Our Rotary Exchange students Anne Mitchell from Australia and David Roberts from the U.S.A. gave us a delightful book on Australia and one on the history of the United States.

As in every year, many people do not bother to return their books on time or they lose them. This not only involves financial loss to the library but makes a great deal of extra work for the library staff. I appeal to all readers of this report - search your bookshelves for our missing books.

The pupil librarians have worked hard all year, shelving and repairing books and generally keeping the library tidy. Craig Tattersall in particular has done a

splendid job of mending and organising.

Mr Donne and Mrs Webby have again brightened the library with changing displays of paintings, prints and colages. Their efforts, and those of the pupils whose work has decorated our walls, have been most appreciated. Mr Davies and Mrs Richdale have also contributed a number of career exhibitions.

In spite of the grass which suddenly appeared in a flourishing state inside the library, it has been a quiet year, with progress continuing in a calm and uneventful

way.

ART/CRAFT 1974

This year has seen rapid growth in the work and size of the Art Department. A second art room became available in term I and this room, fully equipped with jewellery benches, metal-work bench and general purpose tables, has now become a multi-purpose art and design workshop. Engraving on metal and glass was started for the first time and with the addition of a stone polishing and stone cutting machine, there has been a tremendous amount of enthusiasm and interest generated. A large mural was designed by 6th form students for the tuck shop but it was felt that it would be better displayed and come to less harm were it hung in the school hall - the mural now adorns the proscenium arch and has been generally well received. Pottery has continued and a series of tiles have been designed. constructed, glazed and fired under the able direction of Mrs Webby. These separate tiles will be assembled as a single unit and will be suitably sited on an exterior wall of the school. A large scale work in low relief has now been fitted in the school foyer and threedimensional works in wood, stone, concrete and polystyrene have or are in the process of being placed in various suitable sites around the school grounds. More and more art work is being exhibited throughout the school and is now no longer confined to the library. We in the art department hope this important aspect of our work will continue so that each block will have an original piece of work of a permanent nature to exhibit in due course. A very large mural panel (306 sq. ft.) designed for the rear of the school hall is now nearing completion. The mural consists of 54 individual panels which are all interchangeable. These designs have been carried out by fourth form students and will form an attractive decorative panel for this rather dark area of the hall. The designs have used elements of line, shape, tone, colour, texture, pattern scale and growth. We have had a fair measure of success in external exhibitions and contests, Lyndsey Gedye was selected to attend a design course in Wellington, we won two prizes in the Dr Robertson Trust Exhibition held at the Sargeant Gallery and lastly we submitted 12 works to the 1974 Dominion Schools' Art Exhibition and had four works selected to tour New Zealand - one design executed by William Scanlon won a Merit Award no mean feat for a national contest of this size and calibre.

For the future we hope to add enamelling, work with resins, and perspex to our jewellery curriculum. We are of course short of storage space and could do with a large store room to enable us to utilise limited classroom space to better advantage. Perhaps these problems will be overcome in the not too distant future so that we shall continue to see still further improvement in the high standards of work already being produced at the W.H.S. —Peter Donne.

SKI TRIP — SEPTEMBER, 1974

This is the third successive year the school has been able to attend a six-day "learn to ski" course on Mt Ruapehu in the third week of the August holidays.

Some nine students and two staff members, Mrs Smith and Mr Power stayed at Erua Ski Lodge hosted

by Lloyd and Janet Horn (Ski Shop, New Plymouth) from 8th-13th September.

Skies, boots and poles wer hired from the lodge on arrival and the first lesson was given that night - on Erua's new nylon ski mat.

Dinner that first Sunday night was typical of the meals during our stay - a three course meal of ample sufficiency.

We were introduced to our instructors Lloyd, Allan, Jeff and Brett.

It was an incredible week, generously fine for five brilliant days and with ideal snow conditions. After breakfast we piled into the yellow mountain goat, and headed for the Top O' the Bruce.

Our first lessons were given on Mead's Wall, after being separated into groups (experts, fit and unfit) we started on the first day's instruction fastening skies, sideclips, kick turn and travelling and turning in the wedge position.

Afternoons were free for us to practice the morning's instruction and we soon learnt the thrill of a straight chase down the mild slopes to the tow at the bottom.

By mid week we had advanced to stem turns and travelled up the chair to explore the mountain with our cameras - some majestic snow scenery with clear views to Egmont. Some even managed to book rides on the snowcat to the summit of the mountain in ideal weather.

By now those who were in their second or third year of instruction were exploring the mountain on skis with their new-found skills - stem turns, long traverse and attempting parallel turns on the T-bar, the second chair and the valley Porna.

