About the Show



Duration:

2 hours and 35 minutes including a 15-minute intermission

Pearl Cleage's drama **Blues for an Alabama Sky** explores the joy and hardship of a society on the brink of change in 1930s Harlem. Below, you will find a detailed breakdown of sensory impacts every 15 minutes. Key elements to be aware of include:

- **Scenic:** This play takes place within multiple homes in Harlem. During scene transitions throughout the show, lights will dim, the city space behind the set will change colors, and the set itself will rotate.
- **Apartment Sounds:** Doors opening and closing in the apartments as characters make their way to through different scenes. Characters will also knock as they enter each other's homes.
- Music: There are a few moments during the show when characters play
 music in their homes, underscoring the dialogue on stage. In addition,
 there is an on-stage musician playing live trumpet through every scenic
 transition, in addition to sound being played through speakers on stage.
- City & Car Sounds: A cacophony of sounds highlighting the community of Harlem will play during scenic transitions.

Sound Levels: This production was audited for this Sensory Guide during the final technical dress rehearsal before a small audience of invited guests, when technical elements are being set in advance of the first public performance. The decibel readings directly reflect what was on the stage at that final dress rehearsal. Please note that sound levels with a full audience may be somewhat higher and could exceed 100dB as the show begins or during the curtain call.

Guide Development: This Sensory Guide is tailored specifically to Seattle Rep and The Hansberry Project's 2025 production of *Blues for an Alabama Sky*. The Guide was produced by Matty Sythandone, Audience Services Manager and neurodivergent individual, with training and guidance provided by Sensory Access. The production was audited during the final technical dress rehearsal on January 29, 2025.
