

# We have a new pastor!

The Rev. Dr. Thomas Andrew Thoeni will become the fifth rector of St. Paul's this winter when he is installed by the Rt. Rev. Dabney Smith, our bishop. He joins us as rector-elect on Nov. 1, the day after the resignation of the Rev. Dr. D. William Faupel, priest-in-charge, takes effect.


For the last 16 years Fr. Tom (his last name is pronounced TAY-nee) has been the rector of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Plant City, a farming community between Tampa and Orlando. He is seen as a team builder, consensus seeker, good preacher and excellent choice to lead St. Paul's, the search committee and vestry agreed.

His doctorate is in congregational development, with an emphasis on creating in the laity a spirit of ministry and involvement.

In his tenure St. Peter's retired a sizable debt and remained debt-free while improving and growing the physical plant. He also successfully engineered the transitions between generations of lay leaders.

He recently spoke of his emotions in this period of transition. "Sorrow and joy are not opposites," he said, "but two sides of the same coin." While he will be sad to leave the many relationships built at St. Peter's, "I will be coming to St. Paul's in joy."

Fr. Tom and his wife, Quincey, have two sons in college, Harbor Cole and Mitchell. Quincey is a health-care educator (and sings in the choir!)

### Fr. Tom's life, so far...

The Rev. Dr. Tom Thoeni is a native Floridian and has proudly lived all but six years of his life in Florida. He grew up in Jacksonville the youngest of two children. He left Jacksonville to pursue his studies at the University of Florida, earning a Bachelor of Design from the College of Fine Arts. During his years at UF he was deeply involved at

the Chapel of the Incarnation, the Episcopal outreach to the University of Florida. Within that community he discerned his call to the priesthood and met and married his beloved wife, Quincey. Fr. Tom can still lead you to the exact spot where he was standing when he first saw his future wife.

He attended Seabury-Western Theological Seminary.

then located in Evanston, IL, just north of Chicago. While earning his Master of Divinity he also served as the seminary equivalent of class president, earning a reputation as a mediator and trusted bridge builder between people of disparate viewpoints.

GA, serving for three years. While in Albany, Fr. Tom and Quincey's first son, Harbor Cole, was born. With a new child just weeks old they moved to Pensacola to serve Christ Church for nearly six years. Their second son, Mitchell Bay Ruach was born in Pensacola. They added his second middle name, Ruach ("Breath of God"), after he was born 2 1/2 months early and miraculously survived and thrived.

Over fifteen years ago, Fr.
Tom was called to be rector of
St Peter's, Plant City, in the
Diocese of Southwest Florida.
Fr. Tom's tenure as rector of St
Peter's has brought a sense of
stability and health, with the
areas of buildings & grounds,
lay ministry, outreach and
administration being
strengthened.

In 2012, Fr. Thoeni earned his Doctor of Ministry in a joint program between Seabury-Western Theological Seminary and Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, CA. His doctoral thesis focused on the vow of the Baptismal Covenant as the basis of forming teams of mission and ministry. This has led to a proactive and empowered vestry working collegially and creatively.

Fr. Tom and Quincey are so excited about this new chapter in their lives. It is a pivotal moment for the Thoenis. Both of their sons are just beginning college. Harbor Cole is pursuing his studies in English

and Film Studies at Florida
State College at Jacksonville
and the University of North
Florida. He is in a great program at UNF for kids on the
autism spectrum to be able to
attend college. Mitchell is
studying Aerospace Engineering at the University of Florida.
Quincey is a health educator

and health coach, currently working for BayCare Health System. She provides screenings, wellness events, coaching, and classes for corporations, hospital employees, weight loss surgery patients, and the public throughout the Tampa Bay area. She hopes to find a similarly great job in Naples.


# A year of successes
