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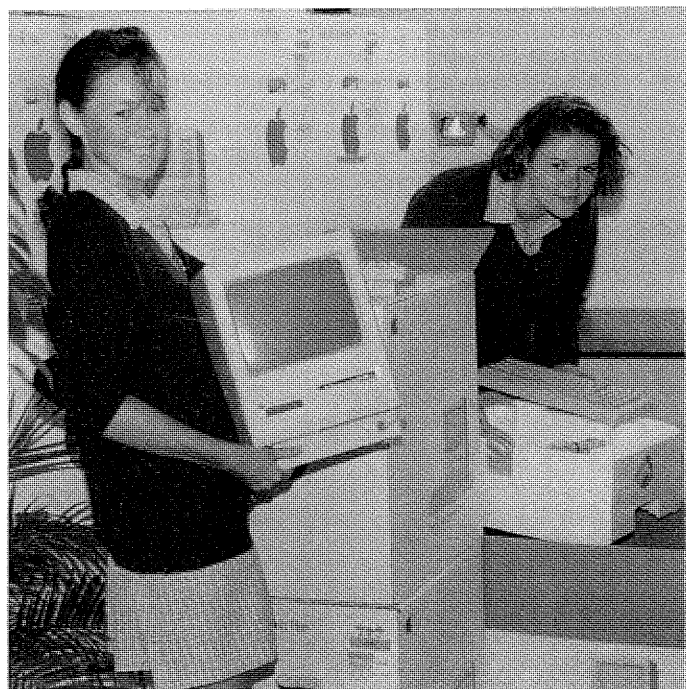

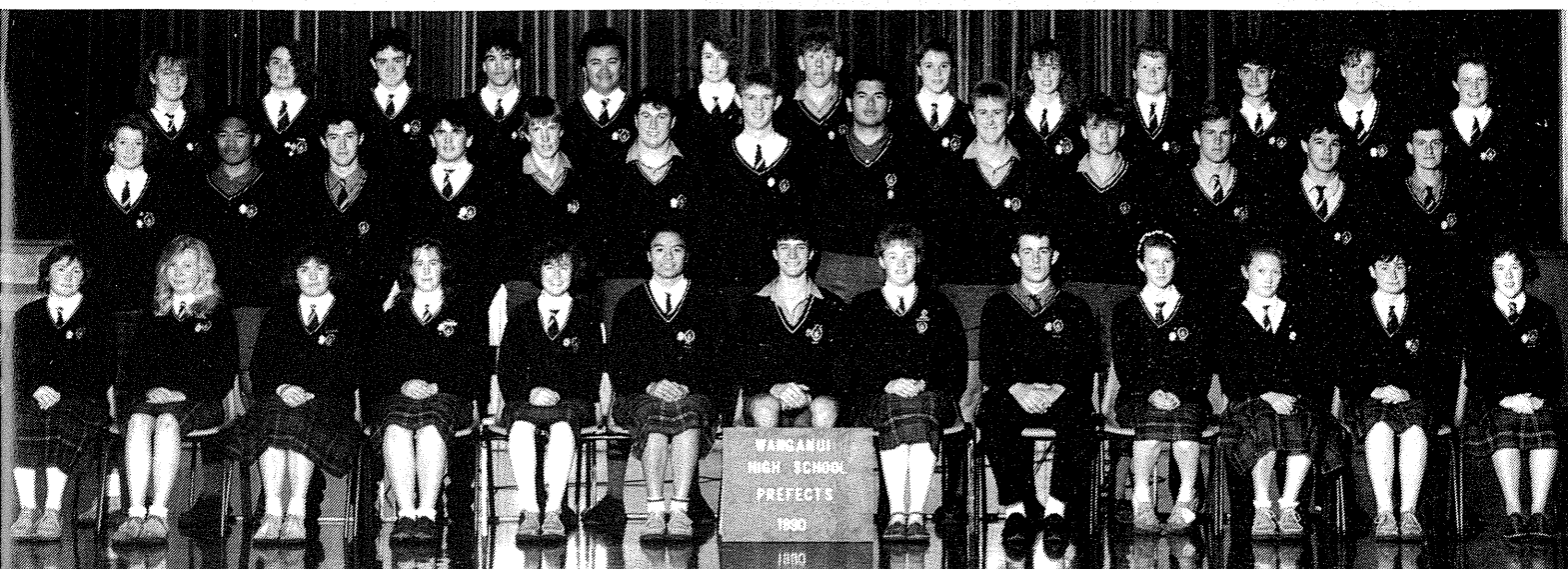

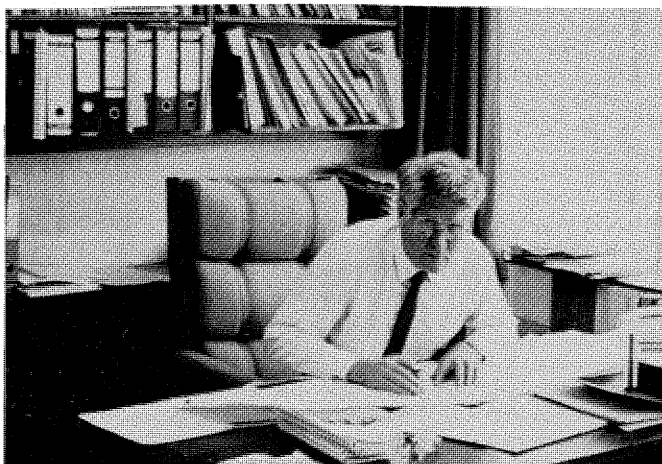

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



CELEBRATING 150 YEARS

E nga waka o nga tai e wha,
Tena Koutou, tena Koutou, tena Koutou,
Katoa!

