EDITORIAL . . .

'The New Look'

"The strife is o'er, the battle done;
Now is the Victor's triumph won;
O let the song of praise be sung."

The 1971 'Record' is in your hands at last and it is with sighs of relief that the editorial staff watch this magazine take its place among other contemporary school magazines. Publishing the 'Record' has proved a real challenge for us and it has been an uphill struggle all the way.

Our main problem has been to present a modern image while still maintaining the self-respect that is often lost in publications printed on behalf of teenagers en masse (e.g. capping magazines). Under this major consideration have come the numerous headaches of finance, advertising, quality of content, cover design and colour and quality of production.

It was obvious from the outset that, if the 'Record' was to improve in size and design, the production costs would also increase. Add rising publication costs to this initial increase and you will perhaps realise the huge costs we were faced with. We had a number of avenues of action open to us: we could,

- (a) Cease publication altogether.
- (b) Introduce no new innovations to the magazine.
- (c) Use advertisements to subsidise our costs.
- (d) Raise school fees to cover the extra cost.
- (e) Interest city retailers in a sponsorship programme.

Being optimists we decided on the latter proposal which would enable us to improve our magazine without extra cost to the parents and without advertising which tends to lower the standard of a publication.

Therefore we set to work interesting city retailers in a sponsor-a-page system and we were thrilled with the response we received from all spheres of the business world. Our thanks must go to these people who have turned a possibility into a reality for us. For the four of us who spent days trudging around town, it has made one thing clear 'That sole (soul) pressure really pays off'.

Having financed the magazine, all that remained for us to do was to accumulate the raw material ready for processing. As the 'Record' is in fact a record of the year's events the amount of pupil participation is limited. This is unfortunate as the spirit of a school is inherent in the spirit of its pupils. However, we have endeavoured to incorporate the essence of the school in such things as cover design and colour, original contributions, and art work. We have tried to produce articles which reflect the school's year and at the same time maintain your interest throughout. I hope we have succeeded.

The 'Record' plays an important role in this school as it is one of the few things which forces the whole school to work as a unit—from the finance committee of the Board of Governors to those junior pupils who make contributions, from present staff and pupils to those of the past—all are forced to work as part of the whole—as part of the Wanganui High School.

MR L. I. POWER

Mr Power joined our staff as Deputy Principal at the beginning of the second term. He was educated at Timaru Boys' High School and Canterbury University College, graduating with Masters in English.

After a year at Post Graduate Teachers' College in Christchurch, his first post was at Napier Boys' High School, teaching senior English and French.

His country service was completed in Ruawai District High School, Northland, in charge of English and French Departments. He was appointed Head of English and Languages at the then new Kamo High School, Whangarei, a position he maintained while the school grew from 300 to 1150, until he received the appointment of Deputy Principal, Wanganui High School, March 1971.

Mr Power travelled extensively overseas for 2 years teaching in a Comprehensive School of 2000 boys in London and an academic school in Edinburgh.

His sporting interests lie in a long history of hockey, squash, tennis, badminton and skiing, while cultural interests have been served in church choirs, civic choirs, drama, and plays and operatic productions, both in New Zealand and overseas.

MR SMELLIE

Mr Smellie retired from the Deputy-Principalship at the end of 1970 for reasons of health, but returned to teach part-time in April.

Mr Smellie came to High School in 1961 to be Head of English and Social Studies. He was appointed First Assistant on the retirement of Mr Kinder in 1963 and then as Deputy Principal.

In speaking of Mr Smellie's devoted and loyal service to the school at the Prize Giving Ceremony the Headmaster said:

"But for deteriorating health, Mr Smellie might well have been Principal in my place, if not at W.H.S., then certainly elsewhere. I knew from the start, whoever was appointed would receive the undoubted loyalty of this uncommonly large-hearted man who was devoted to the good of this school in all its functions above all considerations for himself."

Mr Smellie is much loved and respected in this school, and I think even among the few boys of whom he has had to take a stern view, there are those who have learned through him that "the Lord loveth those whom he chaseneth".

