

▶ THE GREAT ALLEGHENY PASSAGE TURNS 40 IN 2018

What started as just a small bike trail between two charming Laurel Highlands towns has grown into a phenomenon that has beckoned bikers and hikers from all over the world. A converted rail-trail, which once felt the heavy rumble of freight trains, the Great Allegheny Passage (GAP) stretches 150 miles from Pittsburgh, through the Laurel Highlands and finally to Cumberland, Md. There, the GAP connects with the C&O Canal towpath, extending all the way to the Georgetown district of Washington, D.C. for a total length of 334.5 miles. Gear up for a long-haul adventure or pick a section and bike from trail town to trail town for shorter family-friendly trips.

► COMING SOON – THE TOWER OF VOICES AT FLIGHT 93 NATIONAL MEMORIAL

On September 11, 2001, four commercial airliners were hijacked in a planned attack against the United States. Two jet liners were flown into the World Trade Center Twin Towers and a third aircraft into the Pentagon. A fourth aircraft, United Airlines Flight 93, crashed into an open field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, in the Laurel Highlands. The 40 passengers and crew of Flight 93 had time to realize that this was unlike any previous hijacking, and they developed a plan to try to take back the plane and not let it reach its intended target, Washington, D.C. They succeeded in this effort, but, unfortunately, lost their lives.

The final phase of the Flight 93 memorial, The Tower of Voices will begin with a "soundbreaking" event on Sept. 10, 2017. Once completed in September 2018, the Tower will contain 40 uniquely pitched chimes, a symbolic representation of the eternal voices of the passengers and crew members of Flight 93.










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CELEBRATING 90 YEARS OF LAUREL HIGHLANDS NATIVE AND ICON − MR. FRED ROGERS