Wanganui has a fascinating history of settlement. Kupe is said to have sailed up river over 1,000 years ago, paving the way for Turi in the Aotea canoe to land at Patea. His descendants settled the Wanganui Basin.

European contact came with visiting whalers and traders, but permanent settlement arrived on 20 June 1840 with John and Martha Mason, resident missionaries.

Land was bought from the river chiefs by Edward Jerningham Wakefield and the first settlers disembarked from the schooner "Elizabeth" on 27 February 1841.

Schools followed settlers. Mrs Mason established a school for Maori women. Then followed a mission school for Maori children that later was thrown open to settlers' children. They separated when the mission school moved to Putiki.

In 1852 Governor Grey made a land grant to Bishop Selwyn of 245 acres of swamp waste, broken by a sand ridge for "the education of our subjects of all races and of the poor and destitute persons being inhabitants of the islands in the Pacific Ocean". So began our neighbour, Wanganui Collegiate School. Others followed - Sacred Heart College 1880, Wanganui Girls'

College 1891, Wanganui Boys' College 1911 and St Augustine's College 1944.

Wanganui High School is the youngest of the secondary schools, begun in 1958 to cope with the growing and thriving New Zealand. As the youngest in the family it is hearty and energetic.

We are very proud of what we have achieved in just 32 years: 19 University Scholarships, a Fullbright Scholar, fine tertiary academic successes, a cultural tradition in drama and musicals, musicians and sportsmen and women of national prominence. Our past students work all over the world, but mostly we are proud of the fine citizens who made, and are making, New Zealand. Our greatest strength is in the people we've produced.

The school that Tracey Gibson established has never lost its character. The direction he pointed it in has proved true and has been consistently charted. It has weathered the tottering primary steps, the adolescence of the 20's and now is in its summer thirties. It has even plunged into the trough of "Tomorrow's Schools" and is rising buoyantly on the crest of this new wave. I pay tribute to the energy, effort and dedication of students, staff and Board members who have made it work.

Students have changed; they wear weird clothes, listen to weird music and use weird slang. They also use computers as we used telephones, master videos as casually as we welcomed radios. They merely reflect the changing society they inhabit. But underneath they remain the same, with the same questing energy, the same exuberance, careless of danger, the same integrity, perseverance and maturity. I think their education is more advanced, their life more complicated.

What of our future? Wanganui High School won't fade away. Its problem will be containing its growth, expanding its curriculum, having the resources to harness new technology. In the new century it will encompass its surging forties with the maturity, certainty and security of successful effort.

May I remind those leaving of the school motto "That we might have life". Life is more than Wanganui High School. The school should have equipped you with the preparation and learning for a life outside its walls.

Education is not merely a school business, it's a life-long process. May you have life, but by the preparation of Wanganui High School, have it more abundantly.

To those who remain, I urge you to seize this pearl of great price called 'education', this pearl richer than all the tribe, this priceless treasure, while you have the chance. It may not come your way again.

To all, I wish a blessed and happy Christmas and, wherever you may be, a prosperous new year.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

"Tomorrow's Schools" environment has now been with us for one year and it is interesting to reflect on the educational gains that have been made under the new system compared with the old. High School now has a Charter, a document setting out the philosophical and educational objectives and policies of the school, which was supposed to have been prepared in consultation with the school and the general Wanganui community. Unfortunately, as occurred throughout the rest of New Zealand, very little interest was shown by the community, or for that matter the parents, in the formulation of the Charter. Many hundreds of hours of staff and Trustees' time were put into its preparation and it would be a shame if it turned out to be a waste of time.

The Board of Trustees is now responsible for the budgeting, management and running of the total school, other than payment of teachers' salaries. This has meant the financial management of close to \$1 million dollars of expenditure compared with approximately \$80,000 under the old Board of Governors' administration. Included in this is funding for total normal school maintenance as well as replacement of all furniture, fittings and equipment. With the help of Ken Hird, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Principal and staff representative, Robert Lakeland, the school finances have been astutely managed and this year should end with the school not being overspent. This has been achieved in spite of the fact that most of the early predictions by the majority of schools in New Zealand were that there would be insufficient funds to see the year out.

The freedom for pupils to attend any school of their choice was probably the most publicly interesting aspect of "Tomorrow's Schools". For the first time in over a decade, Wanganui High School is not restricted by an enrolment scheme for 1991, resulting in many more Third Formers enrolling for next year. This significant increase in the Third Form roll will cause a few problems, not the least being the need for additional classroom space as well as the fact that staffing numbers will also need to be increased. At this stage it is difficult to determine whether demand for entry into High School is as a result of a desire for co-education or is linked to the perception that the school has not only a good academic record, but also a caring environment.

