





PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

"The old order changeth, yielding place to new."

1989 has seen the strong winds of change blow away the old structure completely and usher in the new. The Education Department, with its regulations and checks, has completely disappeared and the Ministry of Education has come into being. What started as a review of education administration has become a complete restructuring of education itself. 1989 has seen history being made. Since October 1st, schools have become autonomous bodies governing themselves. 'Tomorrow's Schools' has become today's learning.

But the incubation period has not been without its problems. The date of change was fixed and we have been flying headlong trying to catch up with change as detail after detail of the plan was changed around us. Firstly, after the euphoria of the hasty elections of the new Board of Trustees (and the election of our first student member) keen and eager to prove "your change to direct education", was halted in the disillusioned back-wash of faulty information, insufficient funding, hopeless budgets and an impossible timescale.

Set aglow by the management seminars of Caldwell & Spinks ('The Self-Managing School') our flame dimmed when we realised we weren't being given the resources the authors advocated. We spent long hours over our Charter "getting it right" only to discover the Director-General advocating we make it short. We plunged into a budget expecting the hundred million that was to be saved to find we appeared dramatically underfunded even on 1988 costs. How could we decide who was going to service schools when the service agencies, even the Ministry, didn't exist?

The timescale became crucial and October 1st came without most of the questions being near solution. Cancelling

the Department before establishing the Ministry was rather like selling new cars without any after-sales services.

Can I thank all those staff members, Board, PTA and parents who have given so generously of their time and expertise to accomplish so much that the School itself has continued unknowing in its uninterrupted calm.

It has certainly been a trying and a testing year. There have been marked successes.

In sport, our Girls' Basketball team was rated fifth in New Zealand in the Pahiatua tournament. Our young Boys' Hockey team won the prestigious Johnson Cup in the local secondary schools' tournament, our Girls' Hockey team never conceding a goal was placed second in their tournament only on goal count-back.

Culturally we made our mark. Highly commended in the Westpac Regional Competitions, the orchestra was chosen to appear in the Malvina Major Opera House competitions, the school gained distinctions and merits in the BNZ Maths Competitions, and the Student Advisory Council was developed to provide a communication vehicle for our Student Trustee

We hosted over 400 speakers, students and supporters in the regional Korimako Speech Competitions - a long and exhilarating day.

The second term ended with the joint Wanganui High School/Repertory production of "Oh What a Lovely War", a truly comic, and harrowing, production.

There has been a tremendous amount done to the fabric of the school, six rooms have been gutted and refurbished to give us two new typing rooms, a new history and geography room, and two new laboratories. As well, we have managed to incorporate four enlarged resource rooms. The spinoff of these alterations is that now the school is grouped in faculties in blocks, rather than having rooms and departments dispersed.

Because of our shortage of rooms we have acquired two new relocatable classrooms. Linked by a Resource Room these have become our new Language Block and students are adorning the new Maori room, set sensibly near the road, with kowhaiwhai work.

The contract has just been let for the complete extension and refurbishment of the Technical Block that will not only give us so much more curriculum extension and space but will allow us to move into the new techniques of Workshop Technology.

We thank the PTA for the outside dining area created by a large tiled patio. The grounds are looking good, the concept of mass planting of last year now discernible as trees and shrubs grow and burst into leaf.

Yet while all this obvious activity captured the limelight, the solid basis of school work and sport was going on. Students day to day completing assignments, doing homework, sitting exams and tests, acquiring skills and acquiring knowledge: students week by week practising and playing sport, learning musical instruments, learning more of their environment and themselves in selectives and lifeskills - the pursuit of excellence in as many spheres as their talents led them.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

"Tomorrow's Schools" and the suggested freedom it will give us to meet the changing educational needs of the community and society in general is finally upon us. Amidst confusion and in some instances chaos, we have witnessed, amongst other things: two Board elections within twelve months, the demise of the Department of Education and the setting up of a seemingly increased number of smaller education service centres, plus the demand by the Minister for us to write our own Charter contract before the end of the year, and the advice that the preliminary funding budget for the 1990 year is considerably short of our funding requirements.

