The Walton Base Incident

Scene 1

Walton Base, the Arctic. The not-too-distant future.

DOCTOR MONROE RAIN and DOCTOR QUINN CARSETTE are sat together. Monroe is making notes on two different maps of the Arctic region. Quinn is looking through a large file containing various graphs and equations. They are both absorbed in their own work- This is the preset. After the audience have entered. The two doctors sit in silence for a moment. Then:

QUINN

Have you read this?

MONROE

No.

QUINN

You should.

MONROE

When I have time.

QUINN

It's very good.

MONROE

I've heard.

OUINN

Very relevant, to, you know, what we do here.

MONROE

I'm sure.

QUINN

You'll read it.

MONROE

Yes.

QUINN

You should read it.

MONROE

I know. Sorry. I know.

Beat

QUINN

Anything?

MONROE

Nothing new.

QUINN

Never anything new.

MONROE

Well, sometimes. That Inuit village.

QUINN That was new, I suppose. MONROE Another one for the list. QUINN There's a list?

MONROE

Yes. For human rights... things, I think.

OLIININ

Oh, sorry. No, I thought you meant a, a, list of new/things

MONROE

No, no, sorry.

QUINN

Sorry.

MONROE

Yes.

Beat

MONROE

No, they- somebody keeps a list of all the Inuit locations which have melted.

QUINN

Right.

MONROEs

All the native locations. I mean, all the locations with, historical, or, er, spiritual importance.

QUINN

Right.

MONROE

They keep a list of them. Obviously, up here it's the most direct, but all the... yes.

QUINN

Right.

MONROE

All the locations around the world. Because, obviously, the flooding-

QUINN

Right, the flooding.

MONROE

It's not just here. The ice melts, destroying one village here, and the water from that melted ice floods another village somewhere in the global south. So they keep a record of all of them. All the villages. So there's a list.

QUINN

Why?

MONROE

Well. I don't know. So we know what we've lost, I guess.

QUINN

And reparations, I suppose.

MONROE

Sorry?

QUINN

In case one of the indigenous groups sue. So we know what was lost, for reparations.

MONROE

Right. Yes, probably. Yes.

QUINN

When's the next supply plane coming?

MONROE

Only a couple of weeks. It'll bring the new team as well, for the summer. New folks!

QUINN

Exciting. God, I hope they're nice.

MONROE

They'll all have had to go through an evaluation first, I'm sure they'll all be perfectly lovely. It'll be good to have enough people to really pick things up again, though.

QUINN

I don't know. Certain benefits to being part of a skeleton crew.

MONROE

Like what?

QUINN

You've got more freedom. And more space.

MONROE

I don't know. I like it when it's crowded. After all, it's not like we're lacking for space out there, is it? An agoraphobic's nightmare.

QUINN

You can say that again.

MONROE

An agoraphobic's nightmare.

QUINN

Very funny.

But it is, a bit. She can't help but smile.

MONROE

"I coulda been a comedian."

QUINN

What?

MONROE

"I coulda been a comedian."

QUINN

What?

MONROE

Like Marlon Brando? You know, Marlon Brando in *On The Waterfront*? "I could have been a contender." Like that, but only instead of contender I/ said comedian.

QUINN

Said comedian, oh my god you absolute nerd.

MONROE

I have doctorate in climatology of course I'm a nerd.

The lights flicker.

QUINN

What was that?

MONROE

I don't know. Generator?

QUINN

Could be. Do you want me to go out and check?

MONROF

Might be worth it. No- Could just be a bit of random fluctuation. If it happens again then you can go out.

QUINN

Okay. Okay,

MONROE

Couple more weeks and then we'll be surrounded by people, don't worry.

QUINN

I know. I know.

Beat

QUINN

Franklin Base said they saw him.

MONROE

Not this again.

QUINN

I just think it's interesting.

MONROE

You shouldn't... You scare yourself.

QUINN

I'm fine.

MONROE

Maybe. Maybe right now you're fine,

QUINN

What does that mean?

MONROE With your condition-
QUINN My condition? What condition is that?
Beat
MONROE You know what I meant. I didn't mean-
QUINN Go ahead. Say it.
MONROE I'm meant to be looking after you.
QUINN Because?
MONROE Because you're fragile-
QUINN Because I barely scraped through my psych evaluation, is that it?
MONROE That's not a fair-
QUINN I'm not your bloody lab rat! I have a PhD! I can be treated like an adult, you know, I can.
Beat
MONROE I'm sorry.
QUINN Sure you are.
MONROE I just don't want you to get hurt, that's all. That's all any of us want.
QUINN I know. But you have to treat me like a person, not a bomb waiting to go off.
Beat
MONROE I'm sorry. I know.
Beat
QUINN What was I saying?
Beat
MONROE

You were talking about the two figures. Franklin Base.

