


Abnormal Results



'Who is following up abnormal results?'

- **Coroner's Report:** A patient presented to the ED with an episode of disturbed speech. A CT head showed some <u>suspicious lesions.</u>
- The patient declined admission but <u>agreed</u> to investigations as an <u>outpatient</u>.
- The outpatient investigations <u>were not</u> booked and the patient <u>died</u> 3 weeks later.
- Although the lack of further investigations did not contribute to the death, the Coroner raised concerns about <u>follow up</u> arrangements for patients who are <u>discharged</u> from the ED but need <u>urgent follow up</u>.

- It is important that actions are taken and patients get the follow up that they need.
- The ordering clinician is ultimately responsible for the patient and resulting actions (GMC).



 It is important to have clear and robust systems for arranging follow up investigations and appointments.
