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



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Natural Treasures

By land and by sea, animals enrich the Gulf of Mexico experience

DESERTS CAN BE made to bloom. Just add water. Doubt that? Consider, then, the sands of Panama City Beach, its surf line and the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico extending to the horizon.

Those environments attract and host myriad life forms, a mere small sample of which is represented in the drawing before you. Some, at the bottom of food chains, are so small as to go unseen; others are too big to be reeled in.

To be sure, all add to the experience of visiting the beach. It is possible to enjoy each on a surface level. but you may also be inclined to go granular - see what we did there? — and seek answers to the questions they invite: How do sand dollars eat? Of what advantage to snowy egrets are yellow feet? All groupers mature first as females! What's that all about?

And, hey, we haven't even gotten around to marine mammals, including that bottlenose leaper who elicits oohs and aahs whenever it takes to the air. Great Blue Heron



Golfers' Paradise

FOR THE SERIOUS **GOLFER** — or the lucky beginner there could be no Panama City Beach souvenir more precious than a holein-one. Courses here offer easy-to-reach par 3s that make such an achievement possible. There are plenty of holes that will tempt you to take your driver out of the bag. And hey, if your sand wedge is a little rusty, there's no better way to sharpen your sand play than to practice at the beach before hitting the links.

Panama City Beach's eight-course golf menu includes: **BAY POINT,** offering two layouts, the only Nicklaus Design course in the region and a more subtle Walter Byrd layout; **HOLIDAY GOLF,** home to both a regulation 18-hole layout and a lighted par-3 executive course:

HOMBRE, with three courses, each of which provides a distinctive challenge and lots of water; SIGNAL HILL, which delivers a varied 18 holes, open on the front side but dicier on the back.

Best 18 Golf Holes offer scenic challenges

Linked, they add up to a dream round BY PAT MCCANN

t doesn't take a fictional Roy McAvoy staring down his destiny to create a memorable golf hole. Some are distinctive because they are feisty and have withstood the test of time, such as the par-4 Road Hole on the Old Course at St. Andrews.

Others, such as the tricky par-3 No. 12 at Augusta National, are devilish in the acumen and steel they demand from those seeking to wear a green jacket.

The par-5 No. 16 on "The Monster" at Firestone is legendary for its length, enough said. The panoramic ocean holes at Pebble Beach are prominent given their natural majesty.

And some golf holes, including those listed here as part of an "Elite 18" selected from courses in Panama City Beach, follow the lead of those legendary, larger-than-life holes and dominate conversations after the bags are put up and the beverages poured.

Our list comprises holes found at the Hombre Golf Club, Holiday Golf Club, Shark's Tooth, Signal Hill Golf Course and the Nicklaus and Club Meadows layouts at Bay Point.

Some might argue for other holes, feeling that they are especially noteworthy and memorable for the way they complement the natural beauty of the area, but in the opinion of club professionals, directors of golf and some of the regular folks who just enjoy a long walk spoiled, these holes equate to a dream round of golf in Panama City Beach. All yardages are from the tips, and the Hombre holes mentioned are on the "Bad" and "Ugly" nines.




IN COMBINATION, THE ELITE 18 PLAY TO A PAR 71

1. HOMBRE, THE BAD, 1 575-yard, par 5 The starting hole is the longest hole on the course. If you decide to lay up your second shot on this par 5, good luck. It has one of the tightest landing areas on the entire course.

2. SHARK'S TOOTH 6 526-yard, par 5

The No. 1 handicap hole borders Lake Powell on the left and features a continuous bunker framing the left side. The drive has to carry a natural preserve for a decent approach. The entire back of the green abuts a corner of the lake and provides a spectacular setting.



3. NICKLAUS 5 398-yard, par 4

The most scenic par 4 on the layout with a view of St. Andrew Bay. It is a target golf hole as you hit across the marsh to an island fairway, then back across the marsh to the green.

6. HOMBRE, THE BAD, 5 363-yard, par 4

One of the shorter par 4s on the course, with a narrow three-tiered green guarded by three bunkers. Try to take advantage of the short length of this hole, and it can go from the ninth hardest hole to the toughest hole on the course in the blink of an eye.

4. SHARK'S TOOTH 5 231-yard, par 3

This long par 3 plays to a two-tiered green that is more than 5,000 square feet in size. It requires a shot over a natural preserve and it borders Lake Powell, a scenic natural feature that accents their round.

5. HOLIDAY 4 195-yard, par 3

The four-section green is huge and offers a variety of pin placements. Because the green was moved during a recent course renovation, a creek now comes into play on the right.

7. NICKLAUS 12, 522-yard, par 5

This hole gives the player an option whether to go to the high side of the fairway or low side. The high-side option gives you a shorter second shot, but beware — the drive to get there is a big carry and a slight miscalculation results in time spent trapped in one of the multiple fairway bunkers.

8. CLUB MEADOWS 10, 443-yard, par 4

Probably the hardest handicap hole on either course at Bay Point. There is a tight landing area off of the tee and water on the right and trees on the left. Long!