Friday dawned as fine as all the other days. We skied all morning, ended early at 3 p.m. and came down to greet our transport, check in our gear, say farewell to our hosts and return home. Our thanks are due to those parents who organised transport so willingly.

Perhaps the greatest mark of our trip was the enthusiasm for the sport and the determination to go again next year.

WAITOTARA VALLEY TRAMP

The party consisted of ten people; Mr Lang, Richard Laird, Peter Barnes, Brian Gubb, Craig Tattersall, Brian Basset, Graeme Timpany, Trevor Banks, Colin Thoms, Therese Kendrick. The aim of the tramp was to connect up with the Wanganui River from Larsens Farm by travelling up the Waitotara Valley.

We left on the 25th of November and travelled by car to a farm about 35 miles north of Wanganui owned by a Mr Larsen. The first stage of the tramp was over the farm to the first hut. Mr Larsen had told us that there were four or five false trails in finding the next hut and that the right track was marked by venetian blinds, but we got lost anyway by taking the wrong turning at the junction of two streams. It was getting late so we decided to make a bivvy, Brian Basset had his .303 rifle and we happened to chance upon goat just before we made camp, so we had milky potatoes, peas and carrots and tough goats meat for tea. Richard Laird decided to soak his feet in the stream, but he ended

up doing a bit of eeling, with his toe doubling as a hook. However, it was an eye for an eye since we had eel for breakfast the next morning. Our hunters didn't have any luck that night with a pig hunt.

Sunday morning wasn't a particularly good morning for most of us since we were not used to sleeping on the ground, which was made worse since we had left the mid-ribs in the punga flooring. We started off by backtracking to find where we had left the track, which soon brought its reward, but it wasn't long before we lost the track again and had to follow the river so as not to get really lost. We regained the track at the last moment to lead us into the Pokeka Hut, like the last one it was old and run down, bunks falling apart and the remains of a dead animal in the corner. We decided to go on to the next hut but once again we lost the track and as a result we had to fight our way through vines. After figuring out the track we set up the bivvy for the night. Brian Basset and Graeme went off after pigs again but had no luck. At this stage of the tramp we should have been at the third hut (Mangarau) if we were to make the Wanganui River on schedule. Peter caught a young goat, but we didn't have the heart to kill it so we let it go.

Sleep came a lot easier to us that night and we were off at quarter to ten the next day. Back-tracking again proved successful as we found where to cross the Pokeka Stream to get onto the ridge. It was supposed to take experienced trampers two hours to reach Mangarau Hut from here, but it took us four hours. At this point we were about 1600 ft. above sea level. The most immediate problem after we had put up the bivvy was to find water. One small party went down the west side but had no luck, but we found water on the other side. We listened to the radio to see what weather was in store for us since it didn't look too good and we didn't want to be trapped on the wrong side of the stream. We set off for the next trig point at 10.35 the next morning. The pace was pretty slow since it was basically up hill and there were frequent rest periods.

The third hut was in a lot better condition than the other two huts, even containing rich luxuries as reading material. However it only had enough room to sleep five people and the remainder had to sleep in the bivvy. There was a little thunder and rain and so once again we listened to the weather forecast. The rain stopped after a short period and the mist came down. Luckily there was plenty of water and we even caught a small freshwater crayfish, but not enough to make it worth cooking. We had T.U.P. that night, much to everyone's disgust. Tomorrow was to be our rest day, and we were looking forward to it.

Brian and Graeme left on a hunt fairly early the next morning, but the rest of us did nothing but lick our wounds and muck round. We took a few crazy pictures — one of Peter tied to a tree and being lashed. However, it was a good days rest, giving us a chance to reorganise and even have a high powered conversation on self-control and self-indulgence.

It was pretty cold and windy that night, but that didn't stop anyone from getting a good night's sleep. The slowest were made to go first the next day and we headed back the way we had come, having abandoned hope of reaching the Wanganui River. When we reached the fourth day's campsite we boiled the goat that Brian had shot the previous day and then fried it. It was a lot better than the first day's effort.

Peter fooled us into getting up one hour early the next morning and Craig led us down the ridge at a fairly easy pace since his blisters were getting to him. We made remarkable progress (for us) and reached the Pokeka Stream by 10.30 a.m. It was at this point that we noticed that the rope for stringing up the bivvy was lost. No-one felt like going back for it and we accepted that it was lost. We had our soup and cracker lunch and set off again for Pokeka Hut. Going back was a lot easier than the efforts of the first few days. On arriving at the hut our marksman shot two goats. We made the bivvy against the side of the hut. We boiled and fried the goat again and had the best meal of the tramp, though the mosquitoes had a better meal still. A few of us dammed up a stream so we could have fresh water the next day.

