Amid the breathtaking landscapes of the Copper Canyon and the indomitable spirit of the Sierra Tarahumara, Chihuahua by UTMB® 2025 concluded with resounding success, reaffirming Mexico's place as a world-class destination for trail running. Over three unforgettable days, athletes from across the globe took on challenging routes that tested their physical and mental endurance, while the Rarámuri culture stood at the very heart of the event.

As part of the prestigious UTMB® World Series international circuit, the event brought together hundreds of national and international runners who competed across six distances — from 8.5 km to 156 km — traversing the most spectacular trails of the Sierra Tarahumara. Beyond the results, Chihuahua by UTMB® was a true celebration of the deep connection between sport, nature, and community.

One of the standout elements of this year's race was, once again, the participation of the **Rarámuri** people, whose natural endurance and deep connection to their land inspired both athletes and spectators. The victories of indigenous runners in several categories reaffirmed the ancestral legacy of running as an expression of identity, spirituality, and community pride.

The closing ceremony, led by the Secretary of Tourism of Chihuahua, Edibray Gómez Gallegos, paid tribute to this cultural heritage with the symbolic presentation of Rarámuri command staffs to the founders of UTMB®, accompanied by a special performance from Rarámuri pianist Romeyno Gutiérrez.

Chihuahua by UTMB® once again showcased to the world the majesty of the Copper Canyon, one of the largest canyon systems on the planet — four times larger than the Grand Canyon. The routes, which crossed the municipalities of Divisadero, Batopilas, Cerocahui, and Creel, offered runners a unique experience that blended technical challenge with an incomparable natural setting.

Every step along the trail was a reminder of Mexico's rich environmental and cultural heritage. With this event, the state of Chihuahua reaffirms its position as a key destination for international sports tourism and as a symbol of the perseverance and passion that define the UTMB® spirit.
