West Bromwich Mountaineering Club welcome dogs to the club hut. We kindly request that Dog Owners adhere to these guidelines when staying at the hut:

- 1. Dogs must be supervised and well behaved at all times when visiting the club hut.
- 2. Dogs are not allowed on the bedding.
- 3. Dogs are not allowed in the kitchen area.
- 4. Please inform the hut secretary when booking if a dog/s will be present.
- 5. All dog faeces to be bagged up and removed from site by owners.
- 6. Dogs to be kept on a lead when outside or in perimeter grounds of Plas Gwynant.
- 7. Please be mindful if hut is full and there is limited space; please put dogs in vehicles if applicable. Ask other hut visitors if they want your dog put into the car whilst eating.
- 8. Any member already booked that objects for any reason, the dog will not be allowed to stay at the hut.
- 9. All dogs to be kept under control and are the responsibility of the owner/s
- 10. Member must clean/hoover prior to leaving hut to ensure it is clean for present or new arrivals.

We have the TOC-H Weirside bunkhouse booked again, but this time for a winter visit.

For those that have not been before, the bunkhouse is the old chapel, in the village of Chapel Stile, in the Langdale valley. This is central to the Lake District with very easy access to some of the best walking, scrambling, climbing and mountain biking on offer. It is also within a few minutes' walk of two excellent pubs, both providing good food and a selection of ales. There are 2 bunkrooms for 8 people and a further 2 each for 2 people, fairly modern toilets and showers, good heating and plenty of hot water, though the drying room is a bit of a waste of time...

As the kitchen is small, there will be a full breakfast provided each morning and a group meal at the centre on Saturday evening. The cost of the 2 nights is £35, to cover bed and the 3 meals. Bookings being taken for 12 provisional places at the newly refurbished Kingshouse bunkhouse at the head of Glencoe.

Costs are £35 per night or £45 with a kingshouse breakfast. Bookings are on a personnel basis to the Kingshouse on 01855 851260 and please let them know you are with the West Brom MC. *Please text Nic Piotrowski on 07775914822 to say you are going*.

For those who are new to Glencoe it is a premier venue for Scottish winter mountaineering and the valley boasts 12 Munros and an abundance of quality winter climbs including the Aonach Eagach ridge and if inclement weather than the indoor ice wall at Kinlochleven is available.

With Baggers to St Kilda

September 2019

What am I doing on this steep grass slope, up in the clouds, nothing to see, crampons on my feet, ice axe in my hand, no sign of snow? Where on earth am I? And why?

It started with a superb WBMC coach trip. It doesn't matter which one, or where to, they're all good. So there I am, sitting on the coach, when Andy Brown, remembering that I like the sea and sailing, mentions that the Relative Hills Society are coordinating a trip to bag the hills of St Kilda. Thus was I hooked.

Who are the Relative Hills Society? It exists to encourage climbing British Relative Hills, particularly the Marilyns (hills with a relative height of at least 150 metres) and other prominence-based lists. The Society organises various hill-bagging trips, including trips to St Kilda and other islands. My understanding is that RHSoc members mention Munros (and other nonprominence-based hills) at their peril...

Who, what or where is St Kilda? Firstly, there never was a saint of that name. Some authorities reckon that it may be derived from Old Norse *sunt kelda* ('sweet well water'), but other theories are available...

St Kilda is a group of islands about 40 miles WNW of North Uist, forming the western-most islands of the Outer Hebrides. The western-most only if we ignore the even more isolated Rockall, 200 miles out from Barra Head, which (perhaps fortunately for hillbaggers) is only 70 feet high. The group consists of three islands, Hirta (1656 acres), Soay (245 acres) and Boreray (190 acres). It was continuously inhabited for at least four millennia, until its voluntary evacuation on 29 August 1930 after the last 36 islanders voted to leave as their way of life was no longer sustainable.

