

Many of the city's world-class museums offer free admission
to their permanent collections and activities. The Amon Carter
Museum of American Art houses a stunning collection of 19th
and 20th century paintings, sculpture, works on paper, and
photography – and it's all free of charge. Admission to the
permanent collection at the Kimbell Art Museum and admission
to the Sid Richardson Museum are always free. The Modern Art
Museum of Fort Worth offers free admission on the first Sunday of
every month and half-price on Wednesdays.



- Enjoy Fort Worth's green space at Trinity Park, along the banks of the Trinity River, which is home to a duck pond, miniature train, playgrounds and the Trinity Trails. With picnic areas and restrooms scattered throughout, it is the perfect venue for get-togethers with family and friends.
- For more outdoor fun, hike along miles of trails at the Fort Worth Nature Center and Refuge. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children. Or, get up close and personal with 500 species of animals

at the Fort Worth Zoo. Visit on Wednesdays for halfprice admission of \$6 for adults and \$4.50 for kids.

• Follow the Heritage
Trails on Main Street,
in downtown, a series
of 22 bronze sidewalk
markers ending at the
stunning Fort Worth
Water Gardens next to
the Fort Worth Convention
Center. The garden's three
pools – meditation pool,
aerating pool and active
pool – fascinate visitors of
all ages. For a small fee,



explore the Fort Worth Botanic Garden, home to more than 2,500 species of plants in its 23 specialty gardens including the world-renowned Japanese Garden.



 Just north of downtown is Fort Worth's Stockyards National Historic District. Walk through Stockyards Station and visit the Stockyards Museum for just \$2. Don't miss the Fort Worth Herd, the world's only twice-daily cattle drive every day at 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

• Tour the Bureau of Engraving and Printing's Western Currency Facility, one of only two U.S. Department of Treasury locations that prints money, and it won't cost a dime to see billions of dollars being printed. During the 45-minute guided tour visitors can see each step of currency production, beginning with large blank sheets of paper and ending with wallet ready bills.



 Walk around Sundance Square – recognized as one of the cleanest, safest and most walkable urban areas in the country.
 With 35 blocks of sheer pleasure, downtown Fort Worth has plenty of

budget-friendly places to grab a bit to eat. Make sure to stop and take a photograph of downtown's most iconic art, the Chisholm Trail Mural, right in Sundance Square Plaza.