Where a hundred men, suffering in the same way would have legitimately excused themselves from physical exertion, Mr Smellie has "pressed on" through the second mile, and not only have many responsibilities been carried out with great efficiency to this day, but also with unfailing cheerfulness, energy and good humour above the rest of us.

1st Term

If some younger pupils, and one or two less mature sixth formers have seen Mr Smellie only as the sergeant-major devoted to what they consider archaic values like self-discipline, honesty, duty, loyalty, tidiness and good bearing, there are many more who know him as a friend, always interested in them as people, sharing in their concerns and fostering a relationship of mutual trust and respect.

I do not think you will find in any school a man who is more loyal, courageous and devoted to his duty than Mr Smellie. If you forget all the algebra, social studies and science you have studied here, and even the English he has taught, you will not forget the man.

OBITUARIES**Mr A. S. Reynolds**

It was with great sadness that the school heard of the unexpected death of Mr Arthur Reynolds on April 16th last. Few knew that he had been ill in recent years, but with quiet determination and fortitude Arthur continued to teach with his usual conscientious concern for all the pupils in his care. Right up till the day before he died, Mr Reynolds was at work in his classroom.

After a distinguished career, both as a Post-Primary teacher and later as a Headmaster in the Primary service, Mr Reynolds came to High School as a part-time teacher in 1967. Right from the outset he established good rapport with his classes. He was popular with both pupils and staff, and was a fine colleague. His advice, if sought, was always soundly based and willingly given. We shall always remember his great cheerfulness and ready willingness to assist with extra duties at any time.

To Mrs Reynolds, his daughter Mrs Ward and family, and his brother Archdeacon Reynolds, we extend our sincerest sympathy.

Mr Bernard Scanlon

On June 28 of this year, Mr Bernard Scanlon died after a short illness.

Mr Scanlon had come to High School as a caretaker-groundsman in 1964 and since that time he had become something of an institution.

"Bernie", as he was affectionately known, took a keen interest in the Games Record of the School and quite frequently in his earlier years, was a keen follower of the 1st Fifteen.

He was most patient and tolerant, popular with both staff and pupils alike. In company with his colleagues he helped to beautify our environment in a cheerful and happy manner. He had a ready wit which was evident when he replied on behalf of the "outside" staff to the thanks of the boys expressed at their final assemblies.

We extend our sincerest sympathy to his brothers in their sad loss.

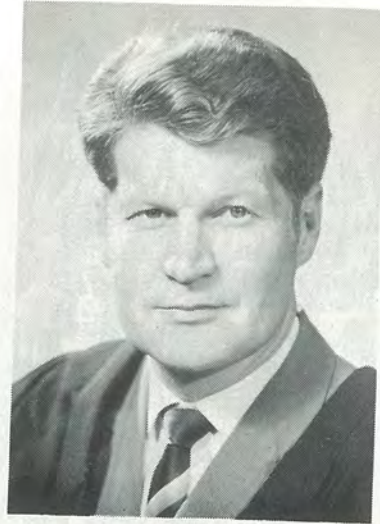

THE ORCHESTRA

2nd Term

The term was begun by welcoming Mr and Mrs Power. On the 26th the school had the choice of attending the Lions versus Wanganui-King Country Combined match at Spriggens Park or a surfing film in the hall—no need to say which was the most popular! The following morning the school had the chance of viewing the Lions' tactics at closer quarters when they made use of our grounds for their practice. That afternoon two of the team addressed us in assembly and an exchange of badges took place—an interesting day all round.

June:

This month began on a musical note with a 40 minute concert in the hall on the 1st given by Mr Peter Cooper of the Royal Academy of Music—much enjoyed by all.

On the 2nd the school was addressed by Mr Alvin Arnold, a Corso Youth Officer who stressed the need for support from the school in the annual appeal due on the 19th.

During the tutorial period on the 3rd the 5th, 6th and 7th forms were addressed by the three American Exchange Students for an informative and humorous half hour, and on the 10th Mr Grenside and Mr Voss visited school and spoke to those interested in teaching as a career.

