



COUNSELLING

Guidance and counselling in a school is not something that the school counsellor does all by himself. All the staff are involved to some extent through their day-to-day contact with students. When you ask a form teacher or subject teacher whether you should take a particular course, when you report some minor instance of bullying, when you ask if you are good enough to consider this career or that, there is guidance being offered.

At a deeper level the form teachers and the Deans have a greater role in guidance and are concerned very directly with your school work, your academic performance, your relationships with others and any outside factors which may influence your schooling.

Guidance and counsel is provided by the Principal, Deputy Principal and Senior Woman. While their function very often involves control and discipline it also involves direction and they are constantly being asked to look into problems of behaviour, follow up long absences, deal with classroom events and to see parents and outside agencies.

The School Counsellor fits into the area of guidance as a specialist teacher with direct training and skills in the area of human relations. He is a specialist teacher in the same way that there are specialist teachers of chemistry, physics, maths, French and physical education. The school counsellor, then, is both a person working directly in the area of pupil guidance and a resource person to staff who want help or advice on any problems relating to students and student needs.

Additionally the counsellor works in three main areas. He organises and conducts social education programmes which help to round out education by looking at the

ways in which we choose to live our life. He conducts sessions at some levels of the school in career education to try and help students make better and more informed career choices and decisions. And, thirdly, he provides a service of both listening and assistance to those who have problems relating to home, school or friends.

All working in guidance realise their limitations. Where necessary we make use of specialist help available in the community. We are very grateful for the help received from the Police Department, Maori & Island Affairs Department, medical practitioners, the Department of Health and the Department of Social Welfare. In particular, we are helped by and owe much thanks to the Vocational Guidance Service for their steady supply of up-to-date career information.

Being new in a school creates initial problems of becoming known and of being trusted. I think after this first year a large measure of acceptance has been won. One indication of this has been the fact that in one year over 300 pupil contacts and interviews have come from self-referral. This means that you made the choice to come and talk. In contrast there were 140 referrals where students have been sent to me by other people (teachers, Deans, etc.).

What does next year hold for guidance? Certainly a greater effort to meet all students in the classroom situation. Particularly the senior school which was not seen very often in 1975. Social education programmes will continue with third, fourth and fifth forms.

The counselling office is almost always open. Why

not call in and talk?

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT PROGRAMME

In 1974 the school initiated a programme of community service with girls from one third form class. This proved to be a very successful venture and gave encouragement to planning a similar activity in 1975.

The 1975 community involvement programme was designed to allow students to give service to community organisations such as primary schools, kindergartens, I.H.C. and playcentres. Those taking part were involved from 9.00 a.m. to 12.00 noon, five morning per week, with afternoons back at school.

This cut the direct schooling of those taking part to half that of regular class members and caused a number of problems in organisation, not the least of which was arranging a third term assessment rather than

sitting school examinations.

Other problems found centered round girls who wanted to shift their placement and girls who wished to remain where they were. It had at first been the intention to rotate all students every three weeks, giving three different experiences in a nine week period.

There is no doubt at all that the programme was very successful and gave very real assistance to many schools and groups. All commented on how much they had appreciated having our girls helping and many girls

were very highly regarded.

It is this last point that really, for the staff, measures the success or failure of the programme, did participation help the student to grow and mature as a responsible person? In large part this happened and was a delight

One centre said that the girl they had working with them was better than any training college student and had more real ability than most of their trained helpers. Another centre said that their two girls amazed them with how well they worked with quite demanding young children. Still another centre said frankly that they didn't know how they would cope after the programme stopped.

It is hoped that a similar programme can be organised for 1976. If you are invited to take part, seize the chance - you will really enjoy it.

THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD

This year three bronze awards were gained by Maxine Johnson, Julie Davidson and Marina Bourke.

We include here an extract from a longer account by Sandra Chapman (4D), of just one of the many activities involved in passing the Award.