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9. CLUB MEADOWS 7 419-yard, par 4

This medium-long par 4 has an extreme dogleg to the right. A bunker guards the left side of the fairway for those who cannot cut the corner. If you hit it left, you are not in the fairway. A tree protects the center of the fairway and the second shot is into a tricky green.

10. HOLIDAY 12, 383-yard, par 4

This hole was stretched by moving the green back 25 yards toward the water. Once simple, now not so much. The green is very undulating and guarded by a bunker on the right front.



12. HOMBRE, THE BAD, 7 153-yard, par 3

.....

The hole features an island green, and a lofted club usually is selected for the tee shot on this short hole. Wind always seems to come into play and can have its way with your ball.

11. NICKLAUS 10 168-yard, par 3

Beautiful from the back tee as the player hits over water to a narrow green that is guarded by bunkers. Do not let the short yardage fool you.

13. SHARK'S TOOTH 13

533-yard, par 5 Many consider this the signature hole of the layout as it stretches to the farthest point on the property. It borders Lake Powell all the way down the right side and is framed bu woods on the left. The fairway slopes in elevation to a medium-size green with bunkering on the left.

14. SHARK'S TOOTH 18

460-yard, par 4 The home hole is not terribly difficult, though bunkered all the way down the right side. The view of the clubhouse, built in wood and stone that matches the natural ambiance, adds to the experience. The green is bunkered on the left and right.

> **16. HOMBRE, THE BAD, 18** 421-yard, par 4

An excellent finishing hole, though not overly long. It has a forced carry over water to a small area of the green, if the hole is cut in the "Sunday" position.

15. HOLIDAY 14 412-yard, par 4

A picturesque par 4 with brand new tees offers a relatively open drive, though tighter than the previous layout. Those who favor the left side must be aware of a creek running along that stretch, and a large tree comes into play. The creek also borders the back of the green, which is multi-tiered and guarded by two new bunkers. It is for sure a second-shot hole and is the No. 2 handicap hole for men.

This hole provides a scenic view of both the golf course

and the surrounding area. The challenge is a green framed by vegetation with danger awaiting in all directions for a

shot that wanders far offline. The green rests on the highest

elevation point of the golf course, with anything short and

right sure to collect at the bottom of a daunting incline.

17. SIGNAL HILL 16, 161-yard, par 3

18. NICKLAUS 13 296-yard, par 4

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A true risk-reward short par 4. Do you go for the green or lay up? Is the risk worth the reward?

WHY KNOT?

ou've been called a thrill-seeker, a daredevil, a risk-taker and an adventurer. For you, lounging on the beach and working on your tan isn't all it's cracked up to be. Vacation means taking a walk on the wild side, and maybe crossing a few items off your bucket list. Whether you're looking for thrills on land or in the sea, Panama City Beach has a broad range of activities to scratch that itch.

DIVE SHOPS

Waters off Panama City Beach are rich in shipwrecks, artificial reefs and occasional naturally occurring rock structures known as "hard bottom." All hold magnificent populations of fish ranging from clouds of bait to apex predators like groupers. And, like all natural wonders, these environments must be seen in person to be fully appreciated. Dive shops on Panama City Beach can outfit you with snorkeling gear ideal for inspecting life around the jetties or prepare you to make deeper dives with scuba gear. "Resort courses" that culminate in Open Water Scuba Diving Certifications require only three days to complete. ADVENTURES AT SEA

If you prefer to devour your thrills at the surface, Adventure at Sea provides both freehand and guided excursions of the Gulf aboard WaveRunners, pontoons and sailboats. The only thing that beats the scenery of our coastline as you race through the waves? A bird's eye view from a parasail at Paradise Watersports. As you coast along the clouds, be on the lookout for pods of dolphins below. Tickets for this unparalleled experience, as well as boat rentals, are available at the numerous Adventure at Sea booths that adorn Panama City Beach's shores. *WaterSportsPC.com*

COBRA ADVENTURE PARK

With a name like Cobra, you know there's bound to be some excitement! Swing through Smuggler's Cove, an 18-hole putt-putt golf course that guides families through their very own pirate adventure. AN ODD COUPLE OF GUIDES

Fishing show changes channels, adds co-host

n the show's third season, Bay County native Captain Justin Leake has been joined as a host of the "Chasin' the Sun" fishing series by accomplished tournament angler and Florida Keys guide Travis Holeman.

The big-bearded Holeman, who describes himself as a "true fishing vagabond," presents an obvious contrast to Leake's button-down vibe. "Chasin' the Sun" viewers are enjoying an opportunity to see the relationship between the two captains evolve over season three's 13 episodes, which premiered on the Discovery Channel Jan. 6. (The program will air on Saturdays at 7 a.m. central, 8 a.m. pacific/eastern through June 2018.) "Nothing is scripted," Captain Holeman emphasized. "Our relationship is developing organically."

Holeman, who operates a guide service out of Key West, at one time figured in ESPN's outdoor programming, which was produced by Jamie Wilkinson, whose Pinfish Media company now produces "Chasin' the Sun." Wilkinson hooked Holeman up with Leake and Visit Panama City Beach. But it's not as if Holeman was a stranger to the waters off Northwest Florida.