The school produced a grand turn-out for the Corso appeal on the 19th—a quarter of the school roll, and the Drama Quartet returned on the 21st which was much enjoyed. The school noted with regret the death of Mr Scanlon on the 30th and on the same day the Right Reverend Falloon, the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church gave a talk on his recent visit to Vietnam. Also on the 30th a trip was made to Massey and the Training College by interested 6th and 7th form students, and most of this week the Inter-House Indoor Basketball Champs were played.

July:

At the beginning of this month the school lost Mr Whitely to the U.K. and Joe Swinson, the American Exchange Student, returned to Colorado. The 5th, 6th and 7th forms exams began on the 12th and ended on the 16th. The 26th was a well received Exeat Day. The 27th was the day set aside for the match against Boys' College which the school won 12-6. School teams played Rangitikei College towards the end of the month and Mr Ross Pilkington addressed the school on the 28th and 30th of the month. The school, having been asked to provide a team for aiding in the collection of the annual Blind Appeal on the 31st, again came to the fore with twice the number originally asked for.

August:

The 4th of this month saw the beginning of the Jaycees' Inter-School debating contest with the school competing against Collegiate—W.H.S. won, taking the negative side of the topic in "That the school leaving age be raised to 16".

Those 6th and 7th formers interested in completing their studies at University or Teachers' College were invited to attend a talk along with other schools at Boys' College on the 5th. The school held a mufti day on the 6th from which the proceeds went to the Blind Appeal. Highlight of the day—certain game male teachers and office staff donning boys' uniform.

On the 8th teams left for Colenso to return on the 9th and on the 12th the school visited Hawera for a sporting fixture. The second round of the Jaycees' debate was held on the 19th against Wanganui Girls' College but this time the school lost. The success story of the year was held on the 18th and 19th of August in the form of a much enjoyed variety concert. The 20th marked the end of the term and on the 21st the annual 'ex-pupils versus the school' matches were held at the school. The Buller High School also visited the school on the 24th to play some sport while passing through.

3rd Term

September:

Return to school on the 12th and on the 24th the school had a work day, from which the school gained \$1570.52 towards the future canteen. Apart from the work day September was a quiet month as far as school activity was concerned.

October:

On the 7th the Liaison Officer made his annual visit and for the 5th, 6th and 7th forms the 8th to 15th October was a busy time with important exams. This month had a variety of activity with a 'savings week' talk in assembly, U.N. talk to senior forms, and a change to summer sport and uniforms. October 28th was also important as the big night for the choir in the music festival.

November:

The School Ball on the 4th this year had a Guy Fawkes theme and was a great success according to those 5th, 6th and 7th forms who attended. The 12th saw the announcement of accrediting, the 17th beginnings of School Certificate, 19th University Entrance Bursary, U.E. starting on the 28th. With all these exams the school roll rapidly shortened as many were away on study leave.

December:

The 1st saw the beginning of the University Scholarships, the 9th prize giving and the 10th the end of term.

LIBRARY REPORT

A poet once wrote "where are the snows of yesteryear?" In the library it is the empty shelves of yesteryear that have vanished—not that we have any more books—money ran out too soon for that, but reorganisation has helped both appearance and efficiency.

The 6th form and N.Z. sections have merged with the rest of the books, though these will retain their coloured stickers for quick identification. These changes of location have another advantage—many books are being borrowed that were never noticed before.

A much needed and long awaited display board has enabled the librarians to become creative, though harbouring thoughts of vengeance on nameless folk who upset their displays.

Art displays have been perhaps the most striking feature of the library decor this year. Mr Thomas appears regularly with attractive and provocative pictures from our own art department as well as those from other schools. As we write this, some fifty exhibits enliven the space above the shelves.

We are again indebted to our chief benefactors. In particular we are grateful to Mr McKenzie Trench for his kindness and Michael Hodder for his continuing generosity. The Crusaders have also been most generous in their donations of books—mainly of the bright, paperback variety—to the religious section, and so popular have these been, especially those by David Wilkerson and Nicky Cruz, that the reserve list has been continually overloaded. Mr Woodbury has kindly contributed several 6th form History and Geography books which are shelved on the mezzanine floor and are to be borrowed by the 6th form.

We are grateful to Mrs Smith, Mrs Duthie, Mr Gilbertson and the 26 librarians, under Susan Gurnick, who have put in many hours of their time to assist in the care of books and general duties.

