

Fifth Rector of St. Paul's Installed

The Rev. Dr. Thomas A. Thoeni was installed as the fifth Rector of St. Paul's on Jan. 6, 2019, a bright and beautiful day in Naples. The Right Rev. Dabney Smith, bishop of the Diocese of Southwest Florida, told our new pastor he could drop the "elect" from the title he had been using since joining our congregation on Nov. 1, 2018, in the 51st year of existence of St. Paul's in Naples.

Senior Warden Dick Breithaupt and Junior Warden Don Anderson told the bishop that Fr. Tom "is well qualified and has been prayerfully and lawfully selected" as rector. In turn, Bishop Smith first asked Fr. Tom to commit himself to this new trust and responsibility, and the congregation to uphold him in this ministry.

A litany then followed, using the liturgy, *Celebration of a New Ministry* from the Book of Common Prayer.

Fr. Peter Wong, a long-time friend of Fr. Tom, delivered the homily, just as Fr. Tom preached at his ordination six years ago. He invited us "to be discipled by Tom Thoeni because he is good at it."

"Liturgy, the Word and relationship are where you will find Christ. Don't be afraid to follow. Start with scripture when you seek guidance in life. When you make a mistake, don't repeat it." He said these aphorisms were instilled in him by Fr. Tom, his closest friend, besides his wife, who was in the congregation with their two young children.

Following the sermon members of the parish presented to their new rector signs and symbols of his office.

A reception, organized by Connie Cunningham and Katie Judnich, followed in Trinity Hall.

A new era has begun at St. Paul's! May God grant us all mercies and graces.



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There was a moment . . .

...at my installation that was quite profound for me. It was the moment when I was kneeling in front of the congregation and right before I prayed for God's direction and inspiration as I enter this new ministry among you. I paused because I felt the gravity of the situation. I was lost a bit in the moment; so much so that Canon Norman, serving as the master of ceremonies, had to quietly encourage me to start the prayer. It was not that I was absent-minded or daydreaming. It was just the opposite. It was that I was fully aware of the the moment

and the words I was about to pray. I prayed them earnestly and, just as earnestly, I hope I can faithfully



and actively participate God's grace in allowing God to fulfill the aspirations of that prayer.

Later I was blessed by the post-Communion prayer assigned for the liturgy. They included the words, "We pray that Tom may be to us an effective example of word and action, in love and patience, and in holiness of life. Grant that we, with him may serve you now, and always rejoice in your glory...." It meant a great deal to me that we were entering a new phase of ministry and life at St Paul's together in prayer and purpose.

I look forward to seeing and discovering the future God has in store for each of us and all of us.

stitution, with the admonition to obey them and be among us to share in councils of the diocese.; bread and wine, to be among us to break the Bread and bless the Cup; a portrait of a smiling Jesus, to be among us as a man of mirth and joy; and wine and cheese, as a token of hospitality, to share with us in the warmth of community.

A church shopper finds St. Paul's

Have you ever been a church-shopper? Maybe you moved to a new location, or felt that you needed to find a place where the worship reflected your understanding of your faith. If you have, you know what it's like to be welcomed and greeted—in some churches—or to be left adrift in others. You look around, listen to the music and the sermon, and maybe decide to keep looking. Choosing the right church is one of life's biggest commitments.

I've been a newcomer in more churches than most people. I grew up as an Army brat—moving every few years. In those days, military people were expected to be Jewish, Catholic, or "GP"—General Protestant. The pastor could be a Presbyterian or a Baptist, or whoever was stationed at that base. My father was a staunch Episcopalian—if the GP chapel was across the street, and the nearest Episcopal church was 30 miles away over icy roads—well, we got snow tires.

I was a recent church-shopper, until I found St. Paul's. This is a place where Katie Judnich's greeting was so sincere and genuine that I felt welcome right away. You would think my arrival really mattered. Bill Kling followed up with that microphone and an invitation to introduce myself

The atmosphere inside the church was one of reverence. One is drawn to focus on the beautiful altar and the traditional appointments of the sacred space—an atmosphere in which worship comes naturally.

Liturgy is what makes the Episcopal church special—and at St. Paul's, the holiness of our sacrament is emphasized in the prayerful and respectful treatment of every aspect of worship.

The music enhanced that atmosphere of reverence—the choir led us in hymns and responses that were familiar to us and beautifully

rendered. As we sang "Surely the presence of the Lord is in this place," I knew it to be true.

I learned there are other interesting things to do at St. Paul's—will it be possible to finish reading the Holy Bible in three months? I will see. I've made a promise to do so.

But this church-shopper's decision was made with the preaching. How often do we remember a sermon after coffee hour is over? Yet I still think of my upper- and lower-case sins; I still try to observe gratitude, helping, and moving—remember those?

The day when I made my decision to stay with St. Paul's was the Sunday when we celebrated the Baptism of Christ. When I heard the word "stewardship," I thought I was in for a little mind-wandering, recognizing that it's necessary to hit the parishioners up for pledges, but not looking forward to it. I can't remember when I've been more surprised. We really heard about commitment, and we moved on to renewing our baptismal vows. I renewed mine with all my heart.

So this church-shopper has found a place for that commitment. I hope to bring enthusiasm and energy to contribute in any way I can to this holy community. Thank you for the welcome! Let's pass it on!

> a telephone conversation to discuss the events of the past week. We would not have obtained Fr. Tom in such an expeditious manner without the assistance of Canon Durning.

I am sure that by now you are all thrilled at the majesty and timeliness of his sermons. Please ask your friends to come and experience Fr. Tom. Junior warden's report

At most Episcopal churches the junior warden is the vestry person who has liaison responsibility for the physical properties of the church. Not so for St. Paul's. Here we are blessed with God's Gardeners who, over the past 47 years, have and continue to take great care of maintaining and improving our campus.

So, in addition to assisting the rector and the senior warden when called upon, the junior warden has vestry liaison responsibility for outreadh and use of facilities by outside groups.

Because of our dire financial situation, St. Paul's outreach is now limited to that of the ECW outreach program and the deanery-wide outreach for the children's shelter in the Dominican Republic. We look forward to restoring other valuable programs soon.

Use of facilities by outside groups is very active. Daily, groups like the Brazilian Church, the Armenian Church, AA, Yoga or other exercise groups use our facilities and we are delighted to have them. The Haitian Congregation also makes good use of St. Paul's facilities and rightfully so because they are part of St. Paul's. The outside users generate some \$14,000 revenue annually.

Treasurer's report

A substantial change in leadership is an expensive process. Out-of-state church visits and interviews, the costs of moving Fr. Tom in and moving out the existing tenant, Fr. Panel, as well as furniture storage, temporary housing, etc all add up. In addition, we incurred far greater expenses in updating the rectory than we anticipated. I bring these issues up because we are a church where

expenses exceed revenues. Like many other churches, our congregation is dwindling, and so is the revenue and volunteers to help in the many church needs. We need every member's help to grow our congregation and to pledge a financial amount you feel comfortable in giving.
