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Food banks see 'major' rise in demand

ocal food banks are reporting a "major" increase in demand, particularly among working residents who have never relied on them before.

At the same time, more fortunate residents are finding themselves with less spare income to donate, forcing some charities to scale back services.

In July, Waltham Forest Council cabinet member Vicky Ashworth said more than 11,000 residents were regularly using local food banks, calling it an "absolute travesty".

However, multiple food banks told the *Echo* they have seen numbers grow in recent months and expect things to get even worse as winter continues. Syed Shafi, from the Cann Hall Masjid food bank, said the number of families they support had "nearly doubled" in the last three months, adding: "We're definitely seeing people that weren't struggling before.

"I don't think it's going to get less soon, I think it will increase, and that's definitely not good, it's worrying.

"In the last two months, we also helped a couple of families with young kids who didn't have basic things like beds, freezers or tables. It's so sad seeing people in this country, our local people, suffering like this."

Tracy Rogers from Highams Park Food Aid said a decline in donations had left the charity "juggling balls in the air" and forced to make difficult decisions about how to best use their limited funds.

While they have gone from supporting around 50 families at the start of this year to about 80 last month, she noted this was after taking 20 families off the register temporarily to ensure they could support them this month.

Tracy told the *Echo*: "It's very difficult to make a judgement on whether somebody needs it or not and how long they need it for. We're having to look at demand and try to get people coming every other week and see if they can cope without.

"We have been getting at least four walk-ins a day and we've had ten new referrals in the last two to three weeks.

"There's very little help and support in the north of the borough because of the perception that the area is well-off but that's just not the case. We still have pockets where people are really struggling."

At Rukhsana Khan Foundation food bank, one of the borough's largest, the line on some Saturdays "reaches out to the end of the road", according to founder Jahangir Khan.

The foundation now supports up to 125 families in just two hours every Saturday, whereas at the start of this year it would have seen around 100 and, prepandemic, only 50.

Jahangir said: "What's happening now is that it's not just people on benefits but people in what you would class as good jobs, who are finding it hard to make ends meet.

"They have never needed to use a food bank and are now feeling that they need to so they can put that money towards their energy bills."

Jahangir added that, while the support from the community and the council has been "fantastic", a lack of funding had still forced the charity to stop offering weekly hot meals earlier this year.

He said: "Our costs went up because of the price of food and, after Covid, our donations dropped by around 90% pretty rapidly.

"People are struggling now and the first thing they cut back on is donations, which is understandable because the first thing you have to look out for is yourself and your family.

"But the community has been really good in supporting local organisations and that support should not diminish, especially over the coming months. It's going to be a very difficult period." FELLOWSHIP IS LIFE



Shift to fortnightly rubbish collection proposed

Tousehold rubbish collections could move from veekly to fortnightly in an effort to make residents recycle more.

The proposal is part of the council's draft recycling strategy, which aims to improve the borough's recycling rate from 32% to 50% by 2030.

At a climate scrutiny committee meeting on 16th November, deputy leader Clyde Loakes said halving collections would force residents to "make better use" of their recycling bins.

He told councillors: "This isn't a new thing in terms of local government – it's the norm now to

According to the draft strategy, households with "six or more inhabitants" or specific medical needs would be eligible to receive a larger black bin.

The proposals would also not affect homes above shops or on estates, which have separate waste collection arrangements.

Last month, the Echo reported that almost 2,000 rubbish collections were missed in July due to staffing shortages at the council's waste collection contractor Urbaser.

Urbaser is currently in an ongoing dispute with workers, who are threatening to strike unless their demands for paid sick leave and

Maternity unit has too few staff to 'ensure patient safety'

String of swan attacks at Wetlands

Police are investigating after a string of attacks on swans at Walthamstow Wetlands.

In a statement on 3rd November, local police said a swan had been found with "significant facial and neck injuries... likely caused by ball bearings fired from a weapon".