Why had it become unsustainable? St Kildans were crofters, with little land suitable for cultivation. Their essential food supply was seabirds and eggs, collected from the steep cliffs. My understanding is that the islanders held everything in common, with virtually no personal property, no leadership structure. Every day, they held a meeting to decide what work had to be done. As this had to be by consensus, sometimes it must have taken a while, and perhaps on those days little work was done? Tourist ships started to call from the mid-1830s, and some tourists cheated the naïve islanders of their essential items. From the mid-1860s a notorious minister browbeat the islanders into attending church so frequently that insufficient time was left for their essential life-support activities. And then, after the First World War, many of the younger men emigrated leaving only the young and the elderly...

As a boatie, I draw parallels with Foula, an even more isolated island west of Shetland, where the islanders are fishermen not crofters. They are a turned towards the sea, their houses stand apart, and it is still a thriving community. Perhaps it is too much to suggest that islanders who lose their connection with the sea will not thrive?

How did I get here? After three glorious sunny days walking the Red Cuillin of Skye with Andy B, we met lan Merther and John Edwards for the ferry from Uig (Skye) to Tarbert (Harris). We spent four nights at the superbly quirky Am Bothan bunkhouse in Leverburgh, owned by sailor Ruari Beaton, who has a boat hanging from the ceiling and another on a trailer outside. Awaiting suitable weather for landing at St Kilda, we did some local walks on Harris, and visited Taransay (TV series Castaway 2000) and Scarp.

Finally, on 22nd September, the weather gods aligned and the two skippers thought that the forecast sea state might allow a chance of landing on Boreray. So we left Leverburgh for St Kilda with 12 of us on MV 'Hirta' and another 12 baggers on the RIB 'Enchanted Isle'. Both vessels have twin engines, are 55' long, and were built on the island of Ireland. The journey took about 3 hours. But a forecast is just that - the actual sea state was unsafe for landing on Boreray, but later that day some were able to land on Dun and bag its Marilyn. We all landed on Hirta, to camp overnight on a dreich evening. A poll in 2013 found that the word *dreich* – meaning wet, dull, gloomy, dismal, dreary – was the Scot's favourite word. I can't possibly comment.

It was still dreich as we broke camp before dawn next day and boarded our boat for Boreray. After close inspection, it was deemed possible to land on its NE side. This was done from the boat's tender (dinghy) wearing trail crampons. The technique was to stand in the bows of the tender, ready to go, and await the shout from the boatman. He had by far the trickier task, which was to time our approach so as to nudge against the rocks at the top of the swell. With an encouraging shout, and perhaps a helping hand from the boat crew, in theory we tourists simply stepped ashore, and then the tender pulled safely away from the swell. Shall I simply say that some baggers managed it better than others. The trail crampons (micro-spikes) were superb on the greasy rock and stayed on for the duration of the landing. From sea level, there were a couple of short pitches of easy scrambling, where we all appreciated the rope placed by Dave McGimpsey, a self-deprecating Scottish climber and bagger who (how shall I phrase it?) has climbed before. A great guy, and de facto, the leader of our landing party. If you ever read this, thank you Dave.

The ascent to the summit of Boreray, Mullach an Eilein (384m), was a steep climb up grass in poor visibility, which made route finding a tad tricky. I confess to placing markers on the way up, to be sure that we could find the way down. For baggers, climbing this one hill allows a tick in five lists - it is a Marilyn, Hump, Tump (300-399m), SIB & Yeaman or in shorthand a Ma, Hu, Tu3, SIB & Y!

What's next? Well we never climbed on Soay, and there are the two stacks Stac an Armin (196m) and Stac Lee (172m) which some report has an 11m vertical wall of exposed rock with virtually nowhere to place gear. Next year perhaps?

Suggested routes

Route 1 - Snake Pass A57 (~8.9km / 5.5 miles) Drop off Snake Pass where the Pennine Way crosses the A57.Follow the Pennine Way South through Featherbed Moss, crisscrossing the stakes on a South Westerly heading to Glead Hill then Mill Hill(61904)at 541 metres and turn left SE to the top of Williams Clough. Follow this path to Nab Brow(058885), White Brow and the Shooting Cabin to the path junction at (045880) and follow Snake Path back to Hayfield.

