The Peak to Peak Scenic Byway is the oldest of the 25 Colorado byways. This route brings travelers up close and parallel with the Continental Divide, with tours of ghost towns and Victorian-era opulence. Experience historic gold mine tours, national forest trails and the gateway to Rocky Mountain National Park, with lush valleys and craggy peaks.

When planning your time outdoors, be prepared by covering yourself with sunscreen and a hat. Remember to drink plenty of water.

The communities along the Peak to Peak and other byways encourage visitors to respect the local residents and help protect wildlife by recycling while keeping the areas litter free.

Thank you for your respect of our natural resources. Please leave our area as you find it, since our natural resources are fragile. When hiking please stick to the trails, as shortcuts create erosion. It takes years for the land to recover.

Along the way, take in the scenic beauty of Rocky Mountain National Park, Indian Peaks Wilderness Area and the foothills of the Rocky Mountains.


The Peak to Peak Scenic Byway provides some of Colorado's most spectacular mountain vistas as it winds 55 miles in and out of national forest lands on highways 7, 72 and 119. The Peak to Peak features a



wide variety of activities, amenities and attractions yearround. With so much to see and do, you're sure to find something for everyone to enjoy.

Come experience outdoor recreation for all seasons, including downhill and cross-country skiing, hiking, fishing, hunting, cycling and mountain biking, camping, horseback riding and more. Explore the many unique mountain towns, where you can browse through gift and antique shops, art galleries and museums.

Specific landmarks include Longs Peak, Mt. Meeker, Saint Vrain Creek, Barker Reservoir, Brainard Lake Rec-



reation Area, Peaceful Valley and Saint Malo Chapels, Lake Isabel, the Raymond country store and Golden Gate State Park.

Fall Leaf-Peeping