We were told by the Minister that under "Tomorrow's Schools" freedom of choice would be given to students to attend any school, subject to limitations on total rolls. Wanganui High School is the only college in Wanganui to have a restricted intake of Third formers and this year approximately 100 were again turned away. The latest Minister's directive is that the supposed freedom of choice does not occur until the 1991 year, and then will be subject to certain zoning and other restrictive requirements that will no doubt be thought up in the meantime.

The new Board of Trustess, Principal and Staff are all committed to making the new era in education successful and in particular beneficial to the students. Many hundreds of hours of Trustee and staff time have already been spent in developing the Charter document which is Wanganui High School's Contract Agreement with the Minister of Education, defining the future direction of the school.

It was extremely pleasing to again see the support given to the school by the number of parents who put themselves forward for the Board Elections. It is hoped that those who were unsuccessful will not see the result as defeat, but rather relief and will still make their enthusiasm available to Board and PTA wherever possible.

The school environment is continually improving with upgrading of several teaching blocks as well as two new classrooms this year. A start is to be made this financial year on the much needed redevelopment of the Technical Block which hopefully will see not only safe and modern teaching facilities but also up to date equipment installed. A concerted effort will then be made to convince the Minister that the Administration Block and Assembly Hall should be upgraded to match the rest



of the school.

Amongst all the general help and support from the PTA, they have completed decking and courtyard paving around the Tuckshop/Cafeteria area and, together with outside picnic tables, have made a most attractive and useful social area. Please give the PTA your support if and when requested in the future.

The school grounds are a credit to our groundsmen who, against often overwhelming odds, manage to make them not only look attractive but also usable as well.

Thank you to everyone who has paid the new school activity fees this year. These fees are higher than many other schools, through the Board of Trustees resolving that the Board, Staff and Pupils are not a fundraising organisation, but rather part of an educational establishment. Not only is the normal fundraising effort being put to good educational use, but the additional funds are already providing for much needed items of equipment in the school.

Our Senior Prizegiving this year will see a change in both format and type of awards given, with more recognition being



given to those who have achieved by way of certificates. These certificates will be tangible proof of a student's ability and achievement at senior school level and will hopefully assist students prepare their Curriculum Vitae for job applications.

1990 will see total control of Wanganui High School in our own hands and, given adequate funding, we will be successful. To the short-term 1988/89 Board of Governors - Principal, Staff and not least by fellow Board of Trustee members - thank you for your support and dedication throughout the year.

TOMORROW TODAY

1989 heralded a new system of schooling, and with it a whole host of elections, and a new way of life at Wanganui High School. The purpose of these elections would have become obvious on October 1, when the running of the school was transferred to the members of the Board of Trustees. This small group will govern the school by themselves. In effect W.H.S has become a "company", just like all the other state schools nationwide.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE

Over the year how have these changes affected students? First the fourth to seventh forms have voted Heath Williams to the position of Student Representative. For Heath it's a great achievement. He is pleased to be the first student to hold the position, and thinks it is a good idea for a fifth former to be elected. He hopes to continue as the Student Rep. until he leaves school, thus offering some continuity of experience and knowledge.

STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL

The final instrument of the new system is the Student Advisory Council. This was put in place to act as a medium between Heath as Student Representative and the student body. It comprises twenty-two members, four from each form and two prefects. There were a large number of candidates for the positions which showed there was a lot of interest.

The council does not have much obvious power. It is mainly concerned with gathering ideas and views from students and then passing them onto Heath. Yet its potential power in representing student body's ideas is practically unlimited. The message is clear: take an interest!