- "... Left home at 8.00 a.m. to get to school by 8.30 a.m. Arrived at school and loaded bikes into trailer. Left school 8.45 a.m.
- " . . . Travelled for about ½ hour and arrived at our starting point, Upukonargo."
- "... Checked equipment, went over instructions and finally left. Sun was streaming down on us for the first couple of miles."
- "... Standing out before us was a huge hill or so we thought, but later on in the journey we discovered it was actually small."
- "... Maxine and I kept on cycling for 3½ hours and after tramping up a huge hill we stopped and had a 15-minute break for morning tea."
- "... About I o'clock we reached an enormous hill and thinking that we would have reached this hill that the teacher had told us about, we started climbing. What made the hill worse, was that it was all loose stones and gravel. After about a ½-hour climb up the hill, pausing to rub our strained ankles, we reached the end only to return our exhaustion by drinking a whole bottle of Teal 35. A fairly short descent, but a steep one, returned our strength. It was rough and we skidded several times while trying to hold our balance long enough to get to the bottom of the hill. Another short, steep hill stood before us, but we managed to survive it."

"By this time we started looking for Gaye's place. While whizzing down the hill I noticed a house standing out on the hill. As I zoomed by I noticed the name 'Gaye' on the letterbox and slammed on all anchors to stop, but only to receive a big cloud of dust and a huge skid that made me lose my balance and land on my knees on the gravel. I was hurt but I was so happy that we made it this far that I soon forgot about it."

"We coasted down to the gates only to discover three gates. We decided to take the gate on the left as it lead by the milking shed; but it didn't look right, so we left our bikes down the hill by the shed and walked back up to Gaye's place to ask the way. We spoke to Mr and Mrs Gaye and Mr Gaye said he would take us down and put us on the right track. This he did. He gave us a lift down to our bikes on his tractor as he was heading that way. We enjoyed this."

"We started out in the paddock and every step we took our feet sank down into the wastes of animals. The whole paddock was covered with this manure and we started to get very annoyed at dodging the boggy parts. I had sandals on, so you can imagine the mess my feet got in. We made slow progress to the other side gate and then discovered that the next paddock was the same as the first but worse, as the trees were blocking the sun out and there was mud, manure and dead sheep everywhere. Our bikes got stuck several times in this and the other person would come to help to move it out. We got bits of wood to wheel our bikes over the especially muddy parts, we put the wood back, as we were enjoying the thought to think that the other two would be coming over this and have the same trouble as us. We got out of this paddock all right, rather muddy, and went on to the next field. This field had grass on it and the track we followed was rising up to a steep hill. We took out a piece of fruit and had one each. By this time it was 1.30 p.m. We weren't hungry either, but thirsty, yes.

"We came across a gate and tried for about 10 minutes to undo the latch. We were about to give up and lift our bikes over it when it decided to come undone."

"The rest of the way was downhill and rough as we had to ride along the sheep tracks and gullies. You had to have your brakes on all the way. This was McKenzie country."

"We started on our way not feeling weary yet, till we came to Reeds Hill. The sight of it took our breath away. One quarter of the way up we stopped to have a 20-minute lunch and continued our long weary walk up.

. . . After reaching the top which took about threequarters of an hour, we stood back and looked at the breath-taking view."

"We enjoyed the trip and surprisingly enough we weren't stiff, but burnt, yes."

"We did on this day exactly 41 miles and loved it."

BEQUEST TO WANGANUI HIGH SCHOOL

Miss Edith Beatrice Wheal, who died on 23 January, 1975, had served as a primary school teacher in Wanganui for fifty years, continuing in various relieving positions after her formal retirement in 1954.

Her outstanding devotion to the education of young people in Wanganui has been further demonstrated by her generous bequest of \$13,000 to the Principal and Board of Governors of Wanganui High School, to be held in trust for the establishment of two Scholarships.

The Ivan Higgins Scholarship is a memorial to a young relative of Miss Wheal's who died in his early vears.

This is an Entrance Scholarship to the Third Form at Wanganui High School and its value is \$200.

It is to be awarded annually by the Principal to a boy or girl, on the basis of scholastic merit and previous school record. There will be an examination for this scholarship and application forms will be available at the High School early in Term III this year.

The Edith Wheal Scholarship is a fitting memorial to Miss Wheal, for it was intended by her to promote opportunity for outgoing service by ex-pupils of the High School.

The Scholarship will provide a substantial contribution to the expense of an ex-pupil of Wanganui High School to render voluntary service abroad. Should there be no suitable candidate offering for such service in any year, there is provision for the Scholarship to be awarded to a pupil who stands to profit most by its bounty while studying for higher qualifications at a tertiary level.

