students taste kind and the tea taste sweet. As at the time of writing a unique position prevails -


no-one is leaving. What are we going to do for morning







IN MEMORIAM

ROY LOCKLEY LUPTON ...

Born December 1st, 1919, at Morcombe (just a few miles from Lancaster) he attended Morcombe Grammar School and won a County Scholarship to Heckmondwike Grammar School, a small town south of Leeds.

He won a County Grant to Manchester University graduated B.Sc. Hons. (Chem.), trained at Liverpool University for his first job, the Army. 2nd Lt in REME-stationed near Ipswich (near Norwich). After D Day to Germany - via France, Belgium, Holland. Demobbed 1947. To Manchester University for Teaching Diploma. Taught Bury Technical College, Kendall Grammar School. 1953 applied to come to New Zealand. 1954 Girls' College; 1957 Boys' College; 1960 Wanganui High School. Retired 1979.

One is acutely conscious, facing death directly, that the spark that made life is no longer present - that whatever made the person is absent and abides elsewhere.

In exactly the same way, the bare facts outlined are lifeless. What made the man, the warm human being, is not there.

In Roy's breadth of background some people saw a flowering of centuries of English culture. One trait was his perseverence, that Lancashire stubborness to endure, to fight, to persist and never give in. It showed up in so many ways - his round the mountain jaunts, his confidence in his own ability, his surety in danger. His wife said that when he was in Army training, they were 60 miles apart - and each used to bike 30 miles to meet in the middle and see each other. The bike became part of his trademark, even after he retired. He had a disdain for easy travel, specially motorised and aquatic.

After his demob he hated the idea of returning to the industrial north. Perhaps Germany gave him his love of the open spaces and meeting up with New Zealanders led

to a curiosity about New Zealand.

He was recuited in England by Dr Mollie Christie to Wanganui Girls' College and came out to find the science job filled, but was offered a position as a Biology Mistress. Remember those Anzac WGC parades with the level black gym hems and straight panamas? Because of his drilling of the rejects, Roy became master-in-charge. There were so many girls at WHS who came up and said, "Please sir, you taught my mother at Girls' College."

He went to Wanganui Boys' College in 1957 as a Chemistry teacher and it was probably Doug Smellie who, to Cec Day's annoyance, I would think, inadvertently turn-

ed his thoughts to Wanganui High School.

He became Head of Science at Wanganui High School in 1960 - taking the Chemistry classes away from John Caradus.

One of the greatest loves of his life was the teaching of chemistry; and what a superb teacher he was. Pupils simply loved him - and how many in three schools have gone through his hands either to an abiding love and enrichment in Science, like Kirsty Laws and Stephen Henderson whose Scholarship photos latterly adorned the entrance to his office or others whose life was enriched by his wide-ranging and catholic background, for he was no narrow scientist. Most of his students have cause to remember with excitement his explosive experiments, the trash can lid embedded in the ceiling, the dust exploded from Collegiate rafters. Even after he retired he didn't retire. His love of chemistry led him to teach or relieve in almost all the schools in town.

Yes, as a teacher he was inspiring. His linking of literature to chemistry by Shakespeare quotation is still remembered. "Now watch this precipitate 'It droppeth as the gentle rain from heaven."

"I beg your pardon, Sir?"

"It droppeth . . . Don't you do any Shakespeare anymore?"

"Only in chemistry, Sir."

As a teacher he never believed in pupils taking notes that wasted too much time. He prepared and cyclostyled his own notes so they could look and listen.

He virtually pre-empted programme learning, David tells me, in the 6th Form. Introduction, experiment, consolidation and test in a week - all on one unit. He had so many mnemonics and jokes to help pupils remember tables.

Q. What do you get if you feed the cat calcium carbide and water?

A. Acetylene kittens (a set of lean kittens).

His class at Wanganui Girls' College still remember the silica gardens they made. He asked each to write a poem on it, and quoted:

"Shall I compare these to a summer's day Thou art more lovely, made of silicate."

Roy inherited a deep love of music. His knowledge of G & S was phenomenal-enough to sing lustily and not to repeat himself the whole length of the Parapara. You would likewise see him sitting with Susan enrapt in the Messiah or the Bach St Matthew Passion.

