POSITION: Part-Time Science Teacher

WHEN: Fall 2026 and Spring 2027 Semesters (15 weeks each)

LOCATION: Washington, D.C.

About the Position

The Part-Time Science Teacher position offers an opportunity to instruct outstanding high school students and to work at a school that is changing the world. The Part-Time Science Teacher will teach 2-3 small sections (no more than 5 students each) of Chemistry, one introductory and one AP-level, and introductory Biology, for the 15-week fall 2026 semester (August 29-December 19, 2026) and 15-week spring 2027 semester (January 30-May 29, 2027). There may also be the opportunity to teach AP-level Biology for the right candidate.

About The School for Ethics and Global Leadership

The School for Ethics and Global Leadership (SEGL) is a semester-long residential program for a diverse group of intellectually motivated high school juniors from across the United States. SEGL has campuses in Johannesburg, South Africa; London, United Kingdom; and Washington, DC. Each campus serves approximately 24 students each term. The program selects students who have shown outstanding character, promise for leadership, and scholastic ability and provides them with a unique curriculum that emphasizes ethical thinking, leadership development, and international affairs. Mission Statement

To provide intellectually motivated high school juniors who represent the diversity of the United States with the best possible opportunity to shape themselves into ethical leaders who create positive change in our world.

Responsibilities

- Teach either one section of high school Chemistry or high school Biology in three periods per week—two single 50-minute blocks and one 100-minute block
- Teach one section of AP Chemistry in three periods per week—two single 50-minute blocks and one 100-minute block—that aligns closely with the College Board's AP Chemistry curriculum and prepares students to take the exam successfully in May
- Meet with students for individual help when requested
- Align the curriculum with each student's sending school syllabi
- Write mid-term and final comments for each student, highlighting successes as well as areas for improvement

Qualifications

- Bachelor's Degree in Chemistry or related field required, advanced degree preferred;
- Experience teaching Chemistry at the high school or collegiate level preferred;



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- Willingness to work as part of a passionate, collegial, mission-driven team that celebrates diversity.