On the Redfish Cup tournament trail, Holeman, along with his brother Brian, fished from "Gloucester to South Padre Island," he

latitude and longitude for Panama City Beach, Florida, a world-class fishing destination with easy access to yearround angling opportunities.

What do you dream of reeling in? Do you see yourself chasing a big cobia or pulling a large grouper or snapper up off of a shipwreck on the Gulf floor?

In Panama City Beach, you can troll for mackerel, target redfish and tarpon on fly tackle or just take the kids out for a day on the water to have a good time.

With three public piers on the Gulf of Mexico, lucky spots to fish from shore and countless charters available, Panama City Beach has something to offer every angler. Remember, in Panama City Beach, fishing season lasts all year long.

CAPTAIN Justin Leake reels in a Amber Jack, and guide Travis Holeman stands ready to net it. **REDFISH** like these keep anglers on the hunt for the right mix of boat, gear, guide and luck. Leake and Holeman make it look easy.

said. There was a time when Holeman banked so much prize money that he guided only about 90 days a year, but tournaments offering big purses have since dried up. That heyday may be gone, but the vagabond fishes on.

"For me, the perfect fishing trip is one that starts late, finishes early and has everyone smiling," Holeman half-kidded. He does, in fact, favor running his charters from a comfortable 9 a.m. until dusk versus dawn to midafternoon. His unconventional approach means that he misses a lot of boat traffic and catches a lateafternoon bite that others don't experience.

"My two favorite fish are tarpon and tuna," Holeman said. In South Florida, he catches primarily blackfin tuna and the occasional yellowfin. "Of course, any fish that jumps is great fun. Sailfish are spectacular that way. And about 50 percent of my trips involve permit."

Holeman won't find any permit in North Florida, of course, but fishing with Leake, he has been "content to catch whatever we bump into," from the flats to blue water.

"The talking head approach to fishing shows doesn't have mass appeal," Holeman said, "but the unscripted interaction between Justin and me gives our show more of a storyline that I think will keep people coming back for more."

In its first season, "Chasin' the Sun" aired on the Sportsman Channel; it moved a year later to Destination America and NBC Sports Network (NBCSN).

Over those two years, the show attracted approximately 2.5 million viewers, said J. Michael Brown, the vice president of tourism development for Visit Panama City Beach. Given the move to the Discovery Channel, Brown said the show is projected to attract about 6 million viewers in its third year, alone.

"Chasin' the Sun" — which won a bronze 2017 Flagler Award for excellence in niche marketing, an honor presented at the annual Visit Florida Governor's Conference on Tourism — had to meet the Discovery Channel's robust production standards to qualify for its outdoor programming lineup.

The Discovery Channel, Brown said, conducted research that revealed that a high percentage of its viewers have an interest in outdoor programming and is now placing a new emphasis on that area.

"In joining the Discovery Channel, I am confident we

are getting 'Chasin' the Sun' in front of the right audience," Brown said.

As one would expect, season three has featured cast members, including bull redfish, bruising amberjacks and other marine sportfish. In addition, episodes include "destination footage," ranging from a go-kart track to the 50th anniversary celebration of Capt. Anderson's Restaurant to highlights of Panama City Beach's events calendar.

The move to Discovery Channel, which is available in more than 100 million U.S. households, has enabled "Chasin' the Sun" to attract an impressive roster of new national sponsors.

Leake and Holeman fish from a Morada 24 centerconsole skiff supplied by Islamorada Boatworks and powered by a 350-horsepower Mercury Marine outboard engine. (Holeman calls the Morada the "Mercedes Benz of fishing boats.")

"Our sponsors have made significant investments in 'Chasin' the Sun,' and we greatly appreciate them," Brown said. "They have contributed to making a great program even better."

Airboats

Explore the backwaters at high speed

hen you think about airboats, you may envision speeding through the winding mangroves of the Florida Everglades. Others may associate the vessels with swampy Cajun bayous, skimming over their waters like a skipped stone.

But they are here, too, not far from the awe-inspiring beaches and premier shopping districts of Panama City Beach.

True to its name, Wild Thang Airboat Tours will make your heart sing with its agile airboat rides. Situated on the Intracoastal Waterway, Wild Thang has prime access to West Bay and its creeks. While customers may choose between half-hour and full-hour day tours, they mainly go for the Sunset Night Ride. Their mission? Spotting gators, of course.

"We go out about half an hour before the sunset, so it's a really pretty ride," says Julie Helfert, who coowns the business with her husband, captain Russell Ackerman. "But once it gets dark, we spotlight for alligators up in the creeks. Night is the best time because this is when the gators are stirring to go feed."

According to Helfert, gators' eyes glow a vibrant red as they reflect the light, making them unmistakable even in darkness. As the company's most popular trip, these 90-minute night runs book up weeks in advance.

In daylight, you may spot dolphins, birds of prey and other native species as you zip across the bay. Because you're traversing brackish water, some species you find in the ocean also visit the bay.

If you don't spot an alligator in the wild, you can get up close to the young alligator living at Wild Thang. Customers enjoy holding this scaly little fella and learning about him from the staff, whom Helfert considers the heart of Wild Thang.

