

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The wheel turns, another notch in the history of the school is recorded, another set of students move on. They will leave behind patterns in our fabric, for they have made their especial mark, given their especial stamp. These are the seniors whom the Inspectorial Report singles out. "We were particularly impressed with the senior students who demonstrated a commitment to leadership and support for all students". We thank you for the care, loyalty and lustre you have added to the school by being here, in doing so many things for so many years.

We also lost staff. We congratulate Mr Janes and now Mr Rowland on their promotion as Heads of Departments in other schools. We lose Miss McLellan to overseas travel and Mrs Phillips to follow her husband to Hamilton. We thank her for her family and her years of loyalty and service. It is sad to see Mr Wakely retire for, with his going, an era in the school closes — the only remaining member of the original staff. Thank you for your 30 years of service to the school and all the students you have helped. We need to congratulate Mrs Titter on the energy and dedication she has shown in her job as Acting Senior Mistress.

There is no sorrow at all in losing another old storage prefab for a new Skyline garage. The whole school shines in a new coat of paint, the extended and refurbished Music Suite was opened in April, the mezzanine floor in the Library was closed in, two cricket practice wickets are now operating and of course our Gymnasium extensions are more than half finished. Many thanks to all who made donations towards our share of the cost.

The school embarked on big fundraising ventures to help, two big raffles in the first term procuring \$10,000 for the Gym (and over \$17,000 for charity) and now another venture at the end of the year selling 'mystery envelopes'. As well we will complete our Community Day when all Third and Fourth Formers find jobs to do without pay, returning thanks and acknowledging support given to us by the Community.

Again school life teems with action. We continue to do well in Athletics (gold medals in North Island Championships), Cross-Country, Hockey (boys' and girls' tournaments), Netball (Smith Cup), Basketball, Sailing, Rugby (representatives). We have figures in most student representative teems. Our record is quite enviable.

The school continues to host overseas exchange students (nine during the year) and send our students overseas (8) to all parts of the world. We delighted in hosting 17 Japanese students from Tokyo schools for two weeks in August. We've done well to procure eight berths on the "Spirit of Adventure",

On a cultural side we've more than held our own — a resurrection in school music in the Music Festival and Arts Festival, Westpac winners — choir, orchestra, brass ensemble, soloists.

Pupils have also distinguished themselves in several Maths competitions — Regional Mathex (we hosted) ANZ and Australian Maths.

We've distinguished ourselves with another highly successful musical "Starmaker", Mr Mahoney's production skills blending with Miss Harman's musical direction and Mr Goad's choreography.

We've done well in Language competitions in German, Japanese and especially Maori, where Hareruia Abraham won two top prizes in the National Korimako Speech Competitions in Tauranga.

The school also weathered a full scale school inspection

by 14 departmental inspectors in August — and came out very well — in fact most areas of the school were congratulated and we received some fine tuning for the future.

The PTA has been resourceful and supportive as usual, completing and carpeting the seating in the Cafeteria and donating to the school from its very successful cake auction and pizza drive.

But the pattern of events also includes exams, dances, Third and Seventh Form Camps (350 students under canvas), Pitmans Typing exams, Field Trips of all sorts, university visits, the Navy Band, tramping trips (mainly to the Lupton Hut). The list is endless.

Yet all these are peripheral. Undergirding the pattern lies the main fabric of the school a co-educational caring community, dedicated to the pursuit of excellence wherever students show it, a commitment to develop individual talents whether inside or outside the classroom, to use the abundant opportunities that pulsate life within a big school to create the 'full person'.

The wheel turns, another notch is completed; yet in a sense the wheel will remain still, as another set of pupils, eager and alert, confident and optimistic take their place in the Third Form in 1988 and create new life and energy.