The Board of Trustees is shortly to sign the Property Occupancy Agreement with the Ministry of Education, which places the control and maintenance of the school in Trustees' hands. As part of this agreement, the Ministry will undertake the funding of approximately \$1 million of deferred maintenance and upgrading on the school to bring it up to an acceptable current day standard. Much of this work is well overdue.

The above outlines some of the results of "Tomorrow's Schools" but what about the benefits to staff and pupils? We still have no reduction in student/teacher ratios, teachers are being asked to work longer hours with minimal increases in pay, teacher shortages are apparent throughout New Zealand as more and more leave the high-stress teaching profession to seek higher paying and often easier jobs in the commercial sector. The benefit to students' education would appear to be nil. Let us hope that for the sanity of Trustees, staff and students alike, that a period of stability occurs with the new government taking stock of the effects of "Tomorrow's Schools" before initiating any further changes.

1991 will see our female students in smart, new summer skirts with greater options available for both boys and girls in the tops that can be worn. This uniform change has resulted from consultation between the uniform sub-committee, PTA and students, and will eventually mark the demise of the generally short, unflattering summer tunics worn by the girls for many years.

This year saw the completion of our remodelled and upgraded computer suite, fully equipped with the latest Apple Macintosh computers. Thanks must be recorded to Nigel Rankin who unstintingly gave up many hours of his own holidays to personally assist with the alteration work and make the available funds go much further. This is just another one of the many examples of the unexpected and uncalled for assistance offered by the staff of the school, much of which generally goes unnoticed.

After many years of submissions, deputations and pleading to our Department of Education, we will shortly be opening the newly remodelled and extended Woodwork and Metalwork rooms, together with the adjacent upgraded resource room and toilets. This will at last allow Workshop Technology to be developed to its full potential. Hopefully, it will also allow the immediate removal of the unaesthetic prefabs at present crowded in near the Music room.

The school's latest acquisition is a new caretaker's house on the town side of the school, in good condition and providing a more desirable location and living condition for the caretaker, Mr Pointon. Plans are at present being prepared for alterations and additions to the existing caretaker's house which will provide accommodation for Guidance Counsellors, the Resource Unit and Lifeskills. This is seen as a temporary development until the school's administration block is upgraded and extended, hopefully within the next five years.

The PTA has again provided help and assistance in many areas throughout the year and always manages to find funds when special items need to be purchased. Thanks to Ian Pearson and his committee, together with parents and staff who have assisted when called upon.

Thanks to all parents for the prompt payment of school activity fees this year. It is acknowledged that these fees are not compulsory but are absolutely essential to the running of the school.

To the students of the school, I wish to express my appreciation for your excellent behaviour throughout the year, both in and outside the school. And what a magnificent School Ball!

Last, but by no means least, to Mr Power, Staff and fellow Board Trustees, my thanks for all your efforts during an interesting, challenging and at times frustrating year. With the work you have all put in, Wanganui High School can look forward to 1991 with excitement and confidence.

HEAD BOY

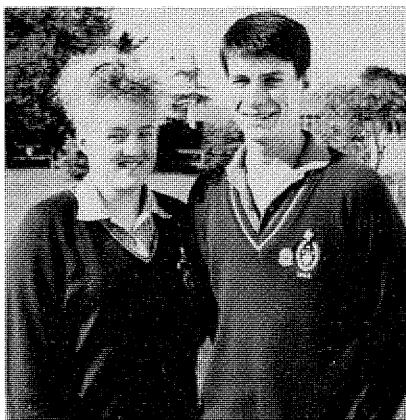
In the first term my priorities went completely up the creek

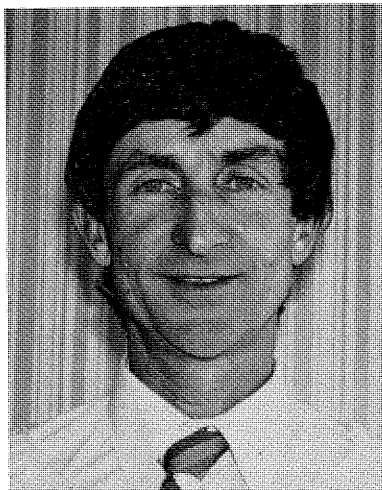

7th APE

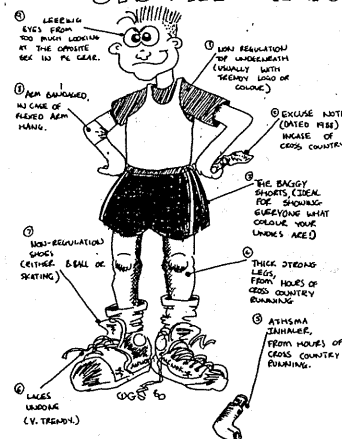

The second day was even better than the first. People had got over their amazement and had stopped staring with jealousy. As we returned home that evening, tired and weary, our

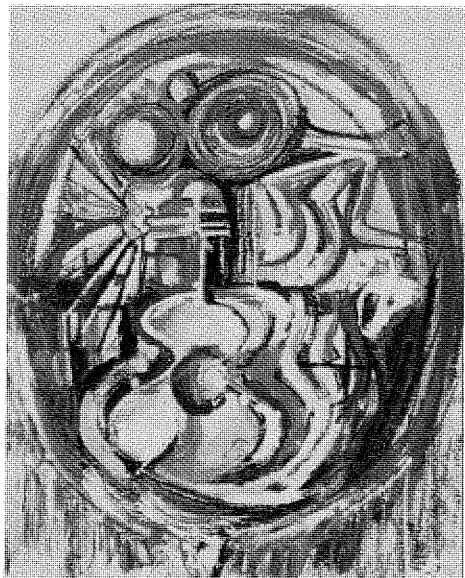
beds beckoned. We were all seeing stars, literally. The men had added some exciting light to the night, the floor, the ceiling, our clothes, glow-in-the-dark style.

