TAIKOZ AADYA: TSUBASA HORI & THE WOMEN OF TAIKOZ Composition Competition Information about Instrumentation and Stylistic Forms

Duration of the composition should be at least 5 minutes and no longer than 6 minutes.

It should be composed for four players, and in the case of the premiere performances of the winning entry the following Taikoz members (at the time of writing) will perform your work:

Kerryn Joyce Sophia Ang Sophie Unsen Claudia Wherry

Remember that the players perform all works 'by heart' (i.e. they do not use notation on stage – though the odd 'cheat sheet' has been used on occasion!) so please take this into consideration. This doesn't mean you have to 'dumb down' – Taikoz performs some very complex works – but taking this factor into consideration can play into how you conceive and structure your work: e.g. use of cells that repeat (with or without variation); themes/bridges etc. that return from time to time; rhythmic devices that have an internal logic (as opposed to 'random' rhythms); short stretches of improvisation.

Instrumentation includes your choice of the following instruments and instrumental combinations:

- Shimedaiko on wooden stand; alone or with other taiko to form a Taiko Set (see below)
- Shimedaiko on floor stand (seated position)
- Taiko Set consisting of (high-low):

 - 0 2 x 1.8 Okedo
- Nagado-daiko (various sizes and pitches)
- Katsugi-okedo, including:
 - o 1.4 Okedo
 - o 1.5 Okedo
 - o 1.8 Okedo
- Hirado-daiko
- Odaiko

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- Uchiwadaiko (various sizes and pitches)
- Atarigane (*aka* Kane, Chanchiki)
- Chappa

Katsugi-okedo quartet, including combinations of the above Katsugi-okedo