The new crest donated by PTA on the hall.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS' REPORT

The Board of Governors, has carried out its responsibilities for administration with considerable frustration. The financial needs of the school can not be met from the funds presently made available by Government. So much of the Board's work is associated with expenditure and trying to identify expenditure priorities. It has been necessary throughout 1987 for the finance committee to continually monitor school funds. The Board acknowledges the efforts of the Principal and Senior Staffin endeavouring to stay within the budgeted limits established earlier this year. We would be in a serious situation should parents not continue to support the school financially. The demands on the school staff to assist with fundraising activities to ensure we can purchase basic teaching aids is taking teachers away from their chosen profession — teaching. The Board is calling for the widest possible discussion from the school community as to how we fund the ever-increasing deficit between school administration costs and Government supplied funds. Do we fundraise, develop commercial income, or set higher school fees? Whatever the answer this financial problem must be addressed.

This school, like many in the country, is feeling the effects of a shortage of trained secondary teachers. This has at times made the appointment of suitable teachers impossible due to a lack of, and in some instances, no applications, for advertised positions. Such situations put unnecessary pressure on departments and is unfair on teachers in the classroom and their students. The Board appreciates the considerable time spent by the Principal to ensure the least amount of disruption to student learning. During the year High School received resignations from a number of staff, some of whom had given years of loyal service to the school. The Board acknowledges their contribution to our school and wishes them well in the future. Resignations also provide an opportunity to make new appointments and we have welcomed a number of well qualified teachers to the school.

The Education Department Inspectors visited the school and the Board has received its report. This document is to be



subjected to careful consideration by the Board in association with the Principal and Senior Staff. While there are areas within the school that has prompted the Inspectors to forward recommendations, the clear message is Wanganui High School is in very good heart, with a committed staff and responsive students. A good example of our staff's attitude to teaching is the number who attend in-service courses in their own time.

Following hard on the changes to senior school examinations has been other proposed changes to exercise the minds of the Board. These included re-structuring of Education Administration, Access Training Schemes, and how they may effect school rules (remember it is roll numbers that are the criteria for financing schools and establishing staffing entitlements) and the four-term year.

The enrolment scheme in Wanganui has unfair cost implications for our school. Again we are required to turn away over 100 third form applications for 1988. The time taken by the Principal and Office Staff to process these applications is becoming excessive and costly. It's time for all parties associated with the enrolment scheme to share the cost on a more equitable basis.

Our playing fields came through the 1987 winter very well. The testing and monitoring programme appears to have been successful. This, along with a willing and capable ground staff has provided an outdoor environment enjoyed

by students. The grounds committee has produced a ground development/landscaping plan which will be funded as finances allow.


The exterior painting of all buildings has presented a fresh clean look to the school. The completion of the music suite and the extension to the gymnasium has meant disruption to school life from time to time.

The introduction of the Health Education Programme for 4th form students was very successful. With parents aware of the programme, students showed they too were ready for factual knowledge. The teaching of the Health syllabus enabled students to understand the basic requirements of good health, to develop a sense of responsibility for their own health, and to take constructive action for personal health, for the health needs of others, and for the health issues in the community.



END OF AN ERA



When Mr Wakely started teaching here 29 years ago, who would have imagined that he would watch Wanganui High School develop from a small, unproven establishment of 150 third form pupils to a school which has a roll of over 1000 pupils in the 1980's, well-established grounds and buildings and facilities which would have been the envy of those students and staff of 1958?

Mr Wakely has seen many changes. First of all, there was only C and D blocks as well as the partially-completed office and staffroom block. Now in 1987, High School has nine complete blocks of classrooms including Science laboratories. Moreover, most blocks have recently been renovated. Facilities in 1958 were scarce. Even the rugby fields were only paddocks of uncut grass. There was no library, swimming pool, gymnasium. Centre Court was just sand instead of concrete pathways. Mr Wakely has himself helped with various fund-raising activities for projects like the swimming pool and other facilities that High School has obtained over the years. Other aspects of the school have also changed while he has been here. For instance in the first years, sports

were limited to Rugby, Soccer, Cricket and Netball. Nowadays that limited choice has grown so that a much greater variety of sports are now played by students. These are just some of the changes that have occurred at High School.

