

students and helped them build their knowledge in and around the taiao and worked well with the Horizons Regional Council and the Ngati Rangi Taiao team. Scientists from both organisations assisted students in their learning about the health of the Mangawhero River. We were also excited that a pair of Whio (blue duck) were at both sites

that we visited.



Liz Brooker has also started Predator Free Ruapehu College. Year 11 student, Connor Anderson, is our Lead Project manager and is working with Liz, and peer Emerson Lark, to maintain, check the traps and add data to Trap NZ. Next year we will look at expanding the trap line and try different traps to reduce predators around the school. We can then look at re-establishing plants and vegetation that will

attract native birds to our school.

Another highlight was the visit from Otago Museum, who brought their Solar Tsunami showcase to Raetihi, with support from exstudent Antonia Hoeta. This was a fantastic hands-on exhibition explaining our electricity system and how sun plasma or solar flares can impact it. It's always great to catch up with exstudents and see their accomplishments.

Junior Students undertook their Science Badge learning inquiry projects in both Term 2 and Term 4. Topics studied included astronomy, sport science, water science. agriculture, marine biology, zoology, food technology, entomology, and the list goes on. Students could choose their own topic and then do activities that work towards gaining 20 stars. Students received badges from completed projects.









### SCIENCE

Significant Funding

This year, the Science Department successfully secured two grants to enhance student learning. The first grant, from Genesis Energy, provided funding to purchase a class set of iPads with waterproof cases, ideal for field trips and activities that involve specialized observations. The grant also allowed the purchase of trail cameras for freshwater monitoring, benefiting senior Biology students. We look forward to 2025, when students will be able to use them and the department expresses gratitude to Genesis Energy for helping make learning more relevant for students.





The second application was for the Freshwater Community Grant from Horizons Regional Council, securing \$2500 to update our freshwater sampling equipment, waders, clarity tubes, eDNA testing kits, and other measurement tools. These resources will be used by all year groups, helping students engage in hands-on science activities and fostering awareness of freshwater as an important resource. Having this equipment upgraded will allow for more active participation in field science and again, we are truly appreciative of the funding.

# KIWI FOREVER

The Kiwi Forever programme took place from March 19th to March 24th, 2024, with mostly good weather except for one day of heavy rain. Sponsored by Genesis Energy, Project Tongariro, Ngati Rangi, Predator Free 2050 expert Cam Speedy, and the Department of Conservation, the programme was hosted by Ngati Rangi at Tirorangi Marae near Ohakune. Seventeen students from Central North Island schools participated, including our very own students Hayley Moore, Lucia Seymour, Connor Anderson, and Hunter Anderson.

The program provided an immersive field experience empowering students to explore specific issues related to sustainability, particularly the recovery of Kiwi and Whio populations from a Ngāti Rangi perspective. Activities included setting and inspecting traps, learning about conservation challenges, and exploring hydroelectric power's impact on waterways with support from Genesis. Students also studied the local Mangawhero River's ecosystem, observing Whio, an endangered species. The Department of Conservation demonstrated tools for monitoring Whio populations, enhancing students' understanding of conservation efforts.

A highlight of the program was participating in a Kiwi release at Tongariro Forest Park. Kiwi rangers from Save the Kiwi and Maungatautari Mountain Reserve shared insights into the translocation of kiwi to the area and how their population has changed over time. Overall, the week-long experience offered a chance to explore a variety of concepts including conservation, social, environmental, economic, educational, and te ao Māori perspectives. Students were then tasked with presenting their learning to representatives from supporting organizations, enhancing their science education and leadership skills.

# DESIGN AND INNOVATION RESISTANT MATERIALS

For many students, stepping into the Design Technology – Resistant Materials room is a brandnew experience, while for others, it feels like a second home. This course is designed to build confidence, particularly in creative and critical thinking, while also laying the foundation for lifelong learning by integrating skills from all areas of the curriculum.

There's something truly special about Resistant Materials that sets it apart from other subjects. The tactile experience of working with wood—its smell and texture, using real tools, and the natural material itself—creates a unique environment. The sounds of hammering, sawing, and shaping materials with hands and minds working in tandem to solve problems and express creativity all captivate students. The combination of physical strength, coordination, and imaginative design engages students in a way few other subjects do.