Natural Diversions

SET OUT TO **EXPLORE** local state parks and beaches and find out firsthand how diverse and rare animal species and plant life make Panama City Beach a nature lover's wonderland. With 27 miles of beach, a multitude of parks and forests and a 700acre natural barrier island, ecotourists have their choice of wonderful adventures, from hiking and biking to kayaking and canoeing. You don't have to go far to enjoy a swim, look for shells or just log some great bird-watching time.

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BACKWATER THRILL With day excursions and nighttime treks, airboat tours offer a glimpse into the history and wildlife of the area that's rarely seen.





"All of our captains hold Coast Guard-approved licenses, and they're extremely interactive with guests," Helfert says. "We try to make our trips very family-oriented and provide as much information about the area as we can. One of our captains, Ed, is like a walking encyclopedia of these waters. People will come off the boats shocked that there was that much to learn."

Across West Bay is Boggy Bayou Airboat Tours, a company that explores swamps and backwater salt marshes in North Bay and freshwater marshes in St. Andrews Bay. Like Wild Thang, its six-passenger airboats offer three exhilarating adventures, for day or night.

"Some of these areas are literally 'uncharted' and can only be accessed by an airboat," describes co-owner Marcia Erdman. "The salt marshes are home to an abundance of fish and wildlife that see very little to no human activity. We've seen gators, dolphins, sharks, stingrays, deer and pelicans that make each tour unique."

You won't find a large staff here, as Erdman takes care of all business while her husband, captain David Erdman, navigates all tours. As a vessel instructor, marine life and wildlife identifier, University of Florida-certified master naturalist and former marine wildlife officer with a United States Coast Guard 100-ton Master Captain License, it's safe to say "Captain Dave" is experienced when it comes to boating and wildlife.

"He's a wealth of knowledge and quite entertaining," Erdman says of her better half. "We hit the ground running with Boggy Bayou Airboat Tours in August of 2015, and it has been non-stop from the get-go."

Boggy Bayou's airboats are custom made with dual controls. Their "You Drive" experience allows passengers to propel and steer their way through the swamps under the supervision of Captain Dave. Currently, Boggy is the only business that offers this opportunity on the Gulf Coast.

Helfert, at Wild Thang, says many visitors are surprised to discover the other side of the beaches area. "A lot of people don't realize that this is a part of Florida when they come to visit," she said. "When you get back here, it doesn't even seem that those white, sandy beaches are nearby. Seeing people's reactions and getting to interact with them on a daily basis is the best part of this business."

At Boggy Bayou, Erdman concurs: "It re-energizes the soul when you experience such beauty in a way you've never seen or felt before."

THE HONOR IS ALL HIS

Oyster-shucking champion revels in life on the half-shell

STORY BY HANNAH BURKE PHOTOS BY MICHAEL BOOINI hen it came time to meet Honor Allen, he had just finished up a full day's shift at Hunt's Oyster Bar & Seafood Restaurant. As

soon as he washed his hands of the hundreds of oysters he'd shucked, he took a seat at the bar to read "Oysters: A Celebration in the Raw" by Jeremy Sewall and Marion Lear Swaybill.

When I asked if I was interrupting, he responded in a charming, Southern drawl that he was "just killing time." This is just one title from his compendium of all things oyster, from which the 23-year-old absorbs detailed accounts from farmers, fellow shuckers and restaurateurs, often jotting down notes along the way.

When his hands aren't occupied with shells and knives, you can believe he's learning more about them.

It's precisely this passion that has landed the Panama City native multiple National Oyster Shucking Championship titles, and a rank among the fastest oyster shuckers in the world.

But, his fame had small beginnings. Allen grew up with four older brothers and three sisters in the St. Andrews area, where he recalls doing anything he could to pitch in.

"I was doing anything I could do get out of the house and be outside," Allen recalled. "I loved going down to the marina and getting

my flounder fishing in, cleaning fish for the captains or washing charter boats. Anything to make a dollar and help my parents out, you know?"

At the age of 12, Allen found himself at Hunt's Oyster Bar, where his family decided to dine one night. Enamored with the environment and with the quick work of the shuckers, he decided that the following day, he'd return and see if he could help out.

"I thought I could show up and say, 'Hey, remember me? I ate dinner here last night!" Allen laughed. "The next day, there was a completely different crew working the bar, but I decided to talk with them anyway. I started helping out in kind of an under-thetable way, since I was legally too young to be working. Cleaning up, shucking oysters for prep ... I had a fairly good work ethic and was eager to learn."

It wasn't until Allen was 18 that he was allowed to join Hunt's as a full-time shucker. Now on the clock, the young man was shelling out thousands of oysters a week. That year, Allen's friend, co-worker and brother shucker, Max Dawson, had plans to attend the Florida Seafood Festival Oyster Shucking Contest. When Allen expressed interest, Dawson thought he was easily talented enough to compete.

For Allen, that first competition was an eye-opening experience.

"I didn't realize what it would be like on stage with dozens of other shuckers," Allen said. "When you're in the moment, you have no idea how far ahead or behind you are from everyone else. All you can hear is the sound of other people's shells breaking around you. It was unreal how fun it was because I was going from taking a stroll behind the bar to skydiving." It took Allen a couple of losses to strengthen his competitive morale and properly train. When he finally took first place in 2015, he was shipped off to Maryland a year later to represent Florida in the U.S. Oyster Festival's National Oyster Shucking Contest. You can imagine the youth's surprise when he snagged first place in his very first national competition, deeming him the fastest shucker in the country.