He retires this year, having taught from the school's opening, sharing his wealth of experience in teaching Woodwork and Technical drawing. However, enduring eager 3rd and 4th formers is bad enough, let alone teaching them!

There are many great memories he does have of Wanganui High School. Take for example, the opening of the swimming pool when two teachers pushed the Chairman of the Board in the pool, which caused everyone to scream and yell in horror — a well-planned joke by the chairman.

Up until 1966, discipline and military exercises were the order of the day when the Cadet Corp was in operation. They took part in shooting practice at the Putiki Rifle Range and a whole range of other activities. However, the girls had to make do with activities such as knitting.

Along with the memories he has also the distinction of being the ONLY teacher to have been here continually since the school began and therefore has seen every student that has come to High School so far.

He has retired from his position at High School to use his cabinet-making and carpentry skills in a new service for the elderly. In becoming a self-styled "House Doctor" he has fulfilled an ambition to become a professional handyman.

With his retirement, an era has come to an end. It is an era in which he has made lasting friendships with other teachers and students, some of whom are now famous for their exploits or successful in their chosen careers. Some are mentioned in the "Slice of Life" column later and it is these personalities that he remembers most. He used examples of noted ex-students in his speech at this year's Senior Prizegiving to encourage present students to make the most of their abilities and opportunities.

Mr Wakely has earned himself an honourable place in the School's history. The School wishes him all the best for the future.


ART DEPARTMENT 1987







AUSTRALIAN MATHS COMPETITION

It was during the month of August that 173 Wanganui High School students succumbed to the pressure of their persuasive maths teachers and collected in the hall to face the 1987 Australian Maths Competition papers.

The Australian Maths Competition is an international yearly event. The papers are translated into Spanish, French and into Pacific Island tongues. Each paper consists of 30 questions ranging from the basic to the brilliant.

We were fortunate to receive, as a school, 22 distinctions and 71 credits, which is a very praiseworthy performance. The highest scorers of each form were:

This year is the 10th anniversary of the initiation of this competition, and there was the overwhelming figure of 381,380 entries in Oceania alone (including Australia) with 18209 coming from New Zealand.

This was a particularly healthy year for participation for Wanganui High School, as with 255 schools in New Zealand competing, we provided twice the average number of entries.







To complete the year the ISCF met early one morning at the home of one of the members for a shared


"Friendship Breakfast".

A Taste of Tonga ...

F.O.P. WORKCAMP 24



In the first three weeks of this year, I was lucky enough to have been included in a Friends of the Pacific' workcamp in Tonga, the 24th of the its kind. The 16 members of the camp, had been selected from secondary student applicants, from all over New Zealand — from Dunedin to Whangarei.

We were sent to an island of Tonga, to paint four classrooms, inside and out, and we did some maintenance work as well — such as building shelves, varnishing wooden cupboards (to ward off cockroaches!) and cleaning out an old well to make it usable again.

But all this work was only a small part of the experience. The **real** experience was that of another culture — a completely different way of life, where the belief in God, not the pursuit of money, was of prime importance. Church is the most important aspect of life to the Tongan, and as we were living within their community we were expected to sit through long sermons (up to three hours!) in Tongan, dressed in our/their Sunday best. This included a type of woven mat, tied around the waist over normal Sunday clothing in unbearably hot temperatures, well into the 30° to 40° range.

Despite the odd moment of discomfort, we all had a wonderful time. You couldn't walk in any direction for more than quarter of an hour, before you came to a beach! There was plenty of time for relaxation, which included a daily swim in the body-temperature sea. There was **nowhere** we could cool down. Even at night it was often too hot for both pyjamas, however light, and a sheet!

Tongan food is a chapter in itself. If you like feasting and not getting any fatter, then this is the place for you! Unused calories were soon sweated off in the humid temperatures.