At least four other swans are thought to have been injured in a similar way in recent months, according to a spokesperson from London Wildlife Trust, which manages the nature reserve.

On 30th September, London Wildlife Trust received reports of two other swans seemingly injured with a slingshot and, three days later, found a third swan dead.

Speaking at the time, the spokesperson said it was the second such incident this year.

They added: "Such incidents are very distressing for our visitors, volunteers and staff. The incident has been reported to the Metropolitan Police Wildlife Crime Unit.

"We urge visitors at our reserves to continue to report such incidents, while taking care not to put themselves at risk."

Anyone with information is asked to call police on 101, quoting the crime reference number 2903 29/10/2022.

Proposed site for new lido revealed

new lido, promised in Waltham Forest Labour's election manifesto earlier this year, is being planned "in the heart of the borough".

On 22nd November, Waltham Forest Council announced that, after a "comprehensive search to find the most suitable place", their preferred location is Low Hall

The lido is part of a "vision to create a health and wellbeing hub", building on the ground's existing sport facilities.

Metropolitan Open Land, meaning the council must demonstrate there are "special circumstances" to justify building on it.

'Opening a new lido in Waltham Forest was one of our manifesto commitments and I'm happy to see we've now got a preferred site at Low Hall

"Our ambition is to create a new health and leisure hub that will give a huge boost to the local economy as well as the potential new lido.

"If the project is approved, we will work with all sports clubs currently using Low Hall to ensure the current facilities are maintained and enhanced.

"We are determined to bring local people who use the current site with us if our vision for a new lido in the borough progresses.

"We hope to ensure everyone has the opportunity to enjoy outdoor swimming in the future.³

The announcement came during a fundraising campaign by a group of volunteers, aiming to create East London's version of Hampstead Heath swimming ponds in Leyton.

The East London Waterworks Park (ELWP) team hope to raise £3million to buy land opposite the Lee Valley Ice Centre and transform it into a "brownfield rainforest". Responding to a request for comment, ELWP chairman Abigail Woodman noted access to their proposed swimming ponds would be free, adding: "We are extremely proud of the widespread support the project has received so far, and that includes support from Waltham Forest Council. We will continue to raise money and develop the idea, and look forward to welcoming everyone to | cil leaders had discounted a possible location | at a meeting on 1st December.



the park in the future."

According to a council press release, Low Hall was chosen due to "its position at the centre of the borough, its excellent public transport and cycling links and its existing sports facilities"

The proposed lido would form part of a "nature trail for Lea Bridge", connecting the nature reserve on the grounds to Walthamstow Marshes and the wetlands.

The release adds that the surrounding neighbourhood "is a significant growth area in the borough", where it hopes to see new homes built, and that consultation with existing residents "showed a lack of leisure facilities was one of residents' main concerns".

Responding to the news, Conservative group leader Emma Best said her party were "disappointed but not surprised" that counin the north of the borough.

She said: "It is galling to see the Larkswood site, with its historic lido links, was [partly] discounted because there was insufficient public transport, walking and cycling infrastructure.

"Yet, simultaneously this council is arguing it is acceptable to overdevelop the same site with towering blocks without parking because there are 'good public transport links'.

"In terms of the Low Hall site selected, the proposal thus far poses more questions than it answers in terms of feasibility of delivery and impact. As a group we will be evaluating this further in order to provide helpful scrutiny as this proposal progresses."

A report seeking to "proceed with the vision and preferred location" for the lido will be put to council leaders for approval

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

Despite being introduced as a crisis management measure, the hub is now a "business-as-usual model" and discharged 8,721 patients in the first nine months of this year, mostly to their own homes.

In theory, patients being sent home are first cared for by a "bridging" team, tasked with providing care and ensuring equipment like grab rails or bathroom aids is installed. However, at a Waltham Forest Council meeting last month, Terry Day from Waltham Forest Age UK highlighted three cases involving elderly people the charity supports where this did not happen.