The eighth day was another rest day, and we did even less than we had at Mangarau. Colin and Brian tried eating huhu bugs, but we couldn't con Mr Lang into having any. About the middle of the afternoon it started raining fairly hard, which had everyone plugging up the holes in the tarpaulin.

The aim for the ninth day was to get back to Larsens. We made a great start to this by making a full circle just outside the camp, but once we found the trail we were right, and we covered the first one and a half days tramping in the last three hours! There were no further incidents on the way back but the thought that we were going to get the first hot bath in nine days cheered us no end.


Junior Debating

First term this year saw another canoe trip from Pipiriki to Atene, the usual ascent of Mt. Ruapehu, and the hardy annual trip down the Otaki Gorge. Organised sport caused disorganisation of the club in Term II but Term III saw a bad-weather trip to the School Hut and a week long survival exercise by Mr Lang and senior pupils in the Waitotara bush.

Next year we should like to see more young teachers and parents taking part in this worthwhile activity.



Ohituaries



- MR STANLEY EDWIN DAVIS, died on 10th November. after a short illness.

After seven years as Head of the Technical Department Mr Davis retired at the end of 1973, apparently in sound health and continued to teach one Technical Drawing Class in 1974. He was stricken quite suddenly and there followed just a few weeks of increasing incapacity before his death.

In earlier years, Mr Davis had been a mountaineer of considerable distinction and was the first person to climb five substantial peaks in the Southern Alps. His love of adventure out of doors continued into his last year. He had faced many daunting challenges on the high snow fields and rock faces, and on the white water of our rivers and frequently spoke of his desire to encourage the young men he taught to find the same strength and self-awareness in similar pursuits out of doors. He devoted a great deal of his time after school and at weekends and vacations as master in charge of Duke of Edinburgh Award Training, putting his wishes into effect by leading boys' and girls' in tramps, and canoeing.

Mr Davis's genial and positive outlook and his warm heart towards all, was so easily betraved in his smile, and outgoing service for others, and there are many boys who came under his guidance in the workshop and drawing room, and in the field, who owe much to his character and example and will long remember him as teacher, counsellor and friend.

MR. DAVIS, A MOUNTAINEER IN THE SOUTH ISLAND

The secretary of the Canterbury Mountaineering Club Inc., writes-

During Christmas 1934 Stan Davis was with a Wellington party in the Rakaia. The party climbed Louper Peak and Mount Lord. In addition Stan and others made first ascents of Mount Neave and the Low Red Lion Peak. In December 1936 he made climbs of Erewhon Peak and The Amazon's Breasts (both in the Rakaia area).

The journal of 1936-37 records in personal notes of 'exiles' from Canterbury that — 'Stan Davis bicycled to the Chateau Tongariro one week-end with his skis on his pack. Heavy snow fell. He returned on his skis, with his bicycle on his pack.'

The journal for 1937-1938 contains an article written by Stan giving an account of his climb of Mount Evans, the second ascent, and during which one member of the party lost his life.

The next year's journal records that Stan Davis gave the members of the Club's Wellington branch an opportunity of seeing an oil painting of Mount Evans by Austen Deans as a memorial to Norman Dowling. The painting was hung in the Tararua Tramping Club's rooms. At Christmas Stan set up a plaque in the Whitcombe Valley to Dowling's memory.

By kind permission of the Canterbury Mountaineering Club we republish Mr. Davis' account of his ascent of Park Dome and Mount Evans printed in the Journal of 1937-1938.

PARK DOME AND MOUNT EVANS

Having been through some particularly trying experiences since his first alpine venture the previous year, I thought it strange when Norman Dowling suggested that we go into the Wilkinson and sleep under Evans for a few days during the next holidays.

I admired him for wanting to go back, and did not have the heart to disappoint him. Then came Derek Freeman — a lusty lad, tall and strong; he also wanted to climb mountains. We were a threesome, so the trip was arranged. Seemingly, Norman had been anticipating this event the whole year. His suggestions, his gear, and his physical preparations, were just part of the intensity with which he was wrapped up in his combat with Nature, in the great outdoors.

Four hours after leaving Christchurch, lunch was spread by the girls on the green of Chefolilesh and New 1978.

the girls on the green grass at Glenfalloch and Norman provided a "Tui" beverage.

The three parties arranged in Wellington, and about to venture forth into the high hills were: The Scott, i.e., Walter Patrick Scully, Austin Deans, Betty Lorimer, and Joan Singleton. The Chorlton, with Tony and Barbara, Muriel Broughton, and John Stackhouse. The Davis, comprising Stan, Norman Dowling and Derek Freeman.

