About the Show



Duration:

2 hours and 10 minutes (including one 20-minute intermission)

About the Show: It's opening night of the Cornley Drama Society's production of *The Murder at Haversham Manor*, and despite the troupe's best efforts, mishaps are causing mayhem on stage. From wayward props to malfunctioning scenery to unexpected understudies, the show must go on—but will the theater still be standing at the end of the performance?

Fueled by energetic physical comedy, this award-winning London and Broadway sensation will have the whole family rolling in the aisles. Catch its first-ever professional Seattle production, brought to life with Seattle Rep's signature craftsmanship, technical brilliance, and behind-the-scenes magic.

Production Advisory: This production uses strobe lights, smoke and fire effects, gunshot sound effects and other loud, unexpected noises.

Key Elements to be aware of include:

 Scenic/Props: All Scenic/Prop transitions or "malfunctions" are carefully crafted to help further the story, and comedic elements within the script. All actors involved are in control of what is happening on stage, with onstage crew close by for any support.

- Smoke: This performance will include smoke coming from an off-stage elevator that will linger in the theater. An actor will also use a fake fire extinguisher, the contents of which may also linger in the theater. If you would like a face mask, please visit the concierge desk in the lobby.
- Elements in the Audience: Pre-show, during intermission, and during the performance, actors may use the theater aisles and lobby as a part of the show. During the play, small props may enter the audience (ex: pieces of paper) and props and set pieces may fall close to the front of the stage. All actors involved are in control of what is happening on stage, with on-stage crew close by for any support. The play contains spit-takes (actors spit water into the air), and the first row of the audience may be in the "splash zone" for small droplets of water. If you would like a face mask, please visit the concierge desk in the lobby.
- **Lighting:** The lighting elements in this production range from soft to quick transitions between scenes. See show information below for exact moments of a full black out.
- Physical Comedy: You will see small to large moments in this production
 where characters use props, their bodies, and scenic pieces to further the
 comedic elements within the script. All actors involved are in control of
 what is on stage, with on-stage crew close by for any support.

Sound Levels

The sound levels recorded in this Guide reflect what you can expect during a public performance. Due to the nature of the show, at times there may be moments where sounds reach or exceed 100 dB.

Guide Development

This Sensory Guide is tailored specifically to Seattle Rep's 2025 production of *The Play That Goes Wrong*. The Guide was produced by Matty Sythandone, Sensory Access Contractor and neurodivergent individual, with training and guidance provided by Sensory Access. This production was audited once during the rehearsal process on August 12 and when fully staged on August 29.