"I want to say part of it was luck, but on the other hand, I practiced, prayed and looked so forward to meeting some of the best oyster shuckers in the U.S. and representing our state," Allen gushed. "It was like I was living for it."

The national title meant Allen's next stop was 2017's Galway International Oyster Opening Competition in Ireland. Returning home from nationals, it was still sinking in that he was the quickest shucker in the states, as he contemplated having a year to train for competition on a global stage.

Research began instantly. Shucking in Ireland would be a completely different ballgame, as participants are required to work with the Ostrea Edulis, more commonly known as the European Flat Oyster. While the Apalachicola oysters Allen works with on a daily basis are more of a teardrop shape with a deep cup, the European Flats have a wider base and are more circular, requiring a different grip and knife to open them.

Allen partnered with Jennifer Vigil, President & CEO of Destination Panama City, to get a shipment of a similar species of oysters with which to practice. Funded by Robin Malpass, a film producer and director based in Chicago, a crate from Maine arrived to prepare Allen for the infamous Edulis.

Only two shuckers from America have ever won the international competition, one of which is William "Chopper" Young. Allen was lucky

enough to meet Young, his idol, at nationals and receive a few pointers.

"Chopper took me aside and said, look man, I have this knife," Allen imitated. "I went to Ireland in 2007 and I didn't do so hot, but then a past champion gave me this special knife and told me to practice with it, and I'd have a lot better shot next time."

Sure enough, Chopper took the title in 2008 with that very single-bladed, Helgess brand knife. It was an honor for Honor to be passed the blade, something for which he will be forever grateful.

Months prior to visiting Ireland, Allen flew to Shanghai for the 2nd Annual China National Shuck Off Festival competition, where he placed 4th out of 11 competitors. More important to him was the top-notch advice he received from former victors.

"I got to hang out with six world champions who came over to compete, so I have to say that was one of the biggest blessings of my journey," Allen said. "To this day, I still think about everything they've told me: how to handle the oyster, shucking techniques, keeping a nice, calm demeanor, and to just go up there and do your best. It's stuck with me and it helped calm me down for the international competition."

Wielding his new knife and new knowledge, Allen impressively took 13th place at Galway. He's ecstatic about his rank and even more determined to climb to the top with next year's trip to Ireland, as he has yet again scored U.S. national champ for 2017.

"Until then, I've got Hunt's and my oyster books. I want to learn all I can about shucking and how they're cultivated, because maybe one day I'll be farming my own — maybe a restaurant. Every day is something new, and I love feeling like I'm growing in the direction I want to be. I'm gonna take it slow, hopefully bring home a couple of world titles with me and see where life takes me."

ursuers of cobia are hunters as much as they are fishers. You'll see them in the spring, atop tuna towers or even step-ladders, staring from behind polarized, wraparound sunglasses at water just off the beach as they motor stealthily along at 3 to 4 knots, hoping to intercept and spot migrating fish.

Experienced cobia anglers tell the uninitiated to look for something very near the surface that resembles a drifting, brown garbage bag, but the truth is you cannot really know what the quarry looks like until a veteran points one out to you. Even then, they are hard to see. The best cobia enthusiasts seem to sense the presence of a fish moments before they blurt, "There's one!"

Until that cry is heard, nothing happens. Rods remain in holders. Fishing partners run out of conversation. The morning coolness wears off, a sea breeze freshens. And then, could it be, yes, there it is: traveling with a large sting ray, a cobia of 50 pounds or more, making it a female.

She has grown rapidly throughout her lifetime, feeding on squid and fish and on crabs that it easily crushes with her powerful mandibles. Its flat head suggests a remora, its silhouette is remotely shark-like. Comes now the moment of truth for the angler. He is equipped with a large spinning reel and rod tipped with a live eel. The trick is to toss the bait into the cobia's line of sight without landing it so near to her that she spooks and submerges.

This time it works out. The angler drops the eel about six feet in front of the cobia's nose. The interior of the fish's mouth flashes white as the fish inhales the eel. The angler pumps his rod to bury the hook and the battle is joined, but he dare not think of cobia steaks on the grill until his hard-fighting adversary comes to net.

A BOON ON Flavor

Boon Docks restaurant serves up Southern comfort story by Liesel Schmidt // Photos by Michael Booini learly on a mission to prove that there's nothing under the sun and nothing under the sea, for that matter — that can't be fried, Boon Docks is one Southern-inspired seafood restaurant where flavor comes fresh off the docks. It's a natural way of approaching a down-home menu in a region that breads and deep fries anything imaginable; and they're hardly bashful when it comes to exploiting the wonders of a crispy golden crust, coating everything from pickles and mushrooms to gator and scallops.

