
# DOWNTOWN WALKING TOUR

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# 1. Postcard from Knoxville

Filled with iconic images of the region, this mural is dedicated to the artists, musicians and visionaries that continue to make Knox-ville a great place to work, live, play and visit. (Bobbie Crews, Ken Britton, Walt Fieldsa, Curtis Glover & Randall Starnes, 2013)

# 2. Greetings from Knoxville

Measuring about 31' x 19' ft, this Knoxville postcard is the second largest in the Greetings Tour series and the first of its kind in Tennessee. Iconic images in the giant letters include the Sunsphere, Tennessee Theatre and other popular spots

# 3. Strong Alley

Strong Alley murals, a collaboration between agreeing business owners and willing artists, was the brainstorm of the artist collective "Artist Alley Revamp". In the alley between Union Ave. and Wall Ave.



# 4. Knoxville Music

The "Bank Building" mural was created as a project for a Leadership Knoxville team. Local high school students worked with professional artist Kathy Wilder Brown to develop and paint the mural as a representation of the history of segregation in Knoxville. (2007) **505 S. Gay St.** 



# 7. London Streetscape

Take a trip to jolly old England by way of the Old City. The outdoor courtyard at Crown & Goose features a 60 foot mural of a 19th century London streetscape. (Frederick Gardner, 2008) **123 S. Central St.** 



# 10. Weaving Rainbow Mountain

The 43, 10ft-wide steps which are heavily used by pedestrians to segue between UT Campus and the Worlds Fair Park was transformed by the efforts of the Baltimore based team of Jessie Unterhalter and Katey Truhn.

# 5. Miller's Building Mural

This 90'x21' work of art is an example of trompe l'oeil, a style of painting which depicts objects in photographically realistic detail. (G. Byron Peck, 2000). **Courtyard next to Tomato Head on Market Square** 



## 8. Historical Train Mural

The railroad arrived in Knoxville in the 1850s and led to a boom in population and commercial activity. The mural was commissioned by Keep Knoxville Beautiful & recently restored in 2017. (Walt Fieldsa, 2001)

Artist Per-Ole Lind designed and helped 60+ volunteers install panels highlighting Parkridge, Fourth and Gill, and Old North Knoxville neighborhoods. Made possible through the Parkridge community and a grant from the City of Knoxville. (2013)

Commissioned by the City of Knoxville's Public Arts Committee, the 11-panel mural celebrates the nearby Tennessee River and its many diverse species of aquatic life. The mural is located on Volunteer Landing Lane and was completed in April 2017 by West Palm Beach, Florida artist, Eduardo Mendieta.