His love of the outdoors is perhaps the main memory most students will have of him - canoeing the Wanganui River, making Tramping Club porridge, coming down the Otaki Gorge or the Waitotara or the Kuratau. The School Hut was his inspiration. He founded the Wanganui High School Tramping Club and he and Peggy with Susan on his back went looking for a site. The enthusiasm was his; the logs were grown on his piece of Bastia Hillside, milled, taken by the Army to Ruapehu College and carried in by relay and the hut built. Peggy remembers that for four months every weekend he was away building the hut or tramping elsewhere. He went up in November 1979 to help put it in order and repaint it before he retired.

Roy had been a fisherman in England in the sea and in the rivers - he and George Lewin would swap stories of perch and pike, dace and tench. They would go off to Wiritoa with float and spoon to catch perch - confounding the locals. It was probably Les Gregory and Johnny Johnson who introduced him to trout fishing and a combination of John Maxey's canning out and Stan Davis's ply canoe led to his unique experiment of canoe harling for trout - and

As his eyes grew more tired, he tied bigger and bigger monstrosities of flies - and caught bigger and bigger fish. He loved fishing at Kuratau - it became a passion and if he hadn't been up to the lake for a month or two his fingers itched to hear the scream of the reel - and once there to be out while it was still dark at 6am to hook that elusive big brownie before dawn.

People remember with affection his tremendous sense of humour. He could get very angry - with senseless vandalism of tramping huts or senseless vandalism in a laboratory. But it never lasted. He was always optomistic and cheerful - his love of Wooster would erupt into an apt quotation or dissolve the staff meeting seriousness with his dry wit.

Roy enjoyed life. He was always optomistic. Life was too interesting to waste looking back. Life was a continuing adventure, This positive attitude allowed him to get on well with all students. His psychology was excellent. He would stress Maori courtesy and get loyal co-operation. He would stress male weaknesses in dissection and get female expertise resulting.

Roy was a big man - not only big in frame but enormous hearted! Always encouraging, always reassuring, always uplifting. His willingness to help young staff in practise and in theory has benefited many schools in the city. He would spend hours of his own time with anyone who asked for extra help. I feel sure this tolerance, caring and patience had its origin, perhaps in Dalton Hall, the Quaker Hostel where he spent his University years, and it came naturally - he knew no other way.

John Donne said, "every man is a piece of a continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less . . . Any man's death diminishes me, be-

cause I am involved in mankind."

Roy's death has diminished all of us - for he was a fine friend, and his talent was so wide ranging and touched so many people. Yet in a way we aren't diminished. He enriched us all. We will carry a piece of him in our heart.

I suppose we all feel the tragedy that he should have had longer to enjoy retirement for he did love life so. He was a gentle man, caring and kindly. His outflowing love was ever present. The blessing that Mort Fountain often used to end assembly impressed Roy. But then he exemplified so much of it —

Go forth to the world in peace, be of good courage, hold fast to that which is good, render no man evil for evil, strengthen the fair hearted, support the weak, help the afflicted, honour all men.

The quotation on the memorial cover at his funeral service typified him. One couldn't choose better than the lines Shakespeare gives to Brutus - the noblest Roman of the all.

"His life was gentle, and the elements So mixed in him, that Nature might stand up And say to all the world, 'This was a Man'."

Mr ALAN DUNSMUIR died on 15 October 1981. He was Technician for the Science Department from 1976 until 1979. He came to help the school, despite being retired and not in the best of health, since specialist Science Technicians were very hard to obtain.

We must be very thankful for his services and his skill in maintenance and construction of equipment.

HIDEYUKI NAKASHIMA

I have been staying in New Zealand for nine months. Compared to my school in Japan this school is quite different...

Most upsetting thing for me was √. In New Zealand ✓ means "correct", however in Japan ✓ means "wrong".

Instead of ✓ we get a circle if the answer is correct. So when my first maths test was given back to me I found no circle at all but many ✓'s. I nearly fainted.