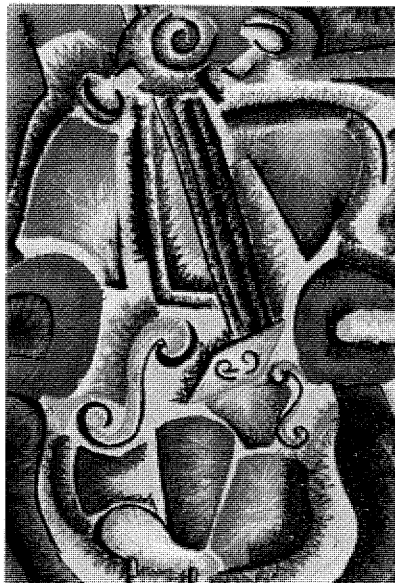

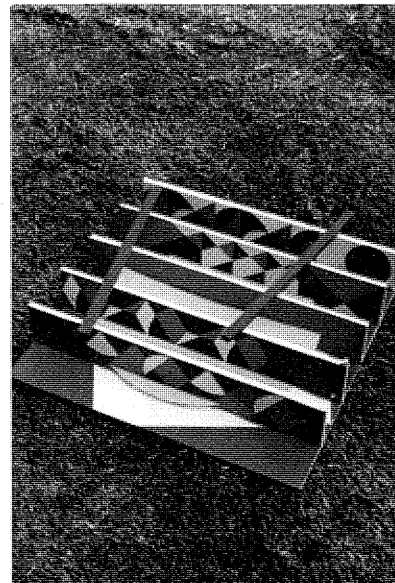

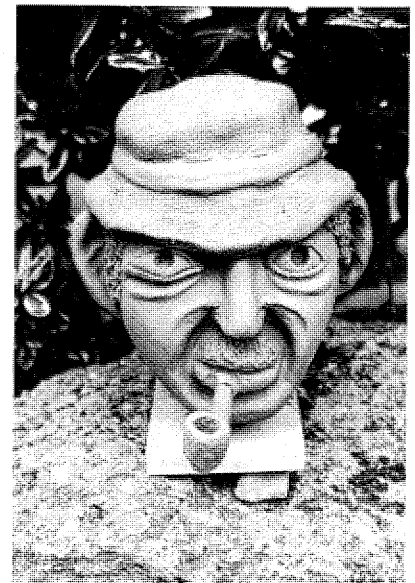

At the beginning of the day conversations were a BIT one-sided between students and the people at the Goethe Institut, for example:

