AMARILLO FACTS & CLIMATE

LOCATION: Amarillo is in the center of the Texas Panhandle, where the

southern Great Plains meet the desert. Founded in 1887 at the intersection of two railroads, today the city is the intersection of Interstates 40 and 27. The city got its name, which means yellow in Spanish, from the yellow sub-soil and the yellow flowers blooming

here.

POPULATION: Amarillo metro area 241,802 (2010 census). The city is 88.4 square

miles in two counties, Potter and Randall. Amarillo was recently voted as one of the top cities in the country to start a business and raise a family and was rated tops for Texas cities quality of life in

other survey.

CLIMATE: Altitude 3,671 ft: annual precipitation of about 19.5 inches. The

altitude and constant breeze are responsible for the clean air and low humidity. There are four distinct seasons in the city, yet the temperatures remain comfortable for most of the year. Each year

there are over 270 sunny days.

TRANSPORTATION & DISTANCES

AIR TRANSPORTATION:

Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport opened in 1929, mail service started in 1930. A major renovation project was completed in 1992 and a brand new passenger terminal opened in 2011. Today the city is served by American Eagle, Continental Express, Southwest Airlines and United Express. Non-stop flights serve Dallas (both airports), Denver, Houston (Bush-Intercontinental Airport) and Las Vegas.

HIGHWAY SYSTEM:

Amarillo is located on Interstate 40, a major east-west highway linking southern California to the southern East Coast. Amarillo is connected to Denver and Dallas/Ft. Worth by U.S 287, and to Lubbock by Interstate 27. Amarillo was the only major Texas city on Route 66 and is about halfway between Chicago and Los Angeles on the old "Mother Road."

AMARILLO TIMELINE

- 1541 ~ Spanish conquistador Francisco Coronado is the first European to reach the area.
- 1786 ~ A portion of *El Camino Real* (The King's Highway) from Santa Fe to San Antonio included the Amarillo area and was widely used for exploration and trade.
- 1874 to ~ The first and second battles of Palo Duro Canyon, between U.S. troops and Native Americans, started the demise of the Native Americans in the area.
 - The buffalo was replaced by the Longhorn, the LX Ranch was established, and the Frying Pan Ranch was the first of the large ranches to be fenced in with barbed wire.
- 1876 ~ Potter County named after Robert Potter, Secretary of the Navy and Senator of the Republic of Texas was created by the Texas Legislature.
 - ~ Texas Ranger Col. Charles Goodnight, developer of the chuckwagon and co-founder of the Goodnight-Loving Cattle Trail, started the local cattle industry when he settled in Palo Duro Canyon and brought 1,600 head of cattle with him.
- 1883 ~ Judge O.H. Nelson imported Hereford and Shorthorn cattle, unwittingly starting the demise of the Longhorn.
- 1887 ~ Amarillo became a county seat and the first railroad freight service came to the area.
- 1910 ~ West Texas A&M University was founded in Canyon, TX.
- 1913 ~ Amarillo was the first city in Texas and only the fifth in the nation to adopt a city commission/city manager form of government.
- 1918 ~ Natural gas was discovered in the Texas Panhandle.
- 1921 ~ Oil was discovered in the area.
- 1922 ~ The first radio concert was broadcast from an Amarillo radio station and carried by WDAG one of the first 80 licensed stations in the country.
- 1929 ~ U.S. Bureau of Mines' Amarillo Helium plant was completed, and the city was on the way to becoming the "Center of the Helium Industry."

AMARILLO TIMELINE (cont.)

1948 The American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) moved its headquarters to Amarillo. Lake Meredith opened and recorded 227,000 visitors the first year. 1965 President Johnson signed the act dedicating the Alibates Flint Quarries National Monument. 1966 Outdoor musical drama TEXAS opened 1995 The Working Ranch Cowboy's Association (WRCA), an organization entirely dedicated to the working cowboy, was created with headquarters in Amarillo. Brings the World Championship Ranch Rodeo to Amarillo. Amarillo hosts The Oprah Winfrey Show for an extended stay. 1998 ~ Bell Helicopter announces return to Amarillo with construction of a facility to build the V-22 Osprey, the world's first tilt-rotor aircraft. 2000 ~ Amarilloan Brandon Slay wins Gold Medal in wrestling at the 2000 Summer Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia. 2003 ~ Airport renamed Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport in memory of Columbia Space Shuttle Commander Rick Husband, a native of Amarillo, who died in the Space Shuttle Columbia in February 2003. 2007 ~ AQHA Hall of Fame & Museum re-opens after major renovation and upgrade. 2008 ~ Western Crossing opens as new shopping destination in Amarillo. 2011 ~ New passenger terminal opens at Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport opens. 2011~ Downtown development plan announced featuring several new buildings. AMARILLO TRIVIA

- ~ In 1893 Amarillo's population was listed as "between 500 600 humans and 50,000 head of cattle."
- In 1886 the XIT Ranch ran 150,000 head of cattle and was valued at more than
 1.5 million dollars; at one time the ranch extended into 10 counties.
- ~ In 1929 Amarillo was a stop along the first continuous, scheduled air passenger and mail service from the Atlantic to the Pacific.
- Some people maintain that during an Amarillo sunrise and sunset one can see the curvature of the earth, due to the wide open spaces of the Great Plains.
- ~ The Amarillo airport has the 3rd largest runway in the world and is designated as an alternate landing site for the space shuttle.
- ~ Amarillo produces 25% of the nation's, and 88% of Texas' beef.
- ~ Amarillo was rated nationally as having some of the cleanest air in the country.

AMARILLO AMENITIES

HOTELS & MOTELS:

Amarillo has over 40 hotels and motels with more than 5,000 rooms in various categories for visitors - from first class to moderate, from full and partial service to suite properties. PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:

The city bus system operates within the city limits. Taxi services are offered, fares according to meter.

RESTAURANTS:

Over 100 restaurants - several with more than one location - offer a variety of menus, such as American, Tex-Mex, Italian, Asian, and European.
