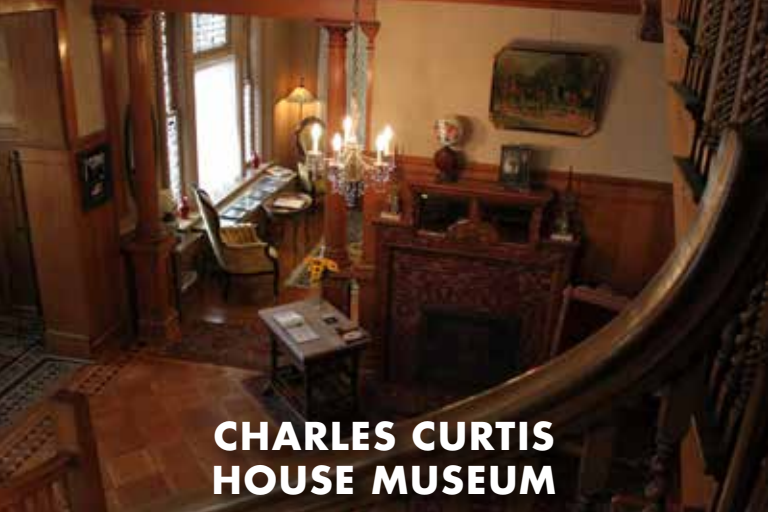

A MAN MADE HISTORY

Charles Curtis was the 31st Vice President of the United States, serving from 1929 to 1933 with President Herbert Hoover. Curtis also held a seat in the House of Representative from 1893 to 1907 and served as a Senator from 1907 to 1929. Curtis, who was of Kaw decent, was raised both in Topeka and on the Kaw reservation near Council Grove. He was the first Native American to hold the office, the first vice president from west of the Mississippi River and the first vice president from the State of Kansas. This is the official address Curtis used all the years he was in public service. Hear his story as you explore the home, filled with personal and period artifacts.