But what about safety? Woodwork is actually a











low-risk activity when basic safety measures are followed and the appropriate tools are used. Student behavior at the workbench is exemplary, as they are fully engaged in tasks they enjoy. It's also important that students have the opportunity to experience controlled risk and challenge, as this helps them learn to make responsible decisions and judgments to protect themselves.

2024 has been an exciting year, with a wide range of projects across all year levels. Our Year 9 students kicked off the year by learning the design process and successfully completing their chopping boards. Year 10 students built on their skills by mastering new woodworking techniques, resulting in impressive final products like a Bluetooth Lamp Speaker. Year 11 students continued to refine their expertise, crafting coffee tables and working on personalized projects. For our Year 12 students, the focus shifted to mastering complex woodworking techniques, with standout projects like Cape Cod Chairs, planter boxes, and a range of creative pieces, from TV cabinets to coffee tables. Despite facing some challenges along the way, the final results were a true testament to the students' creativity, perseverance, and pride in their work.

### PUHORO

Puhoro is a STEMM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, Mātauranga) program that is run nationwide. It is a kaupapa Māori approach and seeks to improve equitable access for Māori students in education and aims to increase Māori into STEM careers. Pūhoro recognises the unique position we have in Aotearoa where we have access to two knowledge systems: Mātauranga Māori and Western Science. At Pūhoro we celebrate mātauranga Māori as a rich Māori knowledge ecosystem underpinned by kaupapa and tikanga Māori.

The Pūhoro STEMM Academy has been running at Ruapehu College for 3 years. The Pūhoro program is sponsored by Genesis Energy and our Kaihautū is Chaana Morgan. This has proven to be really good for our students as she already has established positive relationships with many of our students. She is able to work alongside the students to develop their attitudes to learning in Science and Mathematics. This year the Pūhoro program was run during Friday Science classes for the year 11's and during study sessions on Friday afternoon for the year 12's.

Year 11 students are part of the wider Ruapehu-Whanganui cluster of schools within the region that started this year. They join other Y11 students from 4 secondary schools and 2 kura māori and attend termly wānanga at the Racecourse in Whanganui. The wānanga are critical to ensuring that rangatahi get exposure to an array of STEM-based sessions and exposure to leaders within their respective fields, and get to be with like-minded rangatahi from other kura. With this in mind, rangatahi are enticed into STEMM, increasing their abilities to continue with STEMM subjects for their remaining years ahead.

The year 12 Students are part of the Manawatū Region and attended their wānanga at the Awapuni Racecourse. Year 12 also went on a trip to the



former Winstone Pulp International where they looked at jobs associated with engineering and a site visit through the plant.

As our program is sponsored by Genesis, students in Pūhoro are able to achieve the Nga ara Scholarships. In 2024 the recipients for these scholarships were Connor Anderson year 11, and Stirling Elers Year 12 who both received a technology or trades package. Year 13 student, Jamie Taitoko, received his graduation certificate from Pūhoro and will now have connections to help him in his university journey at Waikato. We are greatly appreciative of Pūhoro and Genesis to continue to provide opportunities for our students and encourage more students to continue their education in STEM subjects.

# GATEWAY STAR

The Gateway programme was a hive of activity this year, with students gaining experience and credits in farming, hairdressing, retail, early childhood education, hospitality, commercial kitchens and skiing to name a few areas.

Earlier this year, a group of students were sent off to the Maori Cultural Tourism camp, where they enjoyed themselves and learned a lot.

We were fortunate to offer the Level 1 Ski Instructor program with Pure Turoa, providing a valuable opportunity for our skiers to earn a globally recognized qualification. Students need substantial snow experience and maturity to manage customers of all ages and all walks of life, and successful candidates often receive job offers as ski instructors.

Gateway students in dairy and dry stock farm placements have all completed their theory credits, thanks to the strong support from local farmers. These farmers have played a key role in fostering successful relationships, which have been essential to the students' achievements.

This vocational education program helps students develop practical skills, knowledge and attributes for specific careers in their chosen industry, and we are very appreciative of being able to get the placements needed for these students.

In the STAR space the school was able to provide a variety of courses this year.

The Coffee Essentials course is great for students to be able to find part-time Barista employment whilst at school.

Year 12 and 13 PE students successfully completed an Outdoor Safety and First Aid qualification. This is a useful qualification when looking for jobs in the area.

