



SHIRLEY DURAND, beloved wife of the late Adrian Durand, passed away in Lethbridge on Thursday, March 16, 2023 at the age of 84 years.

Shirley had many hobbies over the years such as embroidery, sewing quilts and pillows, crocheting, knitting, coloring, reading, and gardening.

She enjoyed travelling to various destinations over the years, including a few winters in the southern states, especially the Arizona area, with a trip to Australia being one of the most memorable.