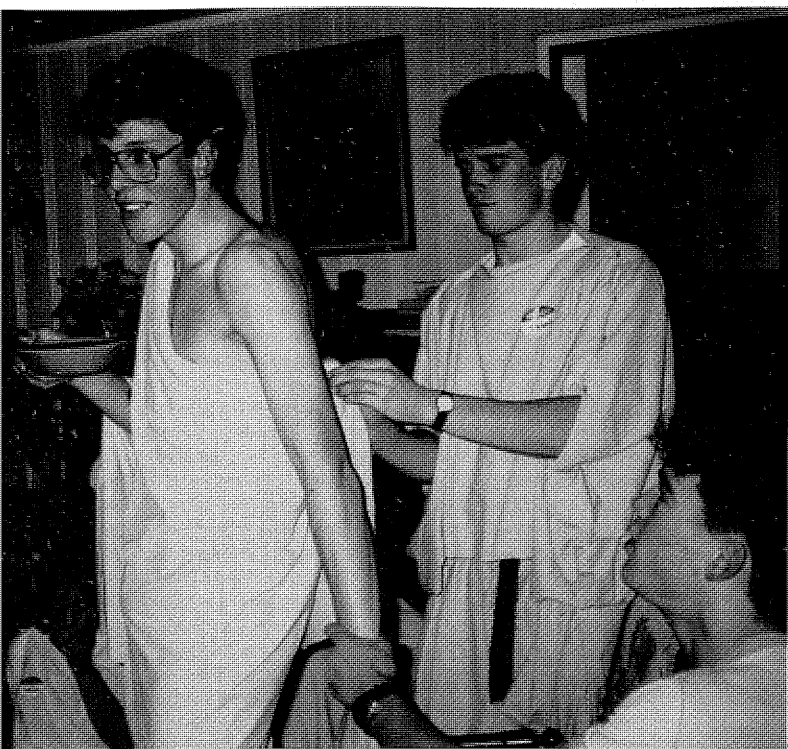

SCIENCE

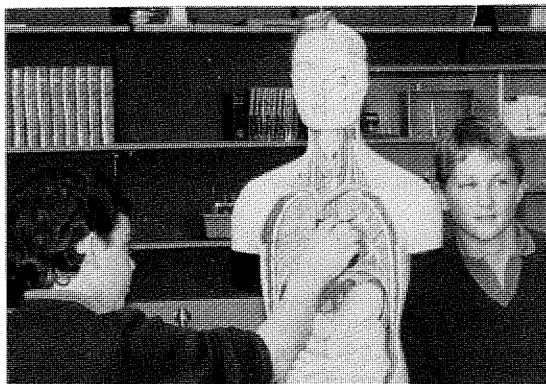
AUSTRALIAN SCIENCE COMPETITION

OZ EXCHANGE

I stayed in a place called Orbost which is about five hours east of Melbourne. It has a population of 3000 and the school only has 300 pupils, so classes were a lot smaller. My economics class had only three other people in it.

I lived on a farm, 5 minutes out of town with my host Mum, Dad, my twin and two sisters aged 7 and 16. We travelled to school by bus. School started at 9.00am and finished at 3.30pm. We had seven 45 minute sessions per day as we had to take seven subjects.

Australian Studies was compulsory for all year 11 (sixth formers). I had to wear a uniform which they were quite strict on, but it was not a strongly disciplined school.

During the four months, there were Rotary Camps organised for all New Zealand students in Victoria, and a combined Australian - New Zealand one, where they took us sightseeing around the country.

I also went up to Brisbane. It took 27 hours by bus, but it was worth it once we got up there. On the way back down we stopped off in Sydney, then stayed a night in Canberra.

I had a really great time over there, it is a really wonderful experience.

I went to Australia on a Rotary Twin Exchange. I stayed in Dubbo, which is about five hours drive from Sydney. Dubbo is quite similar to Wanganui and has approx. the same population.

While in Dubbo, I attended Dubbo South High School, the largest school in the city, with about 1100 students. Like all the other schools in Dubbo, it was co-ed.

A school day was slightly different. In the morning at form time (which they called Dear) your form class was not just your year, you had a mixed form class with year 7 to year 12. I found this quite good in a way because you got to know the younger members of the school.

Another thing I found different at school was they had eight 40 minute periods a day. They have 4 in the morning and then a 20 minute break. They then have another 2 periods and then lunch. With 6 periods before lunch, this meant lunch was about 1:30.

I think the highlight of my exchange was a Rotary organized safari trip which took us up to Queensland, to Bunderburg and then down to Surfer's Paradise. This was a week and a half long trip, a massive experience!

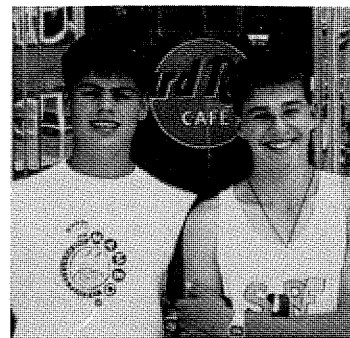

FROM OUR THAI CORRESPONDENT

It's Different!

Now that I'm settling into my sixth month in Thailand, the way of life here has become quite natural to me. Going to school each morning amongst the rice paddies with their buffalo-pulled ploughs I expect excited exclamations of 'Farang!', the word for Caucasian foreigner, used to alert the rest of the community as the only white-skinned person for miles comes into sight.

At the 8am flag raising the teachers patrol the assembly line, ensuring that all students have the regulation haircut. There is the slap of the cane whipping across bare legs for non compliance. The school itself consists of three two-

storeyed buildings with high, open-sided basements which serve as classrooms, or as homes to the water buffalo. I live in Sikhoraphum, a rural town whose residents are mostly rice farmers, living with the barest necessities.

Thai food is a story in itself - you do not have to venture far to find some vendor selling hot noodles, treacherous chillies, Thai sweets or the versatile rice! Eating is an important part of the Thai lifestyle and the day revolves around the three meals. There is the morning trip to the market to shop from the stalls - frogs and fish jumping out of their prison-basins, tethered chickens clucking in protest, and huge bowls of crispy fried grasshoppers. You usually don't know what you've eaten until it's finished - a game Thais like to play.

The language is tonal, which leads to much confusion when one word can mean several different things, depending on the pronunciation. I've been called a chatterbox, even in Thai language, quite an achievement.

Along with the mosques are plenty of churches and Chinese and Indian temples. This multi-racial society is very peaceful and a lot more developed than many people are led to believe.

Malaysia is a very traditional country, which makes it interesting to learn about. As I am with a Muslim family, I have experienced many traditional Muslim celebrations. "Hari Raya Puasa" is the biggest among these and is just as important to them as Christmas is to us. Here they celebrate the completion of "Ramadan" (fasting month) by visiting friends and relatives to eat the delicious food specially prepared for this occasion. I learned the hard way that too much of this food can be fattening! Instead of exchanging gifts, the family that is visited is expected to give any sum of money to the children of the visitors. I managed to collect \$50 for eating other people's food. Not bad, I thought.