MUSIC

1971 has been an interesting and busy year with many and various musical activities in the school.

As usual, there was the orchestra, a little bigger and better than previous years.

The Senior and Madrigal Choirs were more active in the 2nd and 3rd terms, under the direction of Mr Wilson, preparing several attractive items for the annual festival.

At the end of the second term Mr Power's organisational ability was tremendously effective in producing a very successful Variety Concert, which played to good audiences on two consecutive evenings.

Both the Maori choir and the Junior Choir performed in the Variety and Festival Concerts with Mrs Gourdie extracting enthusiasm as well as sweet intonations from them.

Brian Jellyman's Beat Group produced a dynamic sound in the Variety Concert and their item included a number specially written by Brian for the group, which certainly impressed. Congratulations Brian!

Mr Schnack repeated his successful association with the School Band and this group combined with the newly formed Boys' Choir, rehearsed by Mr Power, for a rousing Russian Cossack song, heard also in the Music Festival.

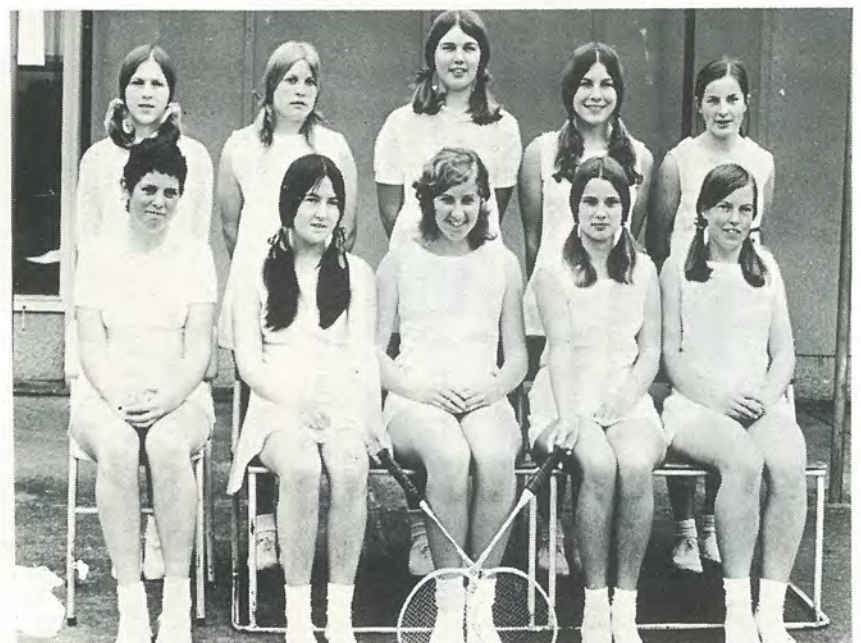

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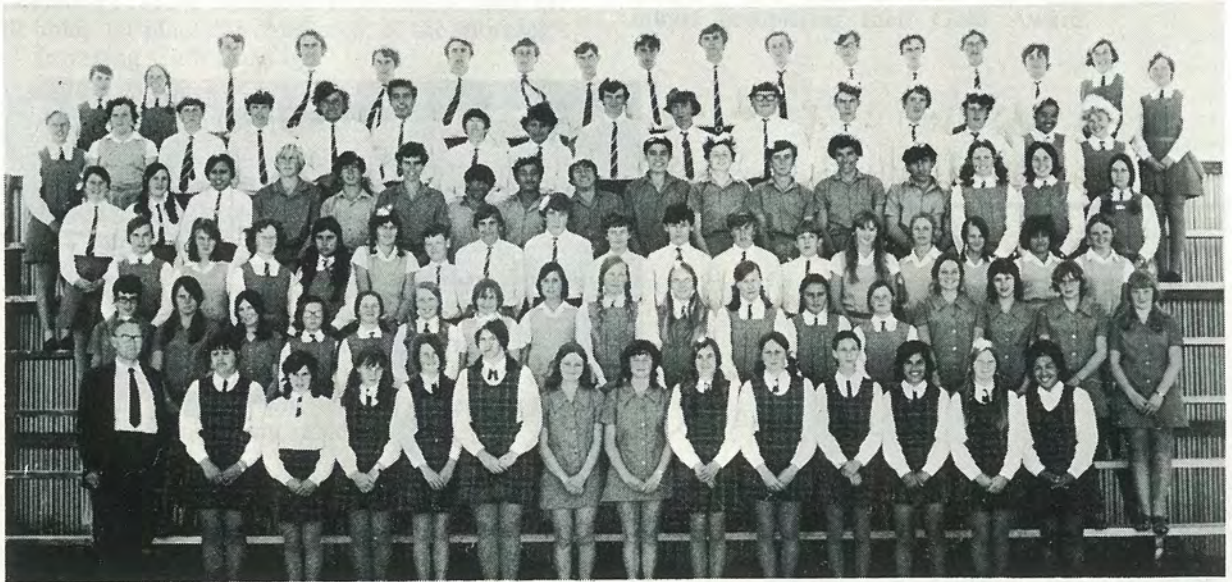

