# MAKIMONO bench

Allowing for multiple users to sit randomly, the bench deconstructs the typical horizontal seating form by slicing it into four separate pieces and allows people to sit either facing or adjacent to each other in an effort to facilitate interaction.




# **Vanishing Point**