Malaysian traditional dancing is very beautiful, and I was fortunate enough to be able to learn this dancing. I performed fully clad in traditional costume at an international concert.

School life here is taken very seriously and because it is so hard to gain entrance to university, there is very little teenage social life. Instead, they are forced to study until 19-20 years old, and if they have the qualifications then go to university. Many choose to go overseas to Aussie, New Zealand, United States, or the U.K. My life here in Malaysia has been very eventful and educational. With its many beach resorts and traditional customs, I will find it hard to say good-bye to a country I have grown to love. I will return!

I'm very happy to see you.

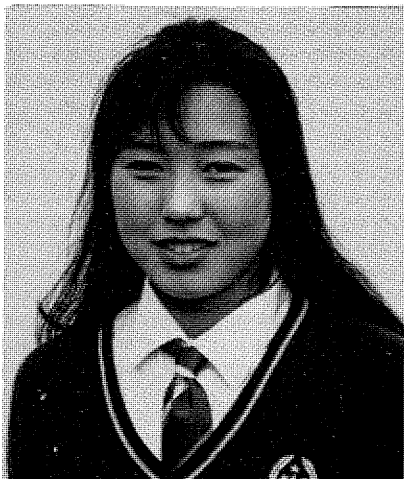

FRIENDS OF THE PACIFIC



"Bongi", this was the greeting Kiri Atkinson from Wanganui High school received when she ventured on to the Vanuatu Island to taste a different slice of life.

Kiri was part of a group of students who travelled to the island during the August school holidays. They flew by Air Vanuatu and when they reached their destination were greeted with open arms after 3 hours of flight.

They stayed in a village called Ambae, where they were treated like royalty. A wooden house was provided for them, a luxury in a place where most people live in flax houses. The people will go hungry themselves just so the guests can eat - the students were told not to feel uncomfortable about this as it is the custom.

Food for the most part consists of tropical fruits, fish, rice and a food called "Lap Lap", a vegetable mush. Kava, a well known relaxing drink, is drunk on special occasions, including the students' farewell feast. All drinking water has to be boiled and food cooked on an open fire, even though there are ovens in the village.

A highlight of the trip for the students was the traditional dancing, often used as a source of entertainment. There is only one television and video which the entire village watch and enjoy, especially the Rambo movies.

The women wear "Mother-Hubbard" dresses with puffed sleeves and trimmed with lace. No woman is allowed to show her thighs but most go topless. The men wear casual T-shirts and shorts. Watches are mainly worn just for decoration as there is no preoccupation with time in the village.

The people are keen to learn and be educated but there just aren't the teaching skills available. Children go to school only if they want to and schooling finishes at the age of fourteen.

Not everything is paradise in Vanuatu. They may have beautiful weather and fruit you can just pluck off a tree, but there is a high risk of disease such as malaria. The people only bathe about once a month so, to make themselves smell pleasant, they drink a special potion. There are millions of cockroaches and ants plus huge snakes and spiders to be wary of.

Kiri noticed a few unusual traditions throughout her stay. One was that on a bride's wedding day she has to go around killing pigs with a blunt axe - a noisy ordeal! Also the people judge how rich you were by how many pigs you own.

The students' last hot days were spent in the capital, Port Vila, where they found themselves among many Australian and French tourists.

Kiri was sad to leave but has many wonderful memories from her Vanuatu experience and the village, Ambae.

JAMM'IN: So how do you keep looking good at thirty?

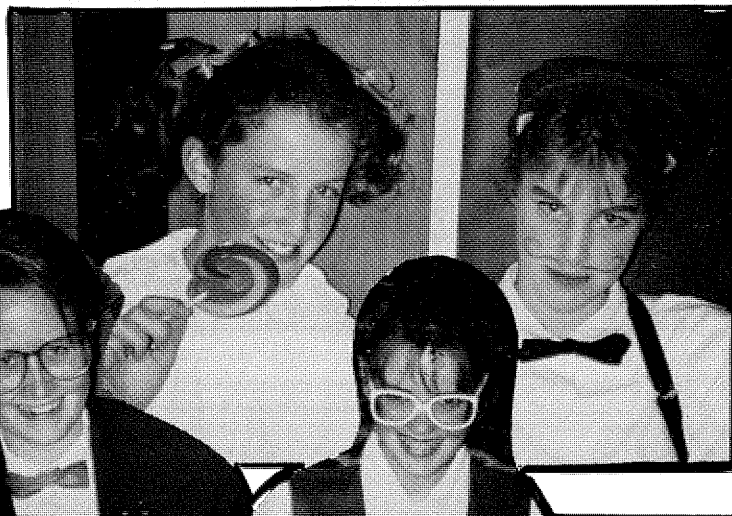

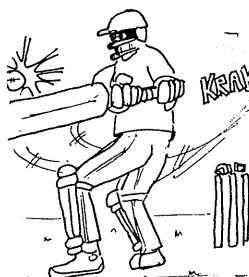
Some other season highlights include the 358-4 innings against Marist, replying to St Augustine's 212 with 167-1, Eric Austin scoring 1000+ runs for the season.