Needing 38 runs for victory High School found the going difficult against a steady Boys' College attack and lost 4 wickets in gaining the win, the first ever against Boys' College.

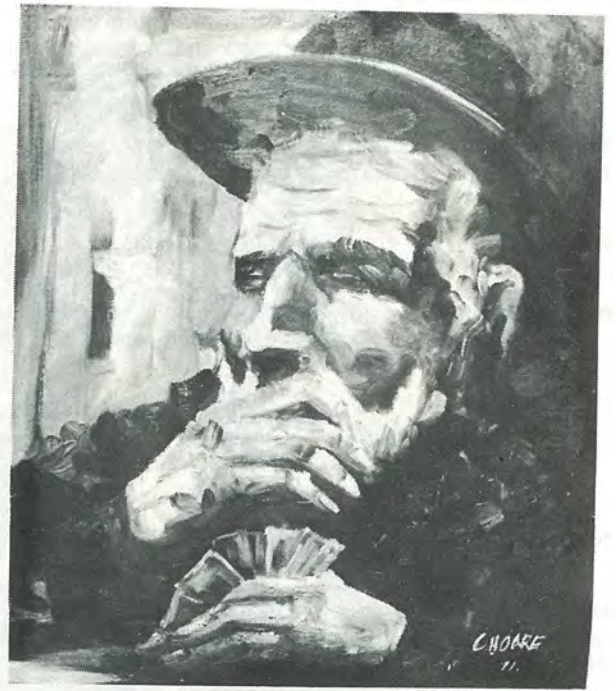

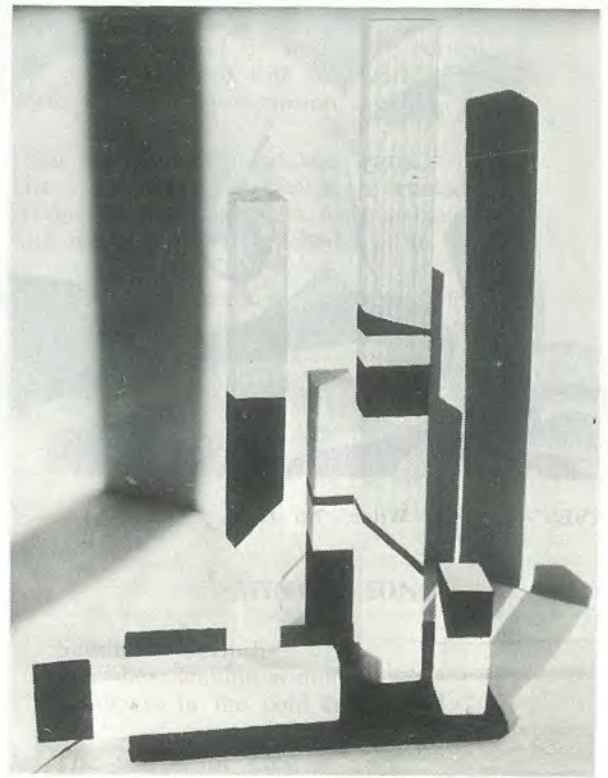

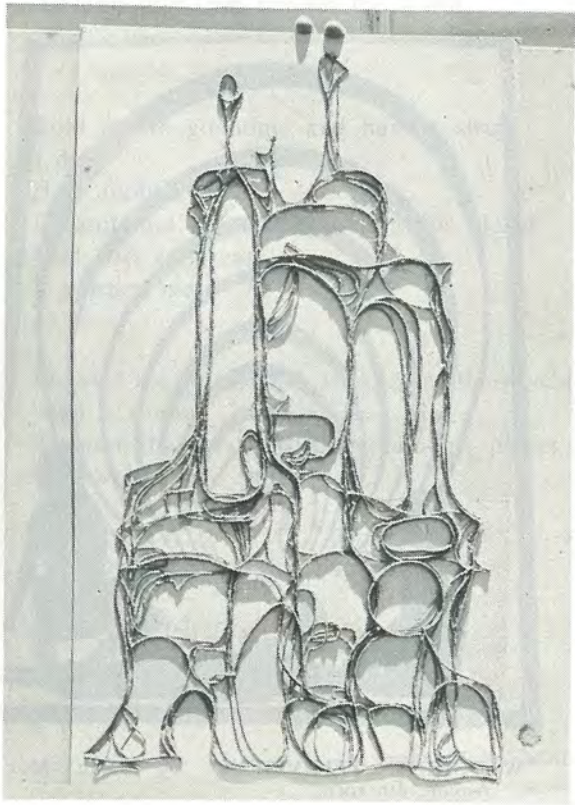

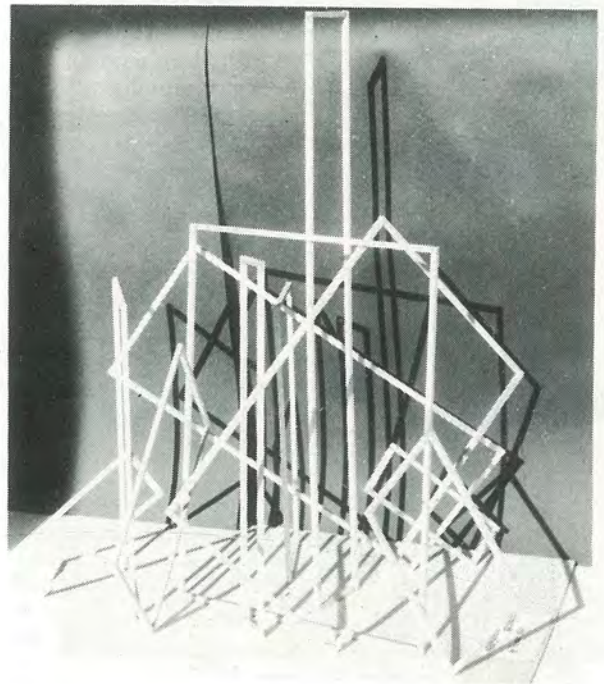

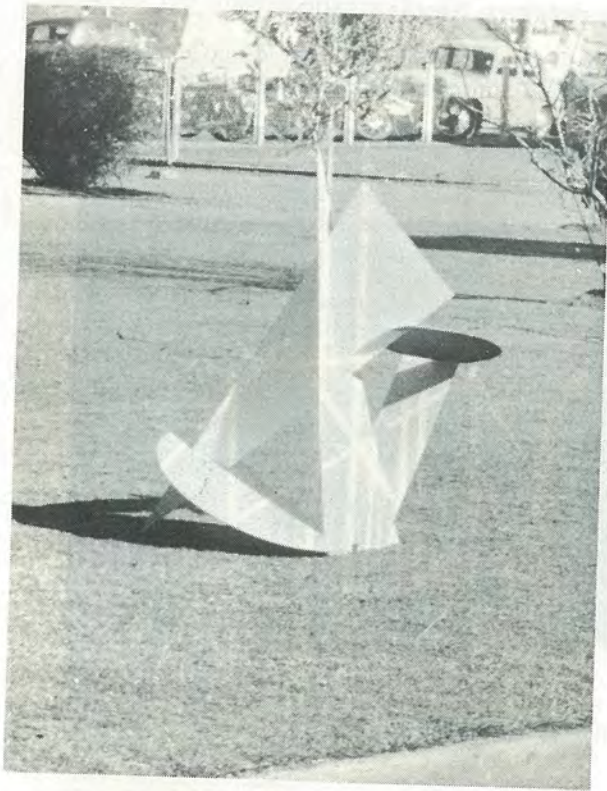

PAST STUDENTS' NOTES

John Gifford, President of the Past Students' Association writes of a disappointingly supported effort by the Association this year. There was a meagre attendance at the annual meeting in May, insufficient support to hold the Reunion Dinner in August, and only one team to meet the School for the annual games.

The Executive this year has been John Gifford (President), Juanita Williamson (Secretary), Richard Bullock (Treasurer), Helen Tilley, Andrew Byres and David Tilley (committee members). They have put a great deal of time and worry into plans which have become abortive because of lack of support from past students. It is realised that many leave Wanganui as they leave school, but the Executive allow for this and attempt to organise activity for university and training college vacation periods. Is the school link so weak that not even fifty to one hundred are prepared to gather together once or twice a year? The Executive has gone to the trouble to arrange special memberships, life or annual, with optional payments to include "The Record". We appeal to old pupils and those leaving this year to join the Association and then to support activity. It does not comprise a major part of the year in time or money. It would be good if there were a solid corporate interest in achievements by the School, such as the 1971 performances by the 1st XV and the 1st XI, and this support, expressed vocally from the side-line or in a letter of congratulations from a numerically significant body of old pupils, is an integral part of a healthy institution. Will you past students give it thought (and action!) in the coming year?