By the way, I do not do so well with exams or tests here. Most annoying thing in doing exams is that I just can't answer in English, especially in chemistry and biology exams, for they have a host of technical words which are all English. That is why I sometimes feel so irritated when I do exams. And that also prevents me from studying at home because I can't read and understand even the text books without looking up the words into the dictionary hundreds of times a page. So, not to mention, I got incredible marks. But I was not upset because I am used to getting bad marks.

The pleasant thing is we don't get punishment even when we fail in exams here in New Zealand. It is also pleasing for me not to get punished even when we are late for school here. The teachers in Japan hit our heads or cheeks softly, sometimes hardly. Or we have got to run on a playground. One of the teachers at Wanganui School even looks forward to listening to my excuse for being late rather than

gets angry with me.

Another difference is the assembly. We don't have the assembly twice a week over there, we have just once a month. We all stand up and listen to the Headmaster's boring speech. Some of the teachers in Japan say jokes at assembly to relax us, however they are sometimes so silly or childish that we say "SHI - I - I - I', which means "bloody boring". Of course, we are not allowed to say that, but we say it bravely. Anyway I enjoy staying here and I would like to thank all the teachers and students for treating me so nicely. "Tah".

Extract from CAROL HADDON'S LETTER

"My Japanese has improved a lot but there is still so much to learn. There are so many ways to say the same thing depending on whether you're being polite, normal, angry, using school slang or just the various dialects that even the Japanese can't understand.

I leave for school - which is 10 minutes by foot - at eight every morning and get home at 6.30pm when I have club practise, and 4-4.30pm on the others. My club is karate which I'm really enjoying but the training is hard. Though there is no one teacher involved with the club, every one goes to practice and trains hard - self discipline and loyalty to groups are strong characteristics of the Japanese people.

School is more interesting this term. Mind you, its taken a while to get used to. My school is very serious. Students don't often talk in class — it's like a lecture from the teacher. At the beginning of the lesson we stand and

bow and at the end, the same.

WHS would find it easier to teach Japanese students, I think? PE lessons are one thing Mrs Mahoney would enjoy. Everyone has the right PE gear and is ready to begin on time. We line up in ranks and call out the number of lines, then account for absences. We then have set exercises for about 10 minutes after which we run or learn other things such as volleyball or track and field continually for the rest of the hour. We then line up, number off again, bow, and go off to class almost dead! Also we have sports tests — soon is the marathon, about 7km and nobody walks!

. . . I never realised how crowded Japan was until I came - but just to give you an idea I can touch the next door neighbour's roof from the bathroom window and I've yet to find a place without people."

Extract from letter from GAYLENE KENDRICK

Let me tell you about some of the good things that happen here. I'm very happy - I don't think AFS could have given me a better placement.

Samarinda is as far as the good road goes up the East

Coast of Borneo. There are rough tracks further on that you could take a landrover on, but it's best to take planes to isolated townships further up. Samarinda is built around the biggest river in Indonesia, the Mahakam, and it hasn't any bridges across it. So to get to my house we have to put the car on a ferry which operates all day and most of the night. Luckily, most of the city is also on our side of the river so we only need to cross when we are leaving the

city.