OUR HORSES THIRD

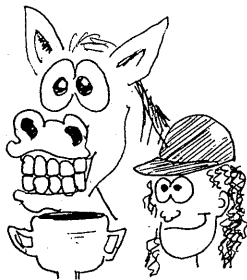
A one day event was held at Nga Tawa School, Marton on Anzac Day 25 April 1990.

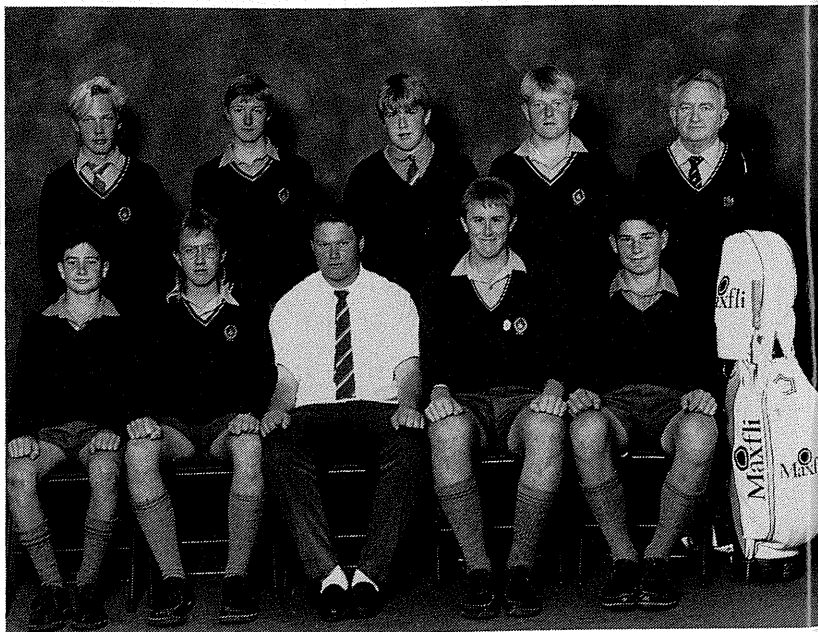

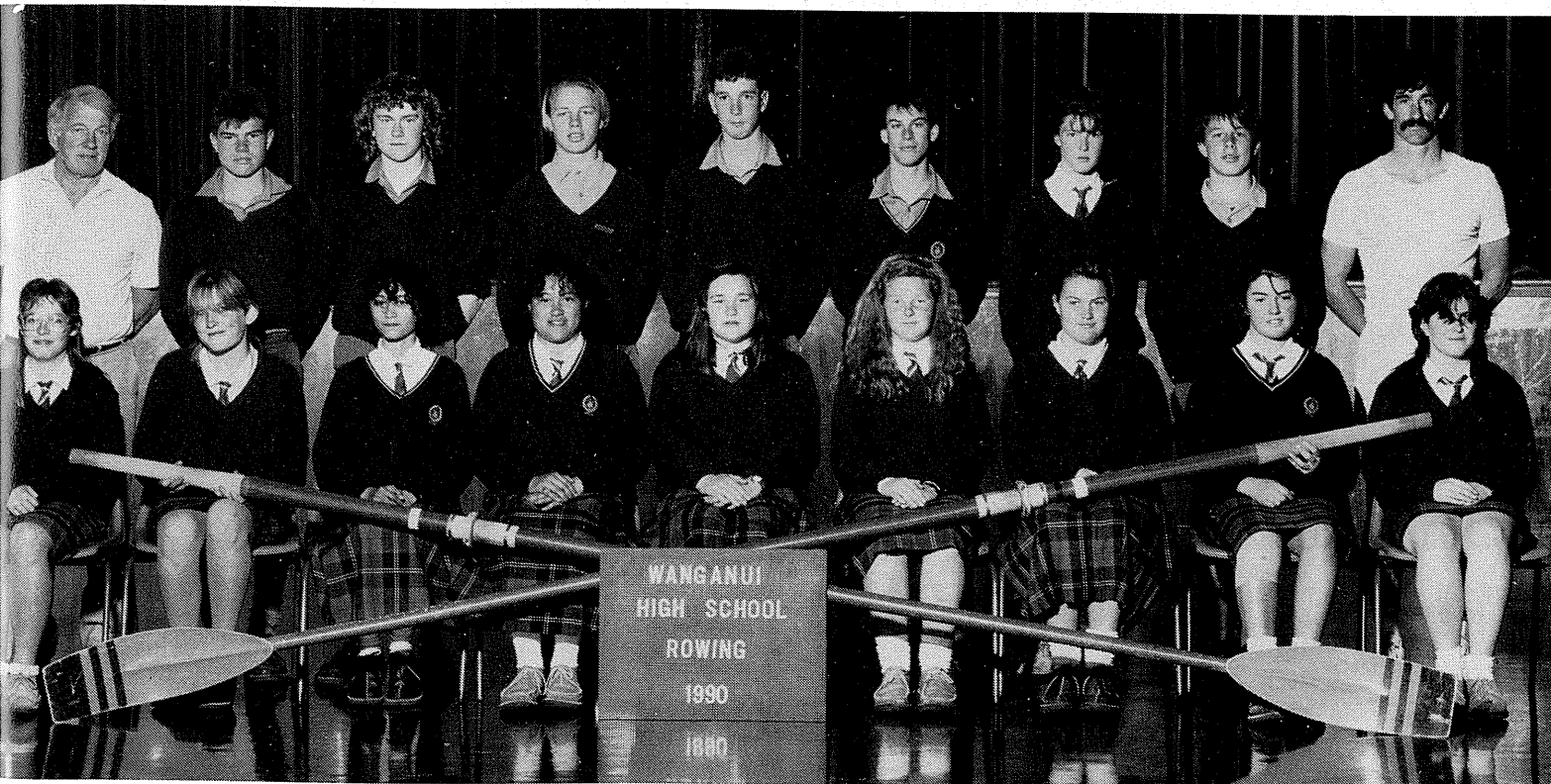
The next two days we practised on the water before racing started. Despite our best efforts, however, we didn't do very well in our two races.