Frying isn't the only way of doing things here, however. At the end of the day, it's all about showcasing the flavor of the fresh seafood that the area is so famed for and creating a place where every guest is given a dining experience that's casual and fun without ever sacrificing quality. The cooks here are adventurous in their approach, exploring the many methods of serving those spectacular specimens of sea life. For those who prefer things a little more on the healthy side, Boon Docks baits their hooks with a full section of grilled options that are perfectly charred and seasoned to create tasty dishes that are satisfying yet slightly less sinful than their crunchified counterparts. Regardless of preparation, though, every item on their menu is a made with the same attention to detail and focus on freshness. Their fish and seafood is caught locally, their steaks certified. Nothing is pre-breaded or mass-produced, as their concept is one that centers on home cooked, scratch








made classics — with a few unique extras, of course.

"People know that when they come to Boon Docks, they'll be served high quality, fresh food that's been prepared and cooked to order, and they love the atmosphere that we have here," says owner Hilary Head, who opened Boon Docks in 1998. "We've created a fun place that has sort of a laid-back, Old Florida feel; and our location makes it perfect for people to come and dine with us right from their boat or by car." It's a special setting, to be sure, as their location on the Intracoastal Waterway is comprised of a West Bay landmark that has claimed this spot since 1941, absorbing an old fish house, a bait store, and the old home of a well-known local family into the restaurant now in operation, along



with a unique store called Pickles Gift Shop and a fun bar appropriately known as Fish Tales. The history, in and of itself, is something to pique the interest, celebrated in the ways that Boon Docks has incorporated itself into each of the property's original structures and respecting their underlying stories.

Whether you're docking or driving, the menu here is certainly worth the trip. To whet your appetite or fend off the munchies, take your pick of starters like corn nuggets packed with sweet and creamy kernels of golden corn, or bacon — wrapped shrimp cooked up plump and porky. Hardly something to be cast aside for the simple fact of its name, Boat Trash is a local treasure, serving up a plethora of fried fun that includes three shrimp, three oysters, grouper, and deviled crab all brought together in one devilish dish served with two home-style sides and hushpuppies. For anyone who can't quite decide what they're in the mood for, Boon Docks literally has the answer, with a menu listing actually called Can't Decide? Pairing up two half-orders of your choice of bay scallops, oysters, catfish, or shrimp, this is one entrée that tops the charts of diner favorites, and you can have your selections fried or grilled. If steamed is more your style, they're sure to please your palate, offering steamer classics like shrimp, oysters, shrimp, crab claws, grouper, and even whole flounder seasoned with the perfect blend of spices to bring just enough kick to the pot.

It's apparent in everything that they do that Boon Docks isn't one to stay close to the shore, as their menu hardly relies on showmanship or overly fussy presentation. Theirs is a method more direct, seeing no use for distractions or tweezified plating. Here, they use simplicity as their guide, referring back to more classic, comforting preparations that so many have grown up on. Simple ingredients whose quality stands strongly on its own serve as the foundation. From there, the cooks who create the dishes and prepare everything from scratch bring out the vibrancy of the flavors simply by letting them shine, rather than masking them.

But the sea is not their only field of expertise. Tender steaks and juicy burgers tempt the tongue back to terra firma, and dinner salads satisfy suppertime hunger with fresh lettuce and crisp veggies topped off with cooked-toorder chicken and shrimp. And who could forget dessert? If sugar is your weakness, their homemade pies are a decadence that merits the indulgence, offering selections like French Coconut, Peanut Butter, and — of course — Key Lime. "It's hard to say which is the best," says Head. "They're all delicious!" Not that anyone would expect anything less from a restaurant so focused on creating comfort food.

"We serve quality here, and we enjoy what we do in getting to meet so many people and offering them great food," Head goes on. From appetizer to dessert, they're casting their nets wide — and the locals are lining up on the docks to come in and take a big bite.

Panama City hosts Warrior Dash where it's all about the slop

ud, sweat and beer. What could be more fun? In March, Panama City hosts the 5K Warrior Dash, an obstacle course with fire, rope challenges and swaths of mud, followed by plenty of revelry and suds. Thousands of runners and spectators are expected to convene for the down-and-dirty spectacle, which puts runners and climbers to the test and leaves them caked in mud and smiles.

The event, on March 10, is open to all spectators. There will be a lot to see, along with an all-day festival that features a DJ, beer, food and warrior games. The course has 12 specially designed obstacles, some of them classics that appear in Warrior Dashes around the country, plus three or four new ones.

Check these out: 🖖

>> BRIDGE THE GAP Stretch as tall as you can to reach the next plank. Summit the top of a pyramid.

>> MAGIC CARPET RIDE Cross a wobbling, slippery mat to get to the other side.

>> PALLET JACKED Traverse the swaying decks hovering above water.

>> FISHERMAN'S CATCH Cast your best line and make your way across without becoming bait.

>> TRENCHES Hit the deck and crawl 40 feet toward the light.

>> UPSLIDE DOWN Jump feet first into muddy waters and get ready to hoist yourself up and under the netting. From your back, use that upper body strength and leg muscles to pull yourself to freedom on the other side.

>> WARRIOR SUMMIT With the help of a rope, clamber up and repel back down a 30-foot pyramid.

>> ALCATRAZ Swim out to floating docks in the water, climb up and over, and then swim back to shore.