This year, over 20 students obtained their learner's licenses through the school's program. Additionally, a Defensive Driving course was offered for the first time, subsidized by STAR funding to make it more affordable.

The course included four theory sessions onsite after school, along with a one-hour practical session. It was successful and will be offered again next year. The course helps reduce the time students must hold their restricted license before applying for a full license. It can be taken while holding a learner's or restricted license, provided students can drive for at least an hour.

This year we also had students attend UCOL as part of their USkills programme. Students travel to UCOL for a one or two day course every week for a period of the year. These students enjoyed their courses and have been successful in completing their qualifications at Level 2 and 3.

The school also welcomed back the Rural Health Network students, who encouraged our Year 9 students to pursue careers in health, highlighting the benefits of rural pathways. Research indicates that rural students are likely to return to their rural communities after completing their studies. This trend has become increasingly significant in recent years as it holds potential for addressing challenges faced by rural areas, such as ours. Here's hoping some of these students are inspired!

Again, the school held a Business Industry week for juniors, aimed at exposing them to potential career options. This initiative, along with others, is part of the school's effort to prepare students for the future, acknowledging that the next generation may change careers up to 5 times in their lifetime, and place increasing expectations for flexibility, sustainability, and innovative practices on the companies they intend to work for.

# PHYSICAL EDUCATION

This year in the Physical Education and Health Department, students focused on personal development, confidence-building, and social interaction through movement based contexts. In PE, Year 9 and 10 students started the year by getting to know each other and learning about self-management.

In Term 1, they worked on kotahitanga (unity) by planning and leading a 15-minute coaching session of a game they created for their peers. Term 2 focused on understanding the role of hauora (well-being) in their everyday lives, with students implementing a training program to learn about their bodies and how to care for themselves. In Term 3, students demonstrated whanaungatanga (relationships) by learning and playing traditional New Zealand sports like basketball, hockey, soccer, and rippa rugby. We finished the year by doing a combined unit of practical Ki-o-rahi and socio-critical thought, where students applied the rules from Hellison's Model of Social Responsibility, and were assessed on their ability to demonstrate teamwork and learn new skills, tactics and strategies in an unfamiliar sport.

In Health, Year 9 and 10 students studied topics like identity, wellbeing, interpersonal skills, and health promotion. They also covered subjects including assertiveness, puberty, contraceptive methods, and sex education.

The Year 13 students began the year by planning, and being assessed, on an outdoor adventure. Students worked together as a class to plan and implement a two day outdoor education journey. This involved completing risk management and putting in place strategies to minimise risk. The group hiked the Tree Trunk Gorge and rafted the Tongariro River, with an overnight stay at Urchin Campground.

In term two, they studied biomechanics and participated in a training program to improve fitness for their upcoming sports season. Students had to learn and apply knowledge of biophysical principles and were then assessed on their sport performance. In term three, students were assessed on their analysis of a physical badminton skill performed

by themselves or another, applying their knowledge of biomechanics.

The Year 12 students started the year by planning and completing an overnight tramp, hiking from Mountain Road to Blyth Hut and returning the following day via The Old Blyth track. In term two, they designed



and followed a 4-week training program aimed at improving their performance in a chosen sport. In term three, the students focussed on understanding

the biophysical principles involved in learning a new skill, specifically in badminton.

The Year 11 students have transitioned into NCEA, engaging in various activities and sports throughout the year.

In Term 1, they took part in adventure-based learning (ABL), where they were required to demonstrate kotahitanga (unity) to solve problems in team-building challenges.



They have also studied bones, muscles, and biomechanics, applying this knowledge to enhance their chosen skill and write about this in their external assessment. The year concluded with a practical Ki-o-rahi unit, where students showcased their ability to use different strategies during tournament games.




# DESIGN VISUAL COMMUNICATION



The National Secondary Schools Waka Ama competition took place in March 2024 at Lake Tikitapu in Rotorua. Once again, a new campaign showcased a group of paddlers who truly excelled, achieving outstanding results for young paddlers experiencing this for the first time.

Waka Ama transcends being just a sport; it is rich in history and traditions, serving as a means of identity, pride, and community. The connections and culture are intricately woven into the fabric of the sport, influencing both on-water and off-water experiences.

The journey to the Nationals is always grounded in commitment and effort. 


### WAIMARINO NETBALL