During August the Government here that is in control of the tribal areas of East Kalimantan sponsored a boat trip up the Mahakam for us six exchange students and friends of AFS. It was an incredible trip - two days in a very old rocking boat travelling up the river visiting little villages and stopping at shops that were built on rafts and strung together especially for the boats travelling up and down the river, two days living in the traditional long house with the Dyak people, natives of East Kalimantan, and then travelling back home again; overall five days and it was one experience after another. Everywhere we stopped on the way up we were surrounded by children; they walked with us and watched us eat and listened to us talk as if it was of great importance. We had incredible welcome parties where we almost had to fight out way through all the children lining up to see us and touch us. When we left the main river we had to travel by long boat as the water was very shallow. It was while travelling in these shallow small boats we saw the monkeys on the sides of the river. I nearly tipped our boat over when I saw my first one I was so excited. We saw others swimming around the fishermen's nets, scaring the fish and flamingos (white) standing in the shallows of the lake. At the village we were treated like royalty - ate a lot of sweet pineapples, bananas, and drunk coconut milk. We were treated to a night of traditional dances - they were't very spectacular in either actions or costumes but the control of the girls was quite incredible. They weren't very native-natives; they lived in houses and used toothpaste and soap just like we do, and the women don't pull their ears down to the shoulders anymore. (There was a reason for that apart from beauty - they hung weights to stretch the ear lobes and also to make it painful for the women to turn their heads quickly - so the women hold their heads high and straight, which was meant to keep them on the straight path of life.) I was a little disappointed in that they had used modern things on their traditional costumes. They had plastic buttons decorating the hats and sequins on the skirts instead of their hand weaving and embroidery, also the necklaces had money threaded in between the beads. I guess such changes are to be expected. We were sad to leave that happy little village. It was on our way home that we realised what the phrase "AFS is experience" is all about. We were back in our old rocking boat when we stopped at a village to help evacuate houses of furniture, etc., as a fire sped through a row of houses. The wood that the houses are made out of is just so dry and the roofs are just a bark shingle or bamboo leaves, that the fire just jumped from one house to another. It was eventually controlled by hoses attached to motors that were pumping water out of the river. Five houses were completely burnt and two or three others damaged. We continued down river when smoke started drifting out of the engine room on the boat. "Hey, look, we are on fire now" somebody said, and we all laughed. Next time we looked there were flames shooting out of the roof and we all had to "abandon ship" .: Luckily we were close to shore so we saved most of the luggage, including all the cameras which we agreed were the most important. So there we stood, up to our thighs in mud watching our boat burn. Luckily another boat came past and took us back to Samarinda, but to use an old AFS saying, "What an experience".

CHOIR



On 30 June 1977 a freak mountain accident killed fou friends in the Mt Cook Na ional Park. In memory Craig Benge, Bill Benne Rob McLean and Fene Druce the Four Friends Me orial Trust was set up.

The trustees sponsor a group of eight people to co mence a special course held at "Tawhitikura" Outdo Pursuits Centre of NZ in the Tongariro National Par Heather Wallace and I were lucky enough to attend th 1980 course under the expert instruction of Tony Parker.

On the first day, eight nervous people clambered over a confidence course of rope bridges, log swings, tyre jumps and ultimately the "big swing" and flying fox. This was supposed to build our confidence for the mid-air gymnastics necessary in learning the basics of Rock Climbing on the man-made wall at the centre and later descending off a bluff into the Mangatepopo Gorge. The next day we studied map reading and tried our luck at orientation. However certain navigators on the 2nd pitch got us totally off the track although we did manage to work our way across t familiar country to an old opossum hunter's hut where were met by Tony. The rest of the day was spent ro climbing from the inside out! Squeezing through ho that looked far too small and getting caked in mud ma the limestone caving absorbing to say the least. The 3 and 4th days were spent on (and in) the Tongariro Rive and in the Te Kaanu hotpools (pure luxury). We made tyre raft and floated (almost!) over 21 rapids. Little did we know that we'd be kayaking it later on. I was really gripped about this but just managed to go the entire run without falling out; unlike someone else who liked scaring the instructor silly by showing her prowess at canoeing backwards down a Grade 4 shute without using a paddle!

The last three days were spent mountaineering in al most white-out conditions with the idea of building a snow igloo. All went well until a huge crack developed on one side. Needless to say, we slept in the Ski Patrol hut while the weather raged outside.

I strongly recommend anyone with the opportunity to apply for the Four Friends Trust course. It is rewarding not only physically but mentally. You gain a whole new

family and you must be able to accept and appreciate them no matter what, because although the course teaches you to be confident in yourself and your ability you still have to depend on seven other people in some exhilarating situations

Thanks must go to OPC for the incredible job they do and to the trustees, without whom the course would never have been set up. Both organisations have my full backing and I hope others encourage the trust to held the course again — it's truly p md-blowing! — Julie Rowland, 7th

RIENDS OF THE PACIFIC

In May of this year I was lucky enough to experience a once-in-a-lifetime trip to the Tongan group of islands called Vava'u, for this was no ordinary overseas trip. You may have heard of an organisation called "Friends of the Pacific'. This organisation, based in Wanganui, selected students from applications by 6th and 7th formers all over NZ to participate in giving not only financial help, but also practical aid in the form of refurbishing and upgrading community buildings such as schools and sometimes churches. Three pupils from Wanganui went on the May trip - Geoff McGowan, also from WHS and Duncan Wilson

of Collegiate.