The distant Arrowsmiths lengthened our vision and soon came nearer, now towering above now aloof, and laughing at our puny efforts to cross the Rakaia, now withdrawing into themselves for the night, but ever present, proud, in their immensity, mysterious beneath their draperies of mist.

At long last, came the Washbourne Hut, friends, foods, stars, sleep, dew, then Mt. Butler rose coloured in the dawn and the satisfying sight of high snow in the sunlight. Breakfast on the wet grass, and loud confusion about getting the good things back into the rucsacs they belonged to,

Opposite Duncan's Hut the river was quickly crossed and then the sunshine slowly warmed our frozen extremities. The Scott party continued up the South bank while the crossing

was in progress.

Derek displayed the advantages of long limbs, by relaying over most of the packs in a middle loop. The girls managed to keep their heads dry, and the others scrambled awkwardly about on wooden legs.

We farewelled the Chorlton party, advising them to visit Mein's Knob, and see the "finest view in the world." Then some three hours later, on the Whitcombe Pass, we lazed in the long grass, occasionally stirring to watch the avalanches from the towering Louper, to suck lemons or glucose, or to admire the tremendous cleft of the Katzenbach. Norman noted our back door route of the previous season, when we had beat a hasty retreat from the Braken blizzards through Kitchingham's Col and down the Barron Glacier; also seen, was the old camp-site where we had revelled in our bed of stones after having spent the previous six nights on the ice of the Ramsay and Erewhon Col. Further down the Whitcombe, I located the large cubical boulder at Snag Creek, from which base we had climbed Mt. Neave in 1934.

A very comfortable night was spent and the anticipation of an easy day to our Wilkinson Base on the morrow, lent an atmosphere of contentment and completion to a very satisfactory day.

At 10.30 in light rain, we moved leisurely through the Gorge endeavouring to capture-

We forded the river below a high bluff, of Jourdain Cone, and found relatively easier going on the deer tracks high above the boulders in the river. The Wilkinson ice face towered above where we hopped the McKenzie Tributary, then the vision of the cairn surmounting our boulder home, morally assisted us up to the terrace.

This excellent bivvy gave no indication of tenancy since our first stay three years before.

The rain continued throughout the day, but being so dry and extremely well fed and comfortable, loaned wings to the hours and gave the bivvy an atmosphere of deep content.

A very angular patch of sky seen through a hole in the cave, exhibited stars, and at 2.30 a.m. we began preparing to make the first ascent of Park Dome.

Revelling in a glorious sunrise, we proceeded up the left side of the Seddon Valley. Presently a steep snow tongue gave access to a ridge, loose and steep. Then the rocks became larger, and provided excellent climbing, and sound belays, to where the choice of a steep chimney or the climb of an exposed face indicated a halt. The awkward approach to the chimney favoured the latter route. It went for a certain distance then the description from Derek's viewpoint, fostered doubt, so I secured the rope and went up to investigate the chimney from above. Vocal communication with the boys indicated their discovering an easier variation on the face and Norman led.

From the chimney, the ridge proper developed into a real arete, with a long drop into a cold couloir of blue ice on the left. The sunshine, scudding clouds, good steep sound rock, the virgin jaggedness of Thorndyke across the way, Neave on the Main Divide and the new angle of Evans to the right, were but a small supplement to the whole magnificence of the prospect in full.

I prepared a snack and waited for the boys where the ridge merged into the neve of three hanging glaciers, the avalanche feeders of the McKenzie ice. We roped, and wandered upwards through the crevasses, wending around seeking bridges, finally gaining the summit after a nine-hour climb.

It is worthy of record that Norman Dowling produced a large bottle of liquid "Tui." This had been secretly purchased in Wellington, transported into the Wilkinson, then by an exacting climb to the virgin summit of Park Dome— "not because of the refreshment in itself, but because the task was one which required great integrity and endurance," was Norman's own consideration of the act.

General handshaking, congratulations, first virgin climb, a well-built cairn, surmounted by the empty "Tui," photographs, then we set off into the mist, down the unexplored neve of an unnamed Waitaha glacier. An upright slide brought us quickly to the Seddon Col through which we stepped, then swooped down into the ampitheatre of Seddon snows, and paused to regard the three regular tracks of our standing glissades. The cavern was reached without further incident.

Thursday, December 30th, our sixth day out, arriving with rain and fog, gave us a lazy day, and opportunity to appreciate the culinary efforts of Norman.

Shouts! Answers! Visitors!