>> PIPELINE Climb up, over, and through a tube of kinked cargo nets 12 feet in the air.

>> WARRIOR ROAST Leap over real fire and then sprint through the final obstacles.

SOLIATH Summit two stories and take in the festival view before making a splash at the bottom of a 30-foothigh slide.

>> MUDDY MAYHEM Army-crawl under real barbed wire through a 100-foot-long mud pit.



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More than 3 million people around the nation consider this fun — epic fun, actually — and have completed Warrior Dash courses since 2009. The event marks its debut here on property known as SweetBay, a newly formed residential community in Panama City, Florida.

Warrior Dash participants can be as young as 10 years old, but there will also be a "kids course," which organizers describe as more of a kids activity area with age-appropriate obstacles.

"We encourage families with children to come out and make a day of it," said Michael Coco, Senior Director of Operations at Red Frog Events, based in Chicago, which runs Warrior Dash.

The first wave of competitors will begin at 8 a.m. The festival will close sometime between 4 p.m. and 5 p.m. Coco said the setting at SweetBay is perfect.

"It's near some big cities, and it's a destination of its own. We settled on SweetBay because it had the right mix of varied terrain and enough open space to have a killer festival area and enough space to park all the cars we're expecting," Coco said.

"It's a gorgeous piece of property out there," said Holly Pituch, SweetBay marketing manager. "We would love to see people come in and enjoy the area and enjoy the tourism in Panama City Beach and Panama City as well."

The Warrior Hangout festival for competitors and spectators will feature a live DJ, photo opportunities, lawn games and a lineup of contests including tug-owar, dancing, best beard and best costume. Shade and seating options are available.

This joint effort by the Panama City Beach Convention and Visitors Bureau and Destination Panama City figures to significantly boost awareness of the area.

"It's a big footprint for social media," said Chris O'Brien, director of sports marketing and special events for the Panama City Beach Convention and Visitors Bureau. Nicole Meagher of Red Frog said Warrior Dash has nearly 1.5 million followers on Facebook.

"We've never had anything like it in Panama City," said Jennifer Vigil, **WALL IN** By the time they get to the finish line, most "Warriors" find that they have left it all on the course. The event comes to Panama City for the first time in March.

president and CEO of Destination Panama City. "There are some people who have their bucket list: 'I want to do a race in every state.' It's healthy, it's family friendly, it promotes tourism ... it's an allaround win situation. RUNAWAY ISLAND

Making their Maryland-style cakes with only the minimal amount of fillers, the luscious lumps of blue crabmeat at Runaway Island are prepared a la minute and formed into patties mere seconds before they're oven baked, adding only the lightest touch of mayo and Old Bay seasoning to play up the sweetness of the meat and serving them up with a housemade lemon caper mustard sauce whose acidic bite brings out the inherent essence of the crab. Philip Griffitts Sr. and son Philip "Griff" Griffitts Jr. share love of Panama City Beach

"My dad is my work ethic." GRIFF GRIFFITTS

A lmost five decades have passed since Bay County Commissioner Philip "Griff" Griffitts Jr. first laid eyes on the sugar-white sands and emerald green waves of Panama City Beach. As a little boy he was awestruck, and today, he's every bit as smitten.

Whenever possible, he rearranges his packed schedule to enjoy his favorite place — sometimes even hitting the waves or casting for redfish before heading in to work.

"I love Panama City Beach," he says. "I love to fish. I love to golf. I love to surf. If I could do all three of those in one day, it'd be like Christmas Day for me!"

That love is something of a legacy for Griff, whose father, Philip Griffitts Sr., has owned and operated multiple beach hotels since the early 1970s and also served as mayor of Panama City Beach from 1989 to 2000. Philip and his wife, Jerrilyn, started with the tiny Bel-Mar Court, a beachfront property with 13 rental units, and eventually replaced it with the Sugar Sands Inn & Suites.

"The only employees were me and Jerrilyn, and she carried Griff around in a front pack or backpack," Philip recalls. "She cleaned the rooms, and I ran the front desk and did the maintenance." From a young age, Griff saw his parents work as a team to build a thriving business from the ground up. He watched them invest money, time and energy into improving their local community — all with the hope of keeping the beach as beautiful as it is profitable.

Today, Griff walks a similar path, having previously run the Sugar Sands Inn until mid-January while also representing District 5, which covers all of Panama City Beach from the Hathaway Bridge to the county line and a portion of Shell Island. He and his wife, Laura, also a native of Bay County, have two daughters — Katie and Anna Claire — and make their home on Panama City Beach.

"I don't know why anybody would want to go anywhere else," Griff says.

No Sitting Back

Although Philip admits to looking over his son's shoulder every now and then, he's proud of Griff's accomplishments.

"He's a smart man," Philip says. "I don't really have to give him much advice. ... He always does his homework."

Griff certainly did just that a few years ago when then-Bay County Commissioner Mike Thomas urged him to run for his soon-to-be-open District 5 seat.

"I decided to run about 14 months before the election, and I attended every commission meeting for those 14 months," says Griff, who also served six years on the Panama City Beach Civil Service Board and nine years on the Bay County Planning Commission. "I like being prepared. I hate feeling caught off guard." Now almost two years into his term, he likens the role of county commissioner to being a new parent.