MISCELLANEOUS

In this section it is to be expected that honours in sport will rank high, and this year is no exception. It is grand to see how the School is making, year by year, a widening area of achievement.

Already we can claim at least fractional representation in the Sportsman of the Year Award. For the first time a group has won the trophy, and one of the group is an old boy. Few performances have stirred New Zealand as much as that of their rowing eight this year. An ex High School rower and First Fifteen member, Trevor Coker, was Wanganui's representative in this eight. Trevor will be remembered not only for his sports record at School, but for a fine personal contribution. His quiet unassuming, gentlemanly manner was the exterior to a strong personality, who held high principles and loyally supported the things the School stood for. He was very conscientious in all that he did, training for sport or preparation for serious enterprises. We congratulate him and his School trainer, Mr Byres, on the honour he has achieved, and hope that these are the precursors to further triumphs at Munich, 1972.

There have been other good performances. In rugby Geoff Neilson has played throughout the season as second five-eight for Taranaki. He turned in good games in the Queen's Birthday game at Spriggen's Park (which, however, didn't save his side) and against the Lions at New Plymouth. John Knofflock also played in the Wanganui game against the Lions, and he and Michael Farrell were regular members of the Wanganui reps., Michael contributing a good tally of points with his goal-kicking.

The Wanganui High School Old Boys' Club is fielding a higher percentage of old boys. We hope that the time will soon come when their senior side is predominantly an ex-School side. I think that old pupils everywhere would like to record their pleasure at the splendid performances by this year's First Fifteen, and especially the first ever victory over Collegiate. What a thrill it was. We have enjoyed a good friendship with our nearest neighbours and many pleasant games. On a number of occasions we have been very near to defeating them, and all connected with the School will want to congratulate the coach and team which has at last won the Collegiate game.

Craig Connell was 5th in the Wanganui bowling averages. He represented Wanganui at cricket, as did Ivan Tempero. Congratulations also to the 1st Eleven for some good performances also, despite relegation at the end of the season. We hope that it will not be long before they are back. Keith Bitchener has established a record by being selected for the representative squad while still at School.

Joanne Ruscoe was again in the Wanganui Women's Indoor Basketball team, and Judi Hanson in the Rep. Hockey squad.

This letter was received from Wendy Osborne, Head Girl 1970, who was working as a VSA teacher in the New Hebrides.

School life here at Vureas is very full. Our school hours begin at 8 o'clock in the morning and go till 11.40. Then we have a break for a couple of hours and school resumes at 2.00 and goes right through till a quarter to five at night: a pretty long day. Also we have prayers every night and then have prep for an hour to an hour and a quarter every week night except Friday. We also grow almost all our own food.

