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Director Spotlight


Director Robert Wohlford

Whether it's a few plants in the windowsill, containers on a deck, beds and borders in the yard or a vegetable plot, gardens big and small can reap big benefits for you and your family. Before you set out for the garden center, here's a couple of things to consider: where you will be planting, whether your garden will be directly in the sunlight or shaded with trees and what kinds of plants you will need (flowers, shrubs, bushes or even fruits and veggies!)

Help out your Pollinators!

- Bees and other pollinators play a critical role in our food production.
- More than 80% of the world's flowering plants need a pollinator to reproduce; including more than 130 types of fruits and vegetables.
- More than 100 types of U.S. grown crops rely on pollinators.
- Bee populations have dropped alarmingly, as have the populations of many other pollinator species like butterflies due to dwindling habitat, disease, and environmental contaminants.

Here is a helpful list of our favorite summer plants that thrive in the Texas heat:



Angelonia

Also known as the summer snapdragons, Angelonia is a spreading annual and are among the top picks for those looking for a taller plant. They come in blue, pink, red, purple, and white. Plus, they are wonderful for potting!



Hibiscus

You can't talk about heat-resistant flowers without giving hibiscus a shoutout. The hibiscus plant produces the biggest rose mallow flowers than any hardy perennial. These showy flowers feature huge, ruffled, and thin petals in pinks, yellows, peaches, corals, blues, whites, and reds.



Lantana

This beauty comes in yellow, orange, lavender, or pink blooms. They are available as an annual and a perennial and are considered to be a bushy and low-growing plant. They bloom throughout the summer and well into the fall. If you are planting a variety of annuals, we suggest that you plant your Lantana towards the back, since they will likely grow tall and exceed the height of your other flowering plants.



Vinca

Also known as Madagascar periwinkle, vincas are wonderful annual blooms for bedding. They will perform well in any kind of garden and will thrive even during the hottest days of summer. The plants can grow about 6-18 inches tall, depending on the variety. If you haven't tried planting vincas, you should know that it has an expanded color palette that includes shades of rose, pink, and lilac.



Zinnia

Zinnias are one of the most well-known garden plants, and they are available in more than a dozen species. Apart from being easy to care for, zinnias come in an assortment of colors, from pastel greens and pinks to flaming oranges and reds. They are warm-season, fast-growing flowers that require minimal care and bloom with abandon.



Mystic Spires Blue Salvia

A relative of sage, Mystic Spires Blue Salvia is a hearty, drought-tolerant bush that sprouts blue flowers and has a long blooming season. This perennial will grow 18-24 inches and attract butterflies and hummingbirds. They prefer full sun to grow.



Bottle Brush

Available in both dwarf and full-sized varieties, bottle brush is an excellent choice for southeast Texas gardens. With its distinctive red bloom, it can add a splash of color to your garden. They prefer full sun, but will grow in partial shade as well.



Ornamental Grasses

Introduce a different texture to your garden with an ornamental grass species. There are many different varieties, each with a distinctive color and texture. They grow well in full sun and require very little water.




WATER CONSERVATION

What is water conservation and why is it important?

Water Conservation is the practice of efficiently preserving, controlling, and managing water resources.

Water conservation has become an essential practice in every part of the world, even in regions where water appears to be enough. It is the most practical and environment-friendly approach to lessen our need for water. Likewise, using less water puts less weight on our sewage treatment facilities, which use an ample amount of energy for heating water.

Reducing water use reduces the energy required to process and deliver it to homes, businesses, farms, and communities. Which in turn helps to reduce pollution and conserve fuel resources.



- 97% of all water on the planet is salt water.
- The remaining 3% is freshwater but only 0.5% is available for human consumption. The rest is trapped in ice caps, glaciers, soil, and the atmosphere.
- 95% of water entering U.S. homes goes down the drain.
- The Average U.S. family of four uses 146,000 gallons of water per year.

There are many efficient approaches to conserve water in and around your home.

Take a look at the list below for ideas that might work for you!

- *Make sure to turn off the water or faucet while brushing your teeth. This saves three gallons every day.*
- *Put a few drops of food coloring or dye in your toilet tank. If the coloring begins to appear in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak that may be wasting more than 100 gallons of water a day.*
- *Limit your showers to the time it takes to soap up, wash down and rise off. A typical shower uses five to ten gallons of water a minute.*

Water only when the yard needs it. Water during the cool part of the day, in the morning or evening. Do not water on windy days.