She added: "The key thing is that care providers don't take on people they can't provide for and it's important that we don't release them until they're ready."

NHS North East London hopes to reduce the demand for Whipps Cross Hospital beds, despite a growing local population, by improving community care.

It is so confident that this is achievable that plans for the new hospital originally suggested a reduction in beds, before public outrage forced an apparent U-turn.

The discharge hub team has now listed actions to improve its system, including a review of planning, welfare checks and taking a "patient voice" approach.

Councillors at the meeting recommended a next-day welfare call be made to all discharged patients and agreed to scrutinise "continence arrangements" during home care at a future meeting.

Following the meeting, Terry told the Local Democracy Reporting Service: "I was glad to see the powers that be are taking this issue seriously and I very much hope things will improve."

Local areas raided most by Home Office in lockdown

ore immigration raids were carried out in Walthamstow and Leyton postcodes during the pandemic than anywhere else in London, new data reveals.

The Waltham Forest branch of the Anti-Raids Network told the Echo pre-pandemic figures show the borough's Romanian and Bulgarian residents were most likely to be

Walthamstow Central Station that saw eight arrested last October.

The Home Office has repeatedly refused to respond to Transport for London's insistence that this operation on its property was "unauthorised" or to confirm if any of the eight people were ever charged.

Speaking anonymously, a spokesperson from Waltham Forest Anti-Raids Network said raids may be more frequent locally due to a "culture of collaboration" between the Home Office and employers, landlords and other organisations

They said: "Shops and takeaways are raided a lot and these businesses are asked to hand over lists of their staff, including addresses.

"Employers in general are not legally obliged to cooperate but they're liable for a £20,000 fine per illegal worker found, which can be reduced for cooperating or

"Landlords and councils are also given financial incentives to not just cooperate with the Home Office but actively report people to them.'

Leaked emails from November last year, seen by the *Echo*, show Waltham Forest Council workers arranging a joint visit to a chicken shop in Leyton with the Home Office.

The Anti-Raids Network spokesperson added: "Immigration law is increasingly murky territory and subject to delays, which means people might be legal one day and not the next.

"But the law is not impartial or necessarily just, it belongs to powerful people and we all only have certain rights because people fought for them.

"People already want to keep their communities intact - they don't want their neighbours to get arrested or for children to live without their dad because he was taken away economic future for their families."

The enforcement outside Walthamstow Central Station on 13th October last year attracted widespread condemnation from the community, with local MP Stella Creasy calling it "a waste of resources" and "deeply divisive".

While it remains unclear whether any of the people arrested had broken the law, WF Anti-Raids was keen to emphasise that their "solidarity is not conditional".

The spokesperson said: "We believe that people should be free to live where they want, no matter their financial status or where they were born.

A week in the life of: an architectural designer

The weekly diary of Nicole Fassihi from the Waltham Forest Business Network



rafted is a new architect-led design tudio, inspired by Walthamstow's tradition of makers and creators. My partner Lemma and I decided to start our own company after the birth of our daughter – it might not mean

plan the hours we work around her. The start of most weeks is currently spent in Norwich, working on a kitchen extension and ground floor renovation. Our typical Monday will be spent briefing tradespeople on tasks for the week ahead and running through fabric working less hours but it does mean we can swatches or paint samples with our clients.

Tuesday is our regular day on-site together so it's the best day to get big things done. Some of the details in our current design such as the red-pigmented concrete footings - are totally bespoke so we are producing them in-house to achieve the shape, colour and finish we want. This means recently we've spent a lot of time assembling moulds and pouring concrete; with over 70 individual elements, we have a lot to get through!

On Tuesday night, I head back to Walthamstow so I can take our daughter to nursery, meaning Wednesday and Thursday are my working from home days, where I get most of the finance and admin done. At Grafted, we act as both the architect and the contractor, meaning we don't have to worry about the design being compromised based on what is easiest or cheapest, while still working within the budget agreed with the client. I manage the money carefully and spend a lot of time researching to find the best people, materials and products for the job.

