SOLAR ECLIPSE FACT SHEET – Paducah, Kentucky August 21, 2017

GENERAL SOLAR ECLIPSE INFORMATION

Monday, August 21, 2017

Point of First Contact (Eclipse begins): 11:54 a.m. CDT

Totality begins: 1:22 p.m. CDT

Period of Totality (Sun completely obscured by the Moon, darkness): 2 minutes 21 seconds

Totality ends: 1:24 p.m. CDT

Point of Last Contact (Eclipse ends): 2:49 p.m. CDT

Certified Solar Eclipse viewing glasses are necessary during all times except totality (other safe viewing options are pinhole projector or #14 welder's glass) to protect eyes from damage.

LOCAL TIPS

To ensure a safe day of solar eclipse viewing, develop a plan of action that includes:

- Viewing site: Make arrangements to attend a sponsored viewing party, occupy a space at a public park or make sure permission has been obtained from the landowner of a farm, field or other area that is suitable for viewing.
- Food, water, supplies: Prepare to be self-sufficient by carrying bottled water, food and other supplies including a first aid kit in your vehicle or in a backpack if you are walking to a viewing site. Stores may be crowded or their inventories may be depleted.
- Accountability: View the eclipse with other people who know you and can take care of you in the event of an emergency. Share telephone numbers among your eclipse-viewing group to ensure everyone knows the location of their fellow viewers. If a member of your group becomes lost, call 911.


In case of inclement weather, be prepared to take shelter in a substantial structure. If you cannot get to a substantial structure, find a ditch or depression without water and take cover in it. Do not remain outdoors if lightning is observed. Monitor local radio and television reports, use a weather app, or listen to NOAA Weather Radio. If a tornado is detected, public warning sirens will be activated throughout Paducah and McCracken County.

COOLING STATIONS

Warm temperatures increase the risk of incurring a heat-related injury. When traveling to a viewing destination, note the location of nearby air-conditioned buildings. Stay well-hydrated by drinking water and beverages with electrolytes.

DRONE & PHOTOGRAPHY SAFETY ADVISORY

Drone or UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle) operators should abide by Federal Aviation Administration safety rules governing drone usage. If a drone is used for viewing or taking photos of the eclipse, the operator should ensure the drone does not fly near an emergency facility, and emergency scene or emergency vehicles.

It is not safe to look at the eclipse through a camera or binoculars unless they have the appropriate solar filter.

How to View the 2017 Solar Eclipse Safely

A solar eclipse occurs when the Moon blocks any part of the Sun. On Monday, August 21, 2017, a solar eclipse will be visible (weather permitting) across all of North America. The whole continent will experience a partial eclipse lasting 2 to 3 hours. Halfway through the event, anyone within a roughly 70-mile-wide path from Oregon to South Carolina (https://go.nasa.gov/2pC0lhe) will experience a brief total eclipse, when the Moon completely blocks the Sun's bright face for up to 2 minutes 40 seconds, turning day into night and making visible the otherwise hidden solar corona — the Sun's outer atmosphere — one of nature's most awesome sights. Bright stars and planets will become visible as well.



Looking directly at the Sun is unsafe except during the brief total phase of a solar eclipse ("totality"), when the Moon entirely blocks the Sun's bright face, which will happen only within the narrow path of totality.



The only safe way to look directly at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed Sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as "eclipse glasses" (example shown at left) or hand-held solar viewers. Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the Sun. To date four manufacturers have certified that their eclipse glasses and handheld solar viewers meet the ISO 12312-2 international standard for such products: Rainbow Symphony, American Paper Optics, Thousand Oaks Optical, and TSE 17.

- Always inspect your solar filter before use; if scratched or damaged, discard it. Read and follow any instructions printed on or packaged with the filter. Always supervise children using solar filters.
- Stand still and cover your eyes with your eclipse glasses or solar viewer before looking up at the bright Sun. After glancing at the Sun, turn away and remove your filter - do not remove it while looking at the Sun.
- Do not look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed Sun through an unfiltered camera, telescope, binoculars, or other optical device. Similarly, do not look at the Sun through a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while using your eclipse glasses or hand-held solar viewer — the concentrated solar rays will damage the filter and enter your eye(s), causing serious injury. Seek expert advice

from an astronomer before using a solar filter with a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device.

If you are within the path of totality (https://go.nasa.gov/2pC0lhe), remove your solar filter only when the Moon completely covers the Sun's bright face and it suddenly gets quite dark. Experience totality, then, as soon as the bright Sun begins to reappear, replace your solar viewer to glance at the remaining partial phases.



An alternative method for safe viewing of the partially eclipsed Sun is pinhole projection. For example, cross the outstretched, slightly open fingers of one hand over the outstretched, slightly open fingers of the other. With your back to the Sun, look at your hands' shadow on the ground. The little spaces between your fingers will project a grid of small images on the ground, showing the Sun as a crescent during the partial phases of the eclipse.

A solar eclipse is one of nature's grandest spectacles. By following these simple rules, you can safely enjoy the view and be rewarded with memories to last a lifetime. More information:
