We live in a world fluent in hostility, division, cynicism, and self-protection. Yet God calls His people to a radically different way: the way of hospitality. Hospitality is not loving someone like you, it's loving someone who's not like you. True biblical hospitality isn't just good manners or social warmth; it's a reflection of the heart of God Himself. From Genesis to Revelation, Scripture reveals a God who makes room, creating space for humanity, reconciling us to Himself through Christ, and inviting us to extend that same welcome to others.

Hospitality is not a personality trait or spiritual gift for a few; it's a divine expectation for all who carry the Spirit of a hospitable God. It is both intimate and missional. Hospitality is rooted in God's love and prompts us to reach out to those who may never step inside a church.

L Hospitality for Us: Reconciled with God (salvation).

Q: What does it mean that "the cross becomes a table"? How does this image help you understand grace?

Q: In what ways has God made space for you when you didn't deserve it? How can you reflect that same welcome to others?

II. Hospitality with Us: Reconciled to one another (fellowship).

- Q: Why is showing hospitality to other believers sometimes harder than extending it to strangers?
- Q: What does it mean to "outdo one another in showing honor" (Romans 12:10)? How does this shape community life?
- Q: How can you, your friend group or your small group become a table of belonging for someone who feels like an outsider?

III. Hospitality through Us: Reconciled for the other (mission).

- Q: Who in your daily life might need to experience the love of God through your hospitality?
- Q: How can kindness and welcome be a bridge for the gospel in a hostile world?
- Q: What fears or barriers keep you from opening your life or home to others, and how might God be asking you to trust Him in that?

Get Practical

Sit with the Lord and ask Him to show you the people in your world who need a place to belong. Hospitality starts with awareness, seeing others the way Jesus sees them. Write down one name and one practical way you can extend Christ's love this week.

Remember: Hospitality is not something we have to do; it's something we get to do. Every act of kindness becomes an invitation for someone to encounter the living God through you.