We do not have such things as caretakers here so the children and staff are responsible for all the cleaning etc. around the school. This means that for forty minutes before school every morning the children are set to work around the station doing various things like sweeping classrooms and cutting grass and cleaning the church, so this adds another hour to our school day.

As well as doing our school work we run a farm here at Vureas. This runs a dairy herd and a beef herd which we think is about 80 to 120 strong. We have a small flock of sheep and about twenty pigs. We have many chickens but they usually run wild and we have one white rabbit. Our farm also has extensive gardens which we plant and harvest ourselves. These gardens are almost our entire food supply. However, we do kill a bullock every fortnight for meat but as we are unable to keep the meat, having only two refrigerators on the station, we sell something like a half of it and the rest is salted and fed to the children. We also make butter but our dairy herd is not strong enough to give us more than enough to supply a few families and as the children don't eat butter, it is either sold to the staff or the families in Lolowai. The herd does give enough milk to give everybody in the school a glass each day and I think this is part of the reason why our children look so healthy.

Religion also plays a very vital part of the school life. We are part of the Anglican Diocese of Melanesia and this is very high Anglican indeed. We have prayers every morning at 6.00 and also again every evening at 6.30. Every Sunday morning we have mass and we sometimes have this two or three times during the week. On special days we have a service with incense and holy water and this is quite something.

Although I think some of the children do not appreciate having to get up at 6.00 in the morning, church going does add a lot to the spirit of the school and they all take a real part in the services. Their hymn singing is exceptionally good and with 120 of us singing in four parts the singing is superb and puts Wanganui High School to shame. Every night we sing the Nunc Dimitus and the Magnificat and the children know about five or six different tunes for each of these. Also they often have to start the hymns themselves as none of the staff knows them. (No-one on the staff has been here for longer than a year and a half but the longest any boy has been here is eight years).

We do not have a great deal of organised entertainment here in the school but the children are very good at entertaining themselves. They sing a lot in the dormitories and sometimes the boys in their dormitories and the girls in theirs will sing the same song across the valley. When you realise that the school lies in a valley with the boys' dormitories on the hill on one side and the girls' in the valley on the other, this sounds quite good.

Like many teachers I know I am inclined to think that my class is the best one in the school. This is not behaviour wise as I think they are probably about the liveliest and noisiest. I have a great range of age in it, with the youngest just thirteen years old and the eldest nineteen and a half. (In fact John is about six months older than me). Jeremiah is the youngest and he is very small and I think that sometimes the school day is just a little too long for him.

We have a very effective prefect system here at Vureas and the prefects are each given a lot more responsibility than those at home. The school is divided into three sections for girls and six sections for boys and they eat in these sections. There is a prefect for each section and they are entirely responsible for making sure that all meals are cooked and that they grow enough for the section in their gardens. These gardens provide two of their meals each day and only the third main one is provided by the school gardens. Although Mr Lawrence does know what is going on in each of these sections he is there to help only if the prefect asks.

The New Hebrides itself is an odd place. Run by both the British and the French at the same time it is often torn a bit between the two. There is very little love lost between the two governments and they do not work very well in running the place. They both seem to worry about running it for the French and for the British instead of for the New Hebrideans and it has taken a while for the New Hebrideans to realise just what is happening to them. However, there are one or two good points to say for the condominium. If the British do something the French have got to do something a little better and vice versa. I am sure that the place would still be improved if they worked together though, and instead of having two education departments and two Police forces and so on they would be much better off with one of each.

The condominium government produces an extremely odd language mixture also. Each island has its own language, and people from one island do not understand the language from the next unless they have learnt it. New Hebrideans educated at a French school speak French. Those educated at a British school speak English and the only language common to the whole group is Bislama. This is Pidgin English which has developed into a language of its own and English speaking people from outside the islands do not understand it. Every child at the school speaks at least three languages, their own island language, Bislama, and English and many of them speak other languages as well. I have one boy who tells me that he speaks seven languages and he is not lying or exaggerating. I have no doubt that there are others in the same situation as him.