On the 20th July, we hosted the Regional Korimako hui i.e. Nga Whakataetae Mo Nga Manu-Korero. Schools from Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu, Tararua, and Horowhenua came. About 600 turned up. The day began at 9.00 a.m. with the Whanganui combined schools giving a pohiri. There were plenty of schools participating. Our speakers were Lynnaire Simon, in the Junior Maori (who came 3rd) and Pahia Turia, in the Senior Maori.

We had been busy the day before preparing the meals for all our expected Manuhiri. We had heaps left over!

On the 16th August, Newlands College Polynesian club came for a two-day visit. On the day they arrived, we opened our new Maori room and blessed it. Newlands College arrived at 10.00 a.m. and we did a pohiri for them. Then, we showed them around the school and Wanganui. We also took a trip to Ratana, where we were told the history of the Man and the Movement. At about 2.00 p.m. we farewelled them with a final hakari, and sang a few waiata. Then, we cleaned the Home Economics room.




SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

2nd prize in Biology - H.Baldwin-Anderson and R.Hughes. Commended in the Display Section - T. Burnett and N. Rook.





Advanced Physical Education has been a great challenge for me. Not only has it widened my knowledge of Physical Education but I have developed the techniques required to teach children skills in physical activity. I have experienced a number of new sports and activities, such as KiwiSport, especially Short Tennis, Golf, New Image Rugby, Orienteering and Kiwicricket. We also experienced a variety of demanding physical activities such as skiing at Whakapapa and Scuba Diving in our school pool.

KiwiSport has made me gain greater appreciation of Physical Education and has also made me realise how important it is for all people - young and old, no matter what size and shape, to take part in various sports and experiences. Larry Graham, the Co-ordinator of KiwiSport was great. He is a great motivator and a good friend. We were lucky enough to go to a number of towns and country schools and take part in teaching kids from the age of 5 to 12. Often we had to use our initiative and skills to teach the kids. PEER SUPPORT COUNSELLING

Every Wednesday at Period Four Seventh formers get the low-down knowledge that they need to be able to hit the big, wide world next year - whether it be flatting, food, and diet, relationships, for university, for just a job.

Mrs Blair, the school's guidance counsellor, runs a peer support group at the same time. With approximately sixty pupils at the beginning of the year, there was a need for the group to be broken up into two lots of thirty to enable effective communication between students and teachers.

The main aim of the group, Mrs Blair says, is for each student to become capable of helping friends in trouble emotionally, physically or academically.

However the most important factor that she stressed was that in order for students to be able to help friends, they themselves must be confident in speaking about their own problems and talking about themselves. It is then that help can be arranged. Students, during their time in this counselling session, practise relaxation techniques and group activity

work but have no strict routine for problem solving. Even then it is up to the students to help guide their friends through their problems but not solve it for them.

Mrs Blair said that the students have responded to the course in a very positive way, and she hopes that they will keep these basic ideas of counselling in mind for the rest of their lives.


I've been in Japan for almost seven months now, and have only four and half left before I have to slow back down to the pace of life in N.Z. again.

King checks out Solomon Islands: a 'Friends Of The Pacific' Foray Special ...

On May 3 1989, I, along with fifteen other students from as far north as Paeroa and south as Dunedin, set off for the Solomon Islands. Our duty - to sand down and paint an open air classroom and hall with 'Friends of the Pacific Workcamp 31'.

Arabala is a small village situated on the Langalanga Lagoon, centre of the pineapple growing area. We were accommodated in four homes with various families around the village. Although the village was constructed of grass huts, we stayed in European-style houses, belonging to the richer people. We were fed plain boiled rice, fish, crackers, paw paw and pineapple. The people there were very friendly and although they were not wealthy, they were rich in their own

manner.

With the money that we raised here in New Zealand, we had bought enough paint to complete seven classrooms and a staff area. Life in the village, like most in the Solomon Islands is based largely around the church. The church in Arabala was that of the SSEC (South Seas Evangelical Church) or the Baptist equivalent. We were entertained by powerful singing, like that of American Gospel music.

