He dreams of freedom, courage and pride; His heat his his hope has not yet died. He thinks, he runs, he fights aside, Others with courage hope and pride.


He shoots, he ducks, then runs some more; He thinks back as he runs through a door. It's raining again, it stopped before, He shoots, he fights amid the gore.

The water, the dirt, a huge mud slide; He shouts, he screams, he will not hide. He knows, he knows, it's not his turn; As he looks around, people burn.


He awakes in a sweat; his throat is dry, Although many years, have gone by.

Mike was then transferred to Peace River for a few years, before transferring back to Southern Alberta again, serving in Picture Butte.