Route 2- Snake Pass A57 (~13.2km / 8.2 miles) Follow the A57 East past Doctors Gate Colvert to Lady Clough to a path on the right hand side of the road (100928). Follow this path through wooded area -past Lady Clough Moor. Follow this path SE and then South until paths join at(107907) and you cross a footbridge and head West to Saukin Ridge. The path skirts Ashop Clough and the River Ashop to Ashop Head and turns South to the top of William Clough, then descends via routes 1,3,4.

Route 3 - From Hayfield (~15km / 9.3 miles) From the start of Snake Path (040868) on the Kinder Road follow this North to Middle Moor and keep right towards the Shooting Cabin, skirt the reservoir and climb William Clough. Where it meets the Pennine Way (064901) turn SE, pass Sandy Hays to Kinder Downfall (082889). Turn South, follow the path and pass by Cluther Rocks on the right and Kinder Low Trig point at 633 metres on your left.

Through Edale Rocks (079867) and past Swines Back on the right to the descent path (080861) at a crossroads on the right. Follow this path turning right at the bottom of Caldwell Clough to follow the track and road back to Hayfield

Route 4 - From Hayfield (~28.5km / 17.7 miles) Follow Route 3 to Edale Rocks . Shortly after there is a path junction (079864). Turn left towards Noe Stool, Pym Chair, Wool Packers and Crowdens Tower. When the path splits take the right hand fork (094871) and turn right again to join a main path East (095872). Follow this to the top of Grindsbrook Clough (105872) and then head North and skirt around the top of the valley by Nether Tor and Ringing Roger. When the path splits at (128874) take the left hand path past Druids Stone. You now walk to the lip of the plateau and once you see Madwomen Stones on your left from the fords (138877), head North and follow the path round left to Blackden Edge with Blackden Moor on your right, then Seal Stones on your left. Carry on hugging the lip of the plateau and it will bring you back to the top of William Clough. You can descend via Snake Path or Kinder Reservoir back to Hayfield Distance 28.54 km / 17.7 miles

Suggested routes

The Family Friendly Circular Route (~12.5km / 7.8 miles)

From the central carpark there is a short walk through the quaint town of Church Stretton before we start to ascend a path into Carding Mill Valley. From there we will continue up the valley turning left to Light spout Waterfall and onto the ridge of the Long Mynd Hills. If the weather is favourable we will have fantastic views across to Wales, Shropshire and Worcestershire.

Once the height is gained onto the ridge it is a gentle stroll along good paths eventually descending back to the valley and All Stretton. Once there and if you wish you may visit The Yew Tree pub for a quickie before making your way back to Church Stretton and the Kings Arms Pub for a meal if required.

Alternative options

Throughout this route there are several alternatives to shorten the route which will lead back to Church Stretton.

FROM NDG

ROUTE 1 (~17km / 10 miles) Walk the tarmac to Stool End and then head up Oxendale to climb (all or some of) Pike o Blisko (272042) Crinkle Crags(248047) and Bowfell (245064) returning to the coach by The Band or Rossett Gyll.

ROUTE 2 (~17km / 10 miles)

To Stool End and climb Bowfell via The Band or Climbers Traverse and The Great Slab then head N to Ore Gap and descend to Angle Tarn ("bag Esk Pike first). Then Rossett Pike (249076) and round to Stake Pass (265087) Martcrag Moor and The Langdale Pikes. Descend via Thorn Crag ridge.

ROUTE 3 (13km / 8 miles)

Forget the tarmac and climb NW by Stickle Ghyll to Stickle Tarn (287075) then climb Pavey Ark (285079) forget Jacks Rake under winter conditions use Easy Gully. Then SW to Harrison Stickle(281074) Loft Crag (277071) and NE to Pike o Stickle (274074) and Martcrag Moor to Stake Pass(265087) and left onto the Cumbria Way.

From Ambleside and Chapel Stile there are many walks for you to consider!

Being close to the A591 also opens up many other walking options and the nearby Brockhole, The Lake District Visitor Centre also offers a wide variety of options for all ages including taking a boat on Windermere giving other options including different walks. As in previous years the weekend therefore offers the opportunity to climb different peaks that you would not be able to do on coach meets.