Each group member is asked to raised \$100 with school help, as well as paying for his/her return airfare. Our destination in May was to Tailulu College, Neiafu, Vava'u. But this school, run by the Free Church of Tonga, is vastly different from any colleges here. It had virtually no furniture, the pupils sitting on the concrete floor, so we set about building desks and forms and, before long, we had bought all the wide timber available in Vava'u! Before we arrived we had sent over nine sewing machines which we had had converted from treadles or motor drive to hand operation. Of course, electric sewing machines were a bit pointless as the only electricity available at the school came from a generator and could only be used sparingly. We also took with us many lengths of material and although it was school holidays over there we found many 4th Form Tongan girls crowding around eager to learn to sew. Such a difference from pupils in NZ who are often reluctant to work and do not appreciate education at all. These Tongan pupils worked very hard and were so proud of the little that their school did possess.

Our group of 16 lived in the school since it was their school holidays. We were expecting to sleep on mats on the floor, but instead, mattresses were all made up beautifully

for each one of us.

Of course, apart from sewing, making desks and painting buildings, we did get a lot of time to do all those things you dream of doing on tropical islands. Many days we worked only for four hours and Sunday is a complete day of rest. But because of the climate it would not be possible to do a lot more in the heat. We went on a boat trip to an outer island one day - Nuku - with its long sandy, white beaches, coral reef, crystal clear waters, one of many Tongan feasts cooked in a traditional "umu" and the inevitable swaying palms.

Vava u is undoubtedly the most beautiful of the Tongan group and the scenery is often breathtaking. The kindness and open generosity of the Tongan people is overwhelming. For me, this aspect made it such a wonderful

experience.

So, if you're 16 or older, interested in helping other less fortunate than ourselves, are not afraid of a bit of wor and would like a taste of genuine island life, not the tour package variety, then a Friends of the Pacific work camp for you! Mr Woodbury would be happy to tell you mo am sure.

COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

Having arrived at High School as HOD Commercial at the start of term II, I thought this would be an ideal opportunity to express some opinions about this area of study in general. The Commercial Department covers three disciplines - accounting, economics and typing. Accounting and typing are well established areas of study. Some change, however, is taking place at the moment in order to keep

pace with the rapid changes occuring in practice.

At the end of this year School Certificate candidates from High School will be examined in accounting for the first time. Previous students were examined in bookkeeping (now defunct). Accounting is offered at 5th, 6th and 7th form level. Students in the 5th form should be well motivated to enable them to cope adequately. This is because accounting is somewhat narrow in its scope, Ideally, students should opt for this subject because they anticipate studying further after school, as Professional Accountants, Chartered Accountants or, perhaps, Auditors. There is some correlation between accounting and mathematics. Economics Studies is offered in the 3rd, 4th and 5th forms. Pure Economics is studied at 6th and 7th form level. Both subjects are relatively new areas of study and have outstanding potential for growth due to their general appeal. Economics is a human science, which means it can be taken in conjunction with mathematics (a natural science) and with geography, and especially history (social science). It must be stressed at this point that study in this area is not preparation for future employment. It is, rather, preparation for living; students receive instruction in the major problems facing NZ (and the world) at the moment, ie. inflation (causes and possible solutions), unemployment, the economy, the value of money and so on. As in the case of accounting, motivated students (irrespective of academic skills) are encouraged to take up studies in the most exciting area of the curriculum.

Typing, like accounting, is in a state of change. New syllabuses have been introduced at School Certificate level, with attempts made to link keyboard skills to other areas such as computer programming. Typing is a practical subject, requiring definite mechanical skills. Students need to be well disciplined. Like economics, this area is not a preparation for employment; the well-motivated and diligent students, however, should have no difficulty in finding suitable employment, not necessarily as typists!