Tony Chorlton, his sister Barbara, and Muriel Broughton arrive. We welcomed the first lady visitors into the Wilkinson with eats, drinks and merriment. Their party were sleeping at Cave Camp and had almost climbed Mt. Neave the previous day.

Later, we went sight-seeing in the mist, rain and fog of the Wilkinson Glacier. Ecrie avalanche thunder reverberated the rivalry of Park Dome, and Evans. The long continued growls gave the only indication of hills at all. Norman mentioned our intention of climbing Evans on the morrow, and from the high conical deposit, we waved and yodelled our visitors down the river.

Friday, 31st December, at 3 a.m., found us scrambling out of the cavern with a billy of hot rice and cheese for our breakfast on the McKenzie Col. When examining the glacier on 29th inst., it was suggested that we forced some rocks on the right and under Park Dome we would avoid a whole lot of step-cutting in the icefall. I went up first on a long rope, up came Derek, and while Norman hauled in his pilot line, and looped up, a deafening roar produced clouds of ice dust high up the Dome and heavy blocks of blue ice rolled close by.

From here, we climbed steadily upward, seeking bridges, kicking and anchoring rythmically in the steep neve until the slope eased off to the Col at 8 a.m. A swift glissade, a photograph of the Red Lion, then a solid bout of step-kicking from the County neve, brought us directly up to the Col of the Red Lion, where we cleaned up the remainder of the rice, and departed for the low Peak at 11 a.m.

The interesting rock passed all too quickly, and we found the snow easy to the summit at 1 p.m. Whitcombe was a giant, and we felt proud to have climbed Erewhon Peak and had fun on the Whitcombe Rocks.

Sawtoothed and extremely loose, characterised the connecting ridge to the High Peak. Three hours were spent in this decidedly draughty place, during which time we ascended the highest point, photographed the surroundings, tore pieces from a Pascoe handkerchief, and generally made the most of our visit. On the summit of this twice-conquered virgin, we endulged, building a durable memory with the ineffable joy of a good climb well done.

We slithered down the rocks, glissaded to the col, devoured more food, and departed at 5 p.m. for the McKenzie Col. The steep climb from the County gave occupation, and we literally swarmed up, feeling good and putting extra vim into the rythmic steps just for the joy of doing so. Norman wanted to relieve me, and politely swore something about step-kicking all day. I consoled him with the fact that he would soon be in front on the McKenzie. About fifteen minutes from the col. we left our morning route for an easier way noted on the ascent. While moving in unison diagonally across a clean thirty to thirty-five degree slope, I suddenly found myself vigorously endeavouring to check the rapid pace with which we were sliding over the snow . . . a few vague bumps . . . oblivion . . . years later . . the delicately tinted blue-green cice of the overhanging glaciers . . . the inflamed tongues of a dying day . . and beyond . . . infinity . . . a voice? Someone gesticulating . . . it's Derek. Park Dome! Evans! We'd fallen . . . Norman? . . . he's dead.

We laboriously raised his unprotected head, laid him comfortably, and heaped about the snow. How we managed to get down the icefall — God only knows; surrendering to the inevitable and collapsing every few yards, our battered bodies bore us down through the moraine. In the scrub, the spells became more necessary, occasionally we became separated, finally, we reached our boulder home about 3 a.m.

We awoke, reduced, humbled and grateful. Sunshine and cold water, and after six hours enfeebled preparation we managed to leave. Nourishment was frequent, and spells very necessary. At eight o'clock that evening, we were found asleep at the Whitcombe-Wilkinson confluence by Walter Scott, Joan Singleton, Betty Lorimer, Austin Deans, and Pat Scully. They assisted us over the river, and made our beds in the cave. Friends, food, warmth and sleep—

Such is providence!

Walter, Austin, and Pat, departed early for the McKenzie icefall, leaving us under the expert care of the two girls. Feeling much better after a complete rest and the capable attention of Betty and Joan, we made Chainman Flats, just at dusk and adjusted the abrasions by candle light.

A rapid improvement was very noticeable the following day. Price's at noon, and Hopeful Creek Hut at 6 p.m. The boys had arrived after making a fast trip from Cave Camp. The previous day they had tried to force the McKenzie Icefall, and after hours of step-cutting, decided that: the body could not be reached, and enough daylight left to return to the bivvy; the body could not be lowered down the icefall without more assistance; the weather was worsening and the girls may be needing help.

It is to the sterling support and assistance rendered by this party and the girls together with the continued sunshine, that Derek and I was able to come out alive.

On the fifth day after the accident, we arrived at Ritchie's homestead, then Hokitika about mid-day.