The first award of this Scholarship will be in 1976 but application papers will be available from the school in the third term this year.

"ANDROCLES AND THE LION"

The business of play production anywhere involves not just the actors and actresses. Behind the glowing illusion of stage realities lie hosts of major techniques, minor details, construction, paint, string and very much goodwill and teamwork in harmony. A glance at any production list reveals the multitude of varying responsibilities.

All the more credit, then, to any school production created in the confines of lunchtimes and after school rehearsals on the stage barely worthy or designed for anything other than creating ulcers for producer and stage manager.

For the second year in succession, Mr Corbett has produced a play by High School pupils: this year the choice fell on a Bernard Shaw play — "Androcles and the Lion". The play is based on an old fable but Shaw characteristically expanded the fable to poke fun at nineteenth century society and, incidentally, examine what ends are worth dying for to make life worth living. Shaw, in fact, denied that the play was a comedy. It is fantasy, not aiming (particularly using a lion as a character) at naturalism and existing philosophy using his characteristic fun.

As the title rôle, Ashley Seddon was creditably comically-inclined, gentle, timorous and talkative, coping well with long pasages of dialogue, ably supported by Sue Capenhurst as the attractive, forceful Christian, Lavinia. As the centre figure of the play she was a handsome foil to Androcle's tremulous humour, both bearing the weight of the play well.

Magaera, Androcle's wife, is an interesting shrew (well played by Helen Doney). On behalf of the Roman Legions, the Centurion and Secutor (Craig Simcox), the Captain (Andrew Prentice), the Editor (James Kirkwood), Ox Driver and Menagerie Keeper (Richard Robinson), the Guards (Ian Trethewy and Craig Cleveland), all added military might. Ferrovious in particular (Bill Scanlon), bare chested and forceful, bellowed and bayed

and gravelled his sentiment, Lentellus and Metellus (Gregg Brotherston and Quinton Grafton) minced very effective effeminate paths 'across the boards'.

Spintho is a good comic part and was well portrayed as an emetic Christian by Gavin Buxton. Shaking and trembling limbs were all there. Eccentric, and nobly cranky, a high-pitched young Caesar was daringly tackled by Robert Stainthorpe.

The other members of the supporting cast, the Christians, Robert Claridge, Keith Spicer, Cathy Tait, Jan Webby and Jackie Jones — and call-boy Hamish Craig, gave all the necessary back-up.

Who else? Ah! — the lion! Feline, sure-footed (or pawed) Noel Morceau gavotted well with his rôle as

bete-noîre turned saviour.

Of the production team, particular thanks must be accorded to the Stage Manager, Mr Wakely, Bruce Gibson and Alan Spooner, to Mr Donne and his sixth-form art team for their flexible and practical sets, to Mrs Richdale in charge of costumes (special thanks to her sewing classes). Throwing light on the scenes were Mr Davies and Mr Lane (assisted by Kelvin Kendrick and Brett Oldfield), Mrs Davies sat patiently through all the performances as prompt, and business largesse was coped with by Messrs Milne and Dickson, the make-up team was led by Mr Gilbertson and Mr Mahoney. The advertising posters were of first-class standard; well done to all the students who created them.

Above all, congratulations must ge to the producer Mr Corbett for his fine direction, patience and ability to co-ordinate a large team. To him and to all involved, whether mentioned not, our thanks for some enjoyable

and worthwhile evenings' entertainment.



Having fared extremely well throughout the season under the club's name, we decided to try our luck in the schoolgirls' races. Our first regatta was held in Wellington at the Kaiwharawhara course on fairly calm water. We had competition from Porirua College, Onslow College and Tawa College. We won the eights race with a distance of 5 lengths from Porirua, and Tawa was third. We gained first and second place in the fours also. Special thanks

The second regatta we attended was held on our own Wanganui River course and run by the local Association, primarily for the rowers from further north who were travelling to the Maadi Cup to be held the following week. Our third, and final regatta, was held at Lake Karapiro (the venue for the forthcoming World Championships) in conjunction with the finals of the senior races which were cancelled at the N.Z. Champs held at Lake Waihola in Dunedin. Here we borrowed a new four boat from the Star Boating Club of Wellington and oars from Wanganui Collegiate School as we couldn't provide transport for our own equipment. We were entered in two races: the novice fours' schoolgirls' race and the senior schoolgirls' race. The first being the novice fours attracted a record 13 crews. This crew rowed extremely well and gained a well-earned place in the Youth Four Final. Unfortunately, this final never eventuated due to adverse weather conditions and the Regatta was called off.