The one word that can sum up my three weeks in Tonga, is Friendship. The Tongan people were generous and friendly, far beyond the call of duty, and this was especially evident in the two homestays which we experienced. The Tongans had literally nothing, but managed to give us everything — including a new outlook on life.

But the closest friends that I made were within my

own workgroup. We lived, worked and socialised together, and all came to know each other pretty well, even better than people we've been at school with for years. We all still keep very much in touch, and have exchanged photos, letters and visits. So far, I have seen nine out of the 16 of them, and we have even arranged a reunion in Nelson this summer.

The whole trip cost me \$950, which included four plane flights, accommodation and food for the whole time, and I consider it to have been worth every last cent, and would jump at the chance to do it again. I can only encourage anyone who is interested to apply. You can't fail to have the time of your life. See Mr Woodbury for details.

Spending three weeks on a sun-filled tropical island, eating coconuts and pineapples may be your idea of paradise. It certainly is mine! But for me, Tonga is more than just a Pacific Island with beautiful beaches, wonderful food and friendly people.

I was one of the 17 privileged people accepted to work at Tupou College, Tonga on Friends of the Pacific Workshop 25. It was certainly an experience I will never

forget.

Some of the amazing experiences I encountered are not open to every Palangi (white person) who visits Tonga. As a member of F.O.P. we were given special privileges such as sitting on the verandah of the King's

Palace (most people are only allowed to look at the palace from a long way behind the fence), being guests at a total of seven feasts and being invited to choir competitions.

Everything was very relaxed in Tonga. There was no pressure to be anywhere at a certain time. This is best summed up by "Do it the Tongan Way — Tomorrow'. Tongan time became quite popular with most of us. For example, 10 o'clock is **never** 10 o'clock — expect people to be half an hour late.

While in Tonga we worked at Tupou College. For the people at this school, we painted five dormitories and put in a concrete floor. In return they gave us food, accommodation, respect and a fantastic three weeks holiday. The work we did seemed nothing compared to what they gave us — a whole different insight into a very different culture.

Some guys and girls make themselves up in the morning, but the majority don't. We don't wear a uniform, but I wish we did because it makes things a lot easier.

I have enjoyed my year and will remember it forever. I have enjoyed attending Wanganui High School and would like to thank you all for making this possible.

CATHERINE ROULLER FROM SWITZERLAND

I am Catherine Rouiller, one of the AFS students, and I come from a city called Fribourg in Switzerland (where

Gruyère cheese comes from).

As most people would know, Switzerland is a very mountainous country, in fact sixty percent of it is covered by the Swiss Alps, so of course, sports like skiing, mountaineering and rock climbing are popular. In Switzerland there are four languages spoken in the different areas. The most common is "Swiss-German", followed by French, Italian and Romansche - a native Swiss language spoken by only ten percent of the

My father is a dairy farmer, and I live on a farm just out of a village 15km away from Fribourg, where I go to school. School is very different from here. We have 38 periods in a week; school starts at quarter to eight in the

morning and finishes at about four o'clock, and we all take 12-13 subjects. I almost forgot the biggest difference: we do not wear uniform.

If you want to be involved in sports, you join a sports club, as there are no school sports teams. School is much more academically inclined in Switzerland and most friends that we have are not school friends, but friends that we make in our sports clubs.

Being in New Zealand has given me a chance to experience a different lifestyle, meet different people, and be involved in many different activities. But most of all, it has improved my English, which was a great problem when I first arrived in the country.

My year at Wanganui High School has been a great experience, and something I will never be able to forget.

MASARU MISAWA and RYOHEI ISHIKAWA FROM JAPAN

This year we have had several Japanese students staying in our school. I had a chance to talk to two of these exchange students from Japan, and asked them about the time they had here.

Masaru Misawa and Ryohei Ishikawa shared the same amazement when they first arrived in New Zealand. What surprised them was the vast rolling farmland and hundreds of sheep that fill countryside. After all, where would you find sheep

anywhere in Tokyo?

