Hot Food for the NHS Campaign

Previous EMTA surveys showed that access to hot food, especially out of hours, is limited for many EM trainees. Only 5-12% of trainees reported being able to access hot food24/7 in the last three surveys. Something as simple as this makes a real difference and a recent campaign has shined a light on this.