In conclusion, I would like to say that I am very happy to be at High School and look forward to building up a most important part of the curriculum. Any parents who are uncertain about any aspect of studies in the Commercial area are most welcome to consult me at any time.

OBITUARY

DONNA ELIZABETH SPEAK ...

Attended Wanganui High School 1979-1981.

When one walked into a classroom, Donna's warm, friendly personality was only too obvious. The charming smile that was always a part of Donna was a welcome beginning for any teacher. Her maturity and courteous manner, and her well groomed and immaculate appearance was a fine example for all to follow. Donna's wide circle of friends was the indication of how supportive and understanding she always was of her peers. Her diligent, enthusiastic approach to her schoolwork was a delight. Students of this calibre are all too rare so the loss of Donna as a member of our school was indeed a tragedy.

ROSEMARY PATERSON ...

If you had to sum up the outstanding qualities of Rosemary Paterson you might use two simple words - life and warmth.

Rosemary had such a zest for life. She was full of vitality. She bubbled and sparkled; the rapid speech, the

words tumbling out, the quick step, the wide eyes, the freshness, the openness of that alive face. She radiated such a positive warm attitude. Immediately you felt she was a welcoming person. Compared with so much gloom in today's world, Rosemary always greeted life with a friendly smile. You couldn't help but feel this warmth, this interest in people when you met her.

She was born in Hastings. Educated at Hastings Girls' High. To Dunedin then Christchurch to gain a Dip. H/Ec., and train as a teacher. She returned to Hastings to teach, also at Woodford House and later at Central H.B. College. She married in 1971 and moved to Waipukurau in 1972

and to Wanganui in 1976.

The facts of Rosemary's short life are slender. The worth of her life was far from that. Her life centred not around facts and things, but people. For Rosemary's greatest talent was making friends. She just seemed to

gather people to her.

I remember the day she and Tim moved in to their new house, followed by streams of well-wishers and cars, and this seems to have continued ever since. As well as going out to coffee mornings to meet people she invited people home to meet each other. She was generous, not only in hospitality, but in giving of herself. She never maligned people or put anyone down. You always felt welcome whoever you were. There was no side in any of her relationships.

Rosemary first came to WHS as a Home Economics Teacher to help out when somebody left. Judy Titter remembers Rosemary breezing in when Judy was cleaning up a mess, this bright young thing saying "I'm Rosemary

Paterson, what would you like me to do?"

She was the image of a good Home Economics Teacher, interested, keen, believing strongly in what she was doing, and she was very good at her job - efficient, supportive. Pupils liked her.

She returned to WHS again in 1981 when a vacancy suddenly occurred. This time to teach junior science, not really her subject but a major interest. She became a dedicated science teacher, always well prepared, always willing to help; a real asset to the Science Department. There was no question of her ability. The Inspectors this year said some of the best teaching they had seen in Junior Science was by part-time teachers - they meant Rosemary.

As a Home Economics teacher you would expect her to be a competent housewife and gracious hostess. She was, She was a concerned and caring mother, a tolerant and long-suffering wife - a cricket wife. Her husband and the

children came a clear first in her life.

The greatest quality she possessed in the last two years was her tremendous courage, I think all who knew her admired her after her operation. She endured about six months of treatment and all those wearying trips to Palmerston North. She never felt sorry for herself. She never indulged in self-pity. Her courage was a clear example.

Perhaps the fear, always carefully hidden in the back of her mind, of her mother's early death, compelled her to make the most of every day and live it to the full. She never moped. She seemed determined to be as normal as possible, determined to take up life again as if each day was enough in itself and precious to her. That such tenacity and brightness should be lost is part of our human tragedy, for we all lose her reflected radiance. It is the sudden loss of this goodness that causes such numbing buman hurt.

"Life and warmth". It is significant that the worth of Rosemary's life is not measured by the great things she did, or the positions she held, or the organisations she assisted. but by what she was as a person - the quality of her life.

Perhaps she achieved more in this way in her thirtytwo years of life than we might in twice the time.