As well as bigger architectural projects, we also design, fabricate and install fitted furniture. The first step for these smaller projects is always a consultation to find out what our client wants and how the furniture would fit into the rest of the home. Once we have the measurements, Lemma presents different designs and a shortlist of materials and finishes to choose from.

When it is time to make the furniture, we head to the workshop. Lemma programmes and operates the machine that cuts out our design and, depending on the desired finish, I sand and oil or paint the wood. Once it's done, we'll install it together.

Alleged lake rapist denies crimes

Highams Park Lake will face trial next year after denying the crimes.

ne man accused of raping and | attacked in the park surrounding the lake exually assaulting two girls near at some point between 4.30pm and 8.45pm.

Two days later, police arrested Navden Nastov, a 38-year-old from Moss Hall Grove On 7th August, two teenage girls contacted in Finchley, who was later charged with rape police at around 9.30pm, reporting they were | and assault by penetration.

Nastov first appeared at Thames Magisrates' Court on 10th August and was refused bail at Snaresbrook Crown Court on 11th August.

After his original plea hearing was adjourned, Nastov finally appeared again at Snaresbrook Crown Court on 1st November and submitted "not guilty" plea to both offences.

He is due to face trial next September, with he court battle expected to last four days.

The crime has caused significant concerns about women's safety in the area, leading to a meeting with local police last month, chaired by Chingford MP Sir Iain Duncan Smith.

One resident – who asked not to be named told police: "I've lived here all my life and expect muggings but I don't expect to hear about rapes or attempted rapes.

"I've got teenage girls - I don't want them o go out but I have to let them - so I want to know what level of service we can expect from police.'

Residents were promised that they "will see an increase in police presence" but that, despite a recent "influx" of new officers, numbers were still not where they "need to be".

Rape and sexual assault reported at refugee hotel

The young man accused of forcibly kissing a child appeared in court on 9th November but the hearing was adjourned to allow for an assessment of his age, necessary to decide whether he should be tried as an adult.

'Sordid' sex offender assaulted sleeping woman

The victim was travelling home in the early hours of 29th September in 2019 when she fell asleep on the Victoria Line.

When she woke up, she found Michal Piczak, a 31-year-old from Station Road in Walthamstow, stroking her unconscious body.

Following an investigation by the British Transport Police, Piczak was found guilty by a jury at Inner London Crown Court.


In a statement on 9th November, Detective Constable Ibrar Ahmed said: "Piczak is a sordid sex offender who targeted a lone woman as she slept and subjected her to a prolonged sexual assault.

"His jail term sends out a clear message to anyone who exhibits this type of behaviour on the railway – we will catch you and bring you to justice without exception.

"If you are a victim of, or witness to, any form of sexual offending on the railway, please report it to us by texting 61016 or calling 0800 40 50 40. Always dial 999 if you're in immediate danger."

CCTV footage captured Piczak reaching over the train carriage aisle to touch the sleeping woman before moving next to her and stroking her legs.

He will spend a decade on the sex offenders register.

Almost all private rents unaffordable on benefits

Credit Patrick Robert Dovle/Unsplash regeneration Ahsan Khan said the research demonstrates an issue the council has been raising "for years": that the support they receive from the government is "not enough" to help families facing rising house prices and increasing demand.

He added: "It is also clear that Local Housing Allowances and benefits should be raised in line with housing costs and inflation. It is a national scandal that families

support networks are based.

"We urgently need more assistance, not just to build more homes for social rent but also to make sure we can provide a safety net for those in most need - especially as the cost of living crisis intensifies this winter."

The Bureau's analysis looked at 349 properties advertised in outer North East London – an area covering Chingford and much of Redbridge, Barking and Dagenham and Havering - and found only ten affordable using LHA alone.

Within the outer East London area – which includes Walthamstow, Leyton and Levtonstone – an analysis of 410 properties found 98.5% were unaffordable using only LHA.