On return from the Nationals the moulding of two School Fours took place under the careful eyes of senior oarsmen and Mr Jock Byres. The Intermediate Four comprising T. Kitson (stroke), P. White (3), B. Guthrie (2), G. Kenning (bow), quickly shaped into a formidable crew. Training went as planned and fitness was built to a peak with both crews performing extensive gym

workout and training runs.

The weekend before Maadi Cup the Wanganui Secondary Schools' Championships were staged. The Intermediate Four performed well and gained second in their heat and third in the final. The Senior Four which comprised P. Downing (coxswain), P. Visser (stroke), P. Kitson (3), D. Duncan (2), S. Humphreys (bow), dominated its heat from start to finish winning by three lengths from St. Augustine's. In the final, however, High School learned a valuable lesson. After a disastrous start the Senior Four was coming last in a six boat field. The Seniors fought back well to take the lead but then lost it again right on the line to Collegiate. So the Seniors finished second in the Senior Fours at the Regatta. There was great concern as to this result and a lot of work was emphasised to correct our starting fault.

NEW ZEALAND SECONDARY SCHOOLS' ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Maadi Cup Regatta — Kerr's Reach, Christchurch, March, 1975

On arrival we inspected the course and went for a training row in plant loaned to us by the Avon Rowing Club. The course called for special attention as a coxswain can lose or win a race for you on Kerr's Reach as several bends were included in the course.

The first crew to race was our Intermediate Four. Although rowing two grades above themselves they finished a creditable second in their heat to Hamilton Boys' High School. In the repechage they also performed well to gain second place. This crew went from strength to strength and finally won its Pettiet Finals in fine form.

The Senior Four had drawn Christ College and Otago Boys' High in its heat. Although the seniors never really got going in this race until the last 100 metres the crew went on to win by a half a length over Christ College in a time of 5 minutes 25 seconds. This time was second fastest only to Hamilton Boys' High School who had previously won the coveted Springbok Shield seven times. Our seniors automatically gained a semi-final berth.

Our opposition in the semi-final consisted of Christ College and Onehunga High School. With the change in plant and a better course, High School gave Onehunga and Christs no chance as they went on to win by a distance in impressive form. High School clocked a time of 5mins. 37.9secs., Onehunga who finished second clocked 5min. 53.8secs. This time was again second fastest, this time to Kaikorai Valley High School who clocked 5min. 37secs.

Springbok Shield Final

The three finalists were the favourites: Hamilton Boys' High School, Wanganui High School and Kaikorai Valley High School. The day of the final was clear and ideal for rowing. Making sure the plant was in perfect condition, the senior four took to the water and rowed to the start.

The start was rather nerve-racking with a lot at stake. High School only managed an average start and then went through a settling down period. After approximately 700 metres, we found ourselves coming last. The favourites, Hamilton, had a commanding lead of 14 lengths. Kaikorai were also in front of us. On the last corner High School began to move, and the final 500 metres were truly dramatic with every ounce of power counting towards the final result. With the enthusiastic and appreciative crowd behind us we drew level with Hamilton and Kaikorai.

With 200 meters to go, the senior four found an extra, unknown, untapped, burst of power which produced a blistering sprint and victory 3 of a length clear of the nearest rivals Kaikorai Valley High School, with Hamilton the favourites) a further half a length behind Kaikorai. The senior fours record comprised at the Championships of three wins from three starts, including the final.

This is only the second time the Springbok Shield has come to Wanganui, the first time being when Collegi-

ate won it in 1966.

The senior four's effort led to the selection of P. Visser to compete in the New Zealand Colts' Trials (under 23). Our congratulations are extended to Peter on his trial debut.

The success of our crews was the result of good coaching techniques employed by a true master at the art of rowing Mr A. R. (Jock) Byres. On behalf of the crews I would like to extend our gratitude to Mr Byres and associates for their encouragement and expertise which enabled victory to be ours.

As the Wanganui Rowing Club is celebrating its Centenary this year I wish to congratulate the Club on this fine achievement and on a century of races won and lost!

May its bi-centenary be of equal distinction.
