

Weaver Street Market is Carrboro's corner store, only it's organic and hosts an open lawn where visitors gather for coffee, food, music and entertainment. The large lawn that fronts Carr Mill Mall and Weaver Street acts as the local hub for the town.

12 LOCAL FOOD & FARM MARKETS

Hailed as "America's Foodiest Small Town" by Bon Appétit magazine, Chapel Hill is a hot spot for local farm to table cuisine. Among the restaurants noted nationally are ONE (Food & Wine's Best New Chefs in southeast 2014), Crook's Corner, Sunrise Biscuit Kitchen (The Splendid Table), and Lantern Restaurant (Food & Wine magazine, etc.). Stop by newly redesigned Il Palio Restaurant (photo) and Crossroads Chapel Hill Restaurant, both AAA four-diamond delicious! In Neighboring Carrboro, Bon Appétit magazine named Neal's Deli to their list of the top ten sandwich shops in the country. Aaron Vandemark, chef of Panciuto in Hillsborough is a five-time James Beard nominee. Visit five county farmers' markets to see where many local chefs shop. Don't forget our multiple craft beer breweries and spirits distillery.