Polly Neate, chief executive of Shelter, said: "Housing benefit should be the safety net that stops people becoming homeless but it's frozen at 2020 levels, leaving renters desperately trying to make up the shortfall. "Now, record-high private rents and rocketing prices are leaving even more renters fighting to keep a roof over their heads. The housing emergency is at the core of the cost-of-living crisis but it is being ignored."

When approached to comment, a government spokesperson said: "During the pandemic we increased Local Housing Allowance significantly and bevond inflation, benefiting over one million households by an average of over £600 over the year. We're maintaining that boost, keeping support for private renters above prepandemic levels.

"We recognise people are facing pressures with the cost of living, which is why we have taken action through our £37billion support package to help households with rising costs, including £1,200 this year for the most vulnerable."

They added that Waltham Forest Council will receive £5,493,727 this financial year in homelessness prevention grants.

Leyton cinema flats approved

lans to pack 83 flats onto a "compressed" former cinema site in Leyton won unanimous approval from councillors last month.

Waltham Forest Council's planning committee approved plans for two blocks - five and six storeys high - at the former Ritz Cinema in High Road, Leyton, on 1st November.

The cinema was built in 1938 but closed in 1979. Its auditorium was used as office space for many years but, due to its "deteriorating condition", has been empty since 2020.

Although not listed, its distinctive Art Deco-style façade is considered "something of a local landmark" and will be preserved, albeit with a five-storey block rising behind it.

This attracted criticism from the Council for British Archaeology, who argued the plan "totally fails to respect the architectural design".

One in 75 local homes lying empty

ne in every 75 Waltham Forest nomes is currently "empty", according to the Action on Empty Homes campaign.

Last month, based on figures released by the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, the campaign group released their annual analysis of the UK's empty homes.

In Waltham Forest, they found 1,007 homes have been lying empty "long-term" this year, a slight decrease from last year's figure of 1,118.

The borough also saw a drop in the number of second homes in the borough, from 520 to 441, meaning there are a total of 1,448 local homes not in regular use.

The borough ranks 18th in London for the number of "long-term empty homes", not including second homes.

Southwark is by far the borough with the most empty homes, with 2,431 recorded this year, while Wandsworth has the least, with only 191.

Rare black swan dies from bird flu ne of Leytonstone's

most famous feathered residents died from bird flu last month amid a seemingly unprecedented outbreak.

licly to Facebook, one resident wrote: "He was a fabulous and sassy swan and I know everyone loved him. He will be sadly missed.

Tribute paid to 'interesting local character' killed by fire

she was killed by a tragic fire. Sandra Lee died in hospital on 26th October, a few weeks before her 79th birthday, after suffering serious burns.

Her cousin, Mark Hough, told the *Echo* the smoke alarm in her room at retirement home Verdon Roe Court went off shortly before 3pm that day when her polyester dress caught fire.

Staff raced into the room with bowls of water to douse the flames and "did everything they could" to save her but sadly her injuries proved fatal.

Mark said locals are likely to recognise Sandra as the woman who "always wore a cowboy hat", adding the family found "about 50" hats in her flat.

He said: "She was just one of those people who liked to sit on a park bench watching the world go by. She was very, very, very friendly, especially when she'd to an inquest, which is ongoing.

In her younger years, Sandra worked at Butlers Retreat and at the Greene Man pub, also doing "a little bit of what you might call unlicensed market trading".

Mark added: "She sometimes got arrested but, when she got into a bit of mischief with the police, it was almost in a jokey way. She was the sort of character they used to call harmless.'

Sandra's mother was also well-known locally and appears briefly in a novel by Lena Kennedy, an author famous for writing about the East End.

In the novel Autumn Alley, he said: "There's a mention of a character who used to sit on the windowsill down by the pre-fabs in Lea Bridge Road drinking a bottle of gin, wearing a hat and a red dress. From the description, it was my aunt.'