QUINN

Right. Franklin Base. Franklin Base said they'd seen two figures pass by in the distance within about three hours of each other.

MONROE

Let me guess, one was about the size of a normal man and he was on a dogsled, and the other...

QUINN

The other. The other was an enormous figure, at least eight feet tall, walking through the snow in rags.

Beat

QUINN

Franklin Base are proper scientists. Not tourists, not indigenous people, not hunters. Proper. Scientists. How do you explain that?

MONROE

Did they get any pictures of these two people?

QUINN

It was all blurred, they were too far away and moving too fast.

MONROE

What a surprise.

QUINN

Don't you at least think it's compelling?

MONROE

No, I think it's a weird arctic urban legend you've become obsessed with because you'd rather imagine there was some strange monster out in the ice then the truth.

QUINN

And what is the truth?

MONROE

That we are utterly, totally, alone. Even the people on the ISS have a more substantial connection to civilisation then we do. The truth is that the world doesn't need monsters to be terrifying, Quinn. The world's plenty terrifying as it is. The cold out there would freeze you to death in an instant if you didn't wear these absurd protective clothes. The wind would draw blood. The ice could swallow you whole. You don't need a monster to kill you, Quinn. The snow does that all by itself.

The lights flicker again.

MONROE

Something must have broken in the generator. Maybe a wire came loose.

QUINN

It's not that windy, surely?

MONROE

Well, you'd think not, and yet...

QUINN

What do we do?

MONROE I'll have to go out and fix the generator.
QUINN Out?
MONROE Outside.
QUINN Right.
MONROE I won't be long.
QUINN No.
MONROE I won't.
QUINN No.
MONROE So you'll be okay.
QUINN I've got a PhD. I think I can be left alone for five minutes while the grown-up fixes the fuse box.
MONROE It's a lot more complicated then a fuse box.
QUINN I really don't care.
MONROE I know.
QUINN And I'm assuming there's nothing I can say to persuade you to let me be the one to go out?
Beat
QUINN Right. Fine. Right.
MONROE Where's the communicator?
Quinn passes a communicator to Monroe and starts to set up a microphone. Monroe is getting into their protective clothes.

No problem. Call in if you need any help.

MONROE

MONROE Thanks.

I can handle a temperamental generator on my own, Quinn.

QUINN

Sure.

MONROE

I'm just going outside. I may be gone for sometime time.

OUINN

What?

MONROE

Nothing. Don't worry about it.

Okay.

QUINN

Okay.

MONROE goes to the metal "airlock" door, and unlocks it. They step through, and close it behind themself. Quinn stays stock still and watches. They stay there as we hear the sounds of a second door being opened, a rush of wind, and then the door being closed. Quinn waits a second longer, then switches the microphone on. When Monroe talks their voice comes through the speakers.

QUINN

Monroe, how are you doing?

MONROE

I only just came outside, Quinn.

QUINN

I know. Sorry. I just wanted to check.

Beat

MONROE

I'm just getting to the generator now.

QUINN

Okay, call in if you want any support.

Beat

MONROE

Quinn can you check the wind speed for me?

QUINN

Sure, why?

MONROE

Just checking.

QUINN

It doesn't look like the wind speed is anything above average.

MONROE

Okay. Weird. Did Russel Base say anything about any polar bears seen in the area in their report?

QUINN

No, there shouldn't be any here, not at this time of year. Why? What's wrong?

MONROE

Just looking at the generator and it hasn't just been broken, it's been torn bits. I don't know if the wind could do that unless it hit a pretty high speed.

QUINN

Maybe some machinery got blown into it?

MONROE

That's possible. I'll have a look out here see if I can see anything and then I'll come back in and get a set of spare wires. I thought I'd just have to re-connect a couple of them, but this whole lot need replacing.

QUINN

Roger that Monroe.

MONROE

Quinn.

QUINN

Yes?

MONROE

What direction- Nothing.

QUINN

Sorry?

MONROE

What size shoe do you wear?

QUINN

I'm a five.

MONROE

Okay.

QUINN

Monroe, I don't see the relevance.

MONROE

When were you last out here?

QUINN

Yesterday.

MONROE

Did you- Quinn, did you see any footprints while you were out here yesterday?

Beat

QUINN

Footprints?

MONROE

Yes, Quinn, footprints-

Beat

QUINN

What is it Monroe?

MONROE

Why have you come outside?

QUINN

What?

MONROE

I told you to stay inside, why'd you come out?

QUINN

Monroe. I'm talking to you via the base's microphone, aren't I? How could I be using the microphone if I was out there? Even if I'd taken another communicator you'd be able to see me using it, wouldn't you? You'd see it in my hand. I'm not out there, Monroe

MONROE

But-There's someone out here with me. There's someone- If it's not you-

QUINN

Monroe? Monroe? Monroe?