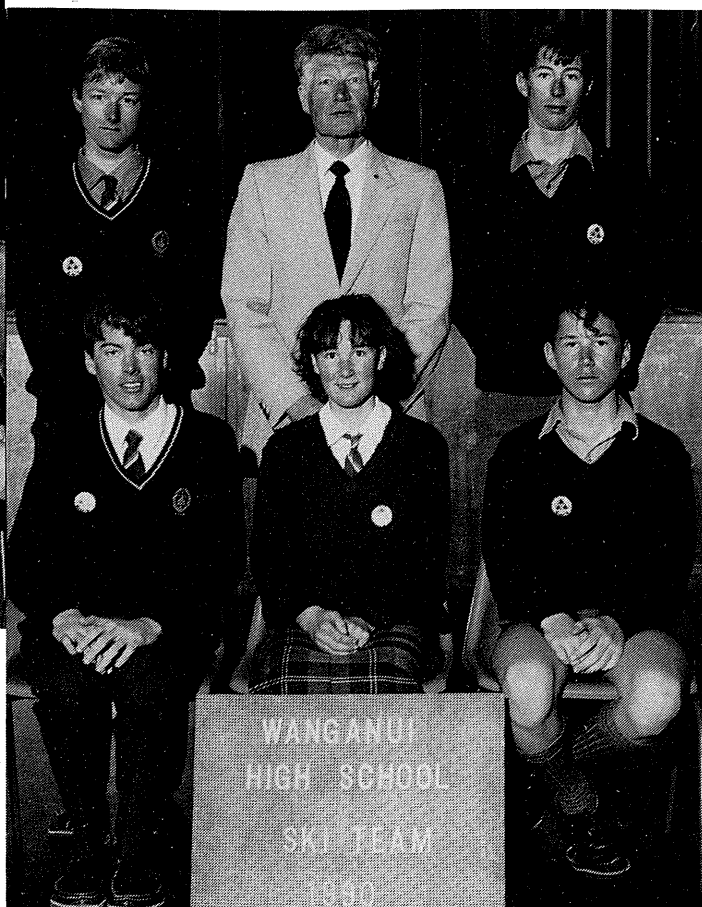

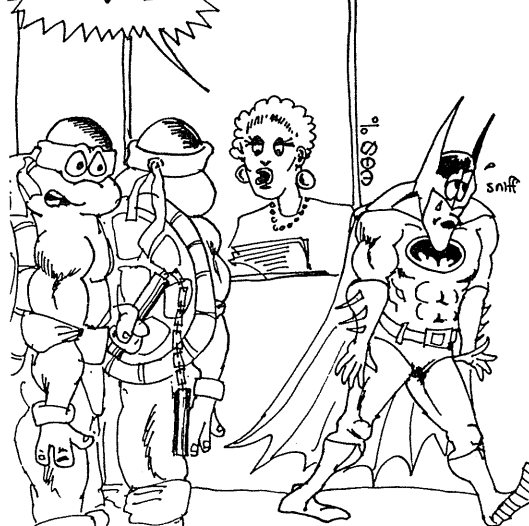

Also on her toes was **Rowan Johnson** at the national workshop on ballet. Another Rowena Jackson?

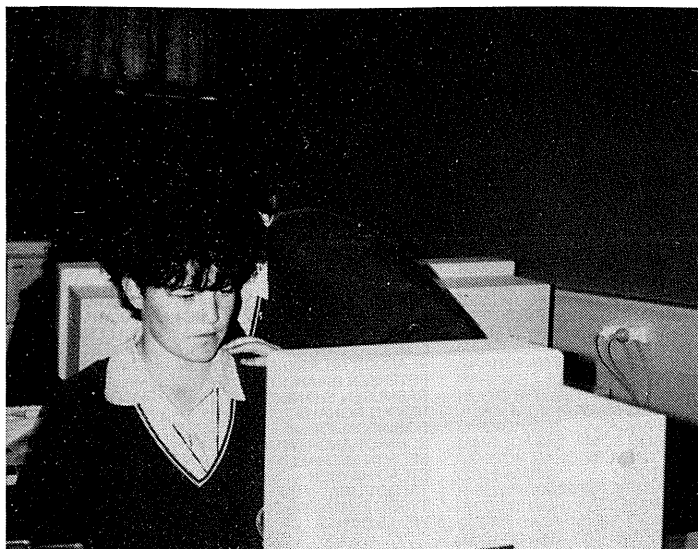