Another characteristic that provided a contrast for them is the number of cars on our roads, so few even in our rush hour compared with the constant flow in the places where they live. They were also quick to tell me how lucky we are on our roads. We can travel at good speeds while in Japan cars only go at 30km/h because of congestion.

Ryohei wanted to visit New Zealand because his school had a NZ exchange student. Masaru chose our country because he is interested in farming. His brother had come here four years ago and had spoken highly of the fun he had here, and he too had met an exchange student from New Zealand with whom he had become friendly.

On the subject of favourite food, Ryohei and Masaru both agreed that the food they like best here is roast lamb or fish and chips. They enjoy the variety here — a

change from rice anyway.

When they go back home Masaru will be returning to his second year at university and Ryohei is hoping to start university. They will both miss their host families, friends, school and the freedom they have had while

Due to the ethnic troubles in Sri Lanka at present, Chris has not been able to travel the country as he would have wished but has managed to see some of the different ways of life.



Here are some excerpts from one of his letters,

describing a typical day in Sri Lanka.

"5.30am. Alarm on watch is beeping and time to get up,. Once getting up is achieved, I switch off my fan to give the mozzies a breather and clamber about in the dark. Everybody else has been up for about an hour so I'm not worried about waking anyone up. I guess to them I've slept in. Mallika, the servant is up at 5.00am

and Father is up at 4.00am. I have a cold shower (no hot water). Breakfast is at about 6.10am and today it is hoppers' (ground rice mixed with coconut milk, salt, baking powder and flour) and a meat curry, and this beats bacon and eggs any day. After breakfast, it's off to school at about 6.35am! My host Dad believes in earliness; school begins at 7.30am, but since he's the headmaster and chaplain he has to be organised. When the bell rings and we have a roll call in our classroom, and then from there we go to the chapel for our daily service. At 7.55am chapel is over and I make my way to the library, where I spend most of my time. I arrive home at about 1.50pm and sit down to a big feed of rice, vegetables and curries. After lunch I sometimes sleep as it is so hot, or write letters or read. Dinner isn't until about 7.30pm and it is normally just a light snack. It depends on how hungry you are. Television is on from about 7.00pm, but most of the programmes that are on I've already seen in NZ. I normally hit the sack around 9.00-9.30, as I have to get up so early in the morning."


JESSICA WILLIAMS IN BRAZIL

SCHOOL BALL








NUTRITIOUS EDIBLES





LOST!



Deverik, who suffers slings and arrows from many a teacher showed true dedication, and everyone will be pleased to know he's coming back next year because as he says, "The show needs me".


The Show

"Time Warp" took my breath away. I could watch that number over and over again. Nara Su'a is a talented


singer and should go far.







Shannon 'Flare' Grace - Shannon was a steady player,



Wade Hawkins was selected for the tournament team; Angus 'Gnome' Laird was selected as most promising third form player.



Always short of players, we snatched up anyone willing, including a couple of bewildered Japanese visitors, who, in spite of their dainty appearance became surprisingly aggressive.




'R' TEAM




BOYS 1st XI SOCCER





Pacific Paradise?

Richard Robinson, winner of the 1987 Edith Wheal Scholarship, is now teaching at the Lueselemba Provincial Secondary School in the Temotu Province of the Solomon Islands.

The conditions are far from being the school life we know. Most Solomon Island kids go to a Primary school from Standard 1-5. Then at the end of that they sit an exam to decide whether or not they get to a secondary school. About 5% get accepted for a National secondary school. For the next 30% they are accepted for a Provincial secondary school. The other 60 to 65% of Std 6 pupils' education ends at Primary school. At Richard's school, students learn practical and academic subjects.

He has also had to learn Pidgin English, which is used to communicate between the ten different language groups in the school. He mentions a major problem which his school is having: a terrible lack of money. One term it got so bad that they had to close the school for lack

of food and they couldn't feed the students!