Other entertainment included a lengthy soccer match in which New Zealand, with some help, lost to the Arabala Primary team.

On the final evening of our stay in Arabala, there was a traditional farewell feast put on by the villagers. It was the most memorable part of our trip. Speeches of farewell were given, followed by an array of dramatic customary dancing. Final goodbyes and gifts were exchanged the following morning.

From Arabala the next stage of our trip was to paint the Mothers' Union Hall. While in Auki, we had the chance to enjoy beautiful rivers and waterfalls.

The final Saturday night feast was put on by Bishop Willie, as well as singing by the local youth group. Once again as a token of their appreciation for our hard work and effort, we were presented with handmade Solomon Island shell necklaces.

The return trip to Honiara was a real experience. Seven hours in the sun, on a ship "The Princess", an inter-island ferry linking Guadalcanal and Malaita.

After the long hot trip, we checked into the Hilton, an Anglican Transit House and hit the town. We celebrated our arrival to civilisation with junk food and a walk to the Mendana, a rather expensive tourist hotel. All our spare time was spent shopping for carvings, bags, t-shirts, shells etc. It was our final chance to wind down before the shock of New Zealand life and culture reached us again.


Father John Craddock, a teacher/chaplain from New Zealand, invited us to his school, St Joseph's Catholic Secondary School. On our journey we visited Mt Austen, a peace memorial from where the Japanese shelled Henderson Airport.

Before flying home, we travelled to an outdoor war/peace museum which was littered with tanks and planes, both Japanese and Americans. About a kilometre along the road we then went snorkelling at the wreck of the Bonegi Two, a Japanese ship sunk in World War II.

Fatigued, in shorts and T-shirts we arrived at Auckland Airport in 7 degrees, rain and wind, a drastic change from the scorching heat in the islands. From Auckland there was the trip back to the cold city of Wanganui.

I hav had mi teeth pooled out and a new fire-plase put in. I will finish this letter now bekoz mi pen has gust run out.





The weight of the world is upon my shoulders Around my hips and thighs like boulders; My dreadful stomach protrudes quite well And has made my life a living hell.



HAPPIJAPICHAPPIES! (1989 'Nihon No Tomodachi' Japanese Tour)

On the night of the last day of Term Two, a group of 23 students, teachers and parents left Palmerston North en route to a three week tour of Japan.

The following evening we arrived at Narita International Airport. We were met by four former exchange students and then left for one night at the Tokyo Grand Palace Hotel.

The next day was the day of reckoning, as we encountered our first homestay with students from Shibuya Girls High School. Three exciting days later we took the train to our sister

city, Nagaizumi-Cho.

Unlike Tokyo - a sea of grey buildings and streets Nagaizumi was green and had open spaces, more like home. Firstly, we were taken to the council chambers where we were given a formal reception, and then to Nagaizumi High School, where we were given another formal reception and introduced to our host families. Once again we were sent out to discover the real Japanese life.

By now we had learnt how to cope with Japanese

specialities, such as the Japanese toilet, chopsticks, food and so on. After all, we couldn't really avoid all these things. We also knew not to expect to eat the skin of any fruit,

something Japanese people do not do.

On our first full day in Nagaizumi we went to the High School and learnt about Japanese clubs - calligraphy, archery, karate, origami etc. In the afternoon three of us went swimming in the local pool where we had to have a shower before getting in. As we were so eager to cool off, we dived in, only to be signalled that diving was a definite "no-no". We also had to wear bathing caps - (Note from Rhiannon, "Mine I could tie under my chin".)

The second day was free at our leisure. Many of us went shopping and many also went to Mt Fuji. What amazed us was the number of people who went to Mt Fuji - not only

tourists but many Japanese people.

The next morning we were up early and on our way to Kokura on a Shinkansen.

We visited the peace park and museum. It was sad to see the helplessness of the people, but it made us proud to know that we were from "Nuclear-Free" New Zealand.