"I don't know if you can ever be prepared!" laughs Griff, who also sits on the Bay County Tourist Development Council and the Bay Medical Sacred Heart Board of Trustees. "People just don't realize how much goes on behind the scenes in county government. They don't realize how the county employees work their butts off to make things better for Bay County."

For Griff, who was 12 when his dad was first elected mayor, politics was never a goal.

"It was tough," he recalls. "Everybody knew me, I didn't know them. I had 100,000 tattle tales out there. ... Every time I walked in the door, my dad already knew what I did!"

But he's grateful for his father's public service because it taught him a valuable life lesson — one he hopes his daughters will learn from watching him. "If you want to make your home better, you have to get involved," Griff says. "You can't sit back and let everyone else make the decisions."

'A Totally Different Time'

When father and son talk about Panama City Beach, it's clear Philip remembers a vastly different beach town. It was the early 1970s, and he and Jerrilyn lived at the Bel-Mar with a 2-year-old Griff.

"He grew up knowing all the guests," Philip says. "He stayed in the pool so much that his hair was almost orange from the chlorine! We had so many repeat customers who would come, and the first thing their kids wanted to know was where Griff was. He would eat with them and go to Miracle Strip with them. We were all family out there."

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In those days, Front Beach Road had few high-rises, more sand dunes and far fewer tourists.

Philip and Jerrilyn worked hard every day of the summer, right up until the last few tourists drove away.

"Come Labor Day, we played!" Philip says. "We'd take our jeeps and trucks down on Seagrove. There was nothing out there, maybe one condo or one house. The kids would play and swim and we'd ride the sand dunes. ... It was a totally different time."

Today Griff looks back on his parents' early start with pride because it's what taught him the value of hard work.

"When you lived at the hotel like we did, my mom and dad were working, and I was out swimming," he says. "Then as I got older, I was sweeping and changing garbage cans and cleaning toilets. I've done every job at the hotel. There's not one I haven't done."

As Panama City Beach grew, the Griffitts family expanded the Sugar Sands, bought, renovated and sold the Islander hotel and also built the La Quinta Inn & Suites at Pier Park, which is run by their younger son, Matt.

"I learned from Dad that being in

small business, when you run into a problem, if you just sit down and, you know, pout, you're going to go out of business," Griff says. "You better figure out how to crawl over that wall or dig under it or go through it because if you sit down, you're broke. ... My dad is my work ethic."

Working Together

During Philip's 18 years in public office, Panama City Beach experienced significant growth, but what he's most proud of is joining forces with other public officials to make residents' lives better.

"After Hurricane Opal, we jumped right in there," he says. "We didn't wait. We had bulldozers and tractors on the highway the next morning cleaning the highway. We were very sensitive to the residents' needs and to the businesses' needs."

Another accomplishment was the expansion of Back Beach Road.

"I went to the transportation planning group, as a member, and I told them, '... Let's do this. Let's write down what we think are the most important roads that need work on them. And let's be serious about this!" Philip recalls. "And we all agreed that (Highway) 231 was No. 1 and Back Beach Road was No. 2. And within about a year, we were fourlaning Back Beach Road."

Local government always worked best, he says, when officials found common ground for the greater good.

"I tried to get everybody to work together," Philip says. "I don't like fighting and feuding, and I give and take."

Griff says he tries to emulate his father's ability to address problems quickly and build consensus.

"The lucky with our board," he says. "The four other commissioners and we have a huge mutual respect for each other. ... I know if I had to work with four guys who were always fighting, it wouldn't be fun. And I have fun."


As he helps lead Bay County into the future, Griff says he's hopeful and determined to be a good tax steward for citizens.

"I think we're at the tip of the spear," he says. "We have GKN Aerospace setting their footprint here. We have our new airport that was built seven years ago. Our port is expanding rapidly. We are really in a good spot. Our infrastructure is nice, and we have room for growth. I think we are ready to just plow into the future."

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
Together, we can keep our beaches pristine

PANAMA CITY BEACH is known for having the "World's Most Beautiful Beaches," and we would like to keep it that way for the enjoyment of locals and tourists alike! For this reason, the "Leave No Trace" ordinance was adopted in 2012. Anything you bring to the beach should also leave the beach with you. Anything left on the beach overnight could be cleared off the beach by the time you return in the morning. Our goal is to protect our pristine beaches and the natural wildlife, such as nesting sea turtles, by leaving no trace of personal items on the beaches overnight. Please do your part in maintaining our beautiful beaches!

The "Leave No Trace" ordinance states that all personal items will be removed and disposed of if left on the beach between the hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. These items include, but are not limited to, tents, chairs, toys, umbrellas and coolers. On public beaches or with the upland landowner's permission, beachgoers may store personal belongings overnight at the toe of the dune. The toe of the dune is the area of the beach immediately seaward of the dune and beach vegetation. To be specific, it is the area of the beach that is furthest from the water that is not in a sand dune or beach access point.

Those who store their personal items overnight do so at their own risk. The county, the city, the Tourist Development Council and the beach maintenance contractor do not assume any liability for any items left on the beach.

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

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


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


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
