







# Attractions

### Alibates Flint Quarries National Monument

30 miles north of Amarillo on State Highway 136; an ancient place, where, for centuries, Native Americans quarried the prized flint for weapons and tools. (806) 857-3151

### Amarillo Livestock Auction

100 Manhattan near Tri-State Fairgrounds at the Western Stockyards. One of the largest cattle auctions in the country, held each Tuesday. Around 100,000 head of cattle are sold each year. Visitors are welcome, but reservations for groups are needed. (806) 373-7464

The Stockyard Café is a must; here visitors can mingle with the buyers and sellers from the cattle auction and enjoy some of the finest food in the state (open for breakfast and lunch daily).

## Amarillo Museum of Art

A visual arts museum featuring a broad range of paintings, prints, photographs, sculptures and textiles from 20th Century American Art to Southeast Asian treasures. Free admission. On the campus of Amarillo College on Washington Street. (806) 371-5050

### Amarillo Zoo

Bison grazing on a 20-acre range plus other animals of the High Plains and other "Texotic" exhibits make the Amarillo Zoo fun for the entire family. Free admission. Located north on U.S. 287 in Thompson Park. (806) 381-7911

### American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame & Museum

# Big Texan Steak Ranch, Opry & Cowboy Palace

This world-renowned restaurant is famous for its 72-oz steak. Eat it and all the trimmings in one hour, and it's FREE! ## Cadillac Ranch

I-40 west at Arnot exit. Ten Cadillacs, models 1949-1963, buried nose down in a field - at the same angle as the Cheops Pyramid in Egypt - meant as a tribute to the heydays of Route 66. Locals refer to this (the only one in the world of its kind) as a "bumper crop"!

# Cal Farley's Boys Ranch

Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, located 35 miles northwest of Amarillo on Highway 385, provides homes and futures for boys and girls from across the country. Built on the historic Old Tascosa, Boys Ranch provides a variety of academic, vocational, spiritual and extra-curricular activities for the more than 350 children in care. Each Labor Day weekend, thousands of visitors enjoy the Cal Farley's Boys Ranch Rodeo. Visitors are welcome, tours available. (806) 372-2341

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## Don Harrington Discovery Center

#### Historic Route 66

On 6th Street in the Old San Jacinto area of Amarillo. Part of the nostalgic Route 66 is preserved here with over a mile of unique restaurants, galleries, antique shops, specialty stores, and historic buildings.



### Kwahadi Kiva Indian Museum

### Old West Stables

## Palo Duro Canyon State Park

Second largest canyon in the country this Texas State Park is some 120 miles long and around 1,200 feet deep. Visitors can enjoy this natural wonder from the comfort of a car or along the hiking and biking trails once used by Apaches, Comanches, buffalo hunters, the U.S. cavalry and even early Spanish explorers. Some campsites for tents and RVs, riding stables, and picnic areas; entrance fee charged. (806) 488-2227

# Panhandle Plains Historical Museum

One block east of U.S. 87 on 4th Avenue in Canyon. Panhandle Plains is the largest history museum in Texas. Exhibits reflect the heritage and history of the southern Plains from early man to the Old West era and the history of oil and gas. Also houses one of the Southwest's finest collections of Western art and artifacts. Admission charged. (806) 651-2244

### Outdoor Musical Drama"TEXAS"

At Pioneer Amphitheater in Palo Duro Canyon. For over 40 years now Paul Green's musical drama - depicting the history of the Panhandle in music, song and dance against the breathtaking background of a 600 ft. cliff - has drawn visitors from all over the world. ### River Breaks Ranch

Come visit the River Breaks Ranch and get a taste of the real cowboy lifestyle.