Our next stay was three days in Toyoka. This was a much smaller city than any of the others we had visited, but it was

in the vicinity of many tourist attractions.

Yoshida was the fourth and last of our homestays. There we were welcomed with a warm reception from the Yoshida City Mayor, Principal of Yoshida High School and the students and families with whom we were to be billeted for two nights. We spent the next day at school with them-sitting in with their classes. After that a Japanese T.V. crew filmed us sitting with our homestay hosts and doing ikebana-which is flower-arranging. We were then all interviewed about our likes and interests in New Zealand and Japan. We finished with the traditional tea ceremony which could take a while to get used to. After saying our goodbyes we left on a bus to go to catch a train back to Tokyo.

But more importantly, Tokyo Disneyland!

It is very similar to that of the original in Los Angeles. We all went our separate ways and enjoyed all the thrills that Disneyland had to offer. Among the many attractions were Space Mountain, Captain EO, and the new Space Tours. Fortunately we arrived at Disneyland early in the day so we did not have to queue for long to get into the major attractions. The queue for the new attraction "Space Tours" was over two hours long at peak times.

The following day was our last in Japan, the end had come much quicker than expected. As we awaited anxiously

for our plane to Hong Kong, we were sad to leave.

We arrived in Hong Kong late at night and were soon taken to our hotel which was a contrast to the luxury of our Japanese stay. We spent the next day exploring Hong Kong and spending all our money on the many bargains. The following day we travelled by boat to China where we visited a few towns which were even more of a shock than Hong Kong. We were taken around several places of interest in China such as a museum containing an exhibition of the terracotta soldiers, a kindergarten, a pottery factory, a real Chinese restaurant and a department store. After a very busy day we returned to Hong Kong by train.

After one more day of shopping we left Hong Kong for Japan where we had a five hour wait at the airport before returning home. Although we were glad to be home we all had fond memories of a country which had offered us so much.



The girls Under-16, Senior B and C teams, played with determination but lacked overall skill. All of these teams had their moments and improved as the season progressed.


The Senior A boys were woeful. In general, they lacked commitment, intensity, teamwork and the passing skills necessary to succeed.

A PERSONAL VIEW OF **NATIONALS 1989**

1989 proved to be the year in which we would finally qualify for Nationals. We were the first Wanganui Girls Basketball team to actually make it, after years of coming 3rd or lower at previous Regionals.

Leaving Wanganui on Tuesday 22nd August, 1989, we really weren't too sure what to expect. Our only sampling of Basketball at the National level had come a few weeks earlier, when we had attended a round-robin tournament at Church College. Despite our relative inexperience, we were out to win what we could.

Rumours circulated prior to our departure about what some of our potential opponents could actually do: amazing aerial moves, dunk the ball, incredible ball-handling ability and the knack of 'facing' everyone. Luckily, the rumours were only partly true.

The first team we came up against was the 1988 National Champions, Sacred Heart College of Hamilton Included in their line-up was the 1988 M.V.P., Shelley Meads, daughter of the legendary Colin "Pinetree" Meads. To make matters worse, she is about the same size as him, but has a slightly thinner neck! After a close first half, we trailed by four points. However, they pulled away to win by a small margin of 58-39. All was not lost though as we were scheduled to play Rangiruru Girls High of Christchurch that afternoon. By disposing of them 59-35 we ensured a place in the top 12 (of 18) teams.

Our next opponent was one of the best 'Basketball Schools' in N.Z., Logan Park High School of Dunedin. This was probably one of the teams that I liked the most, as they had some amazing talent. Their line-up included the eventual tournament M.V.P. Tracey Paul. She was incredible, able to dribble the ball behind and around various parts of her anatomy and she also owned a deadly 3-point shot. Logan Park had a couple of very tall forwards, whose knee-caps weren't particularly interesting to look at. We played this team on Thursday morning. They started strongly, pressing us fullcourt - this just about gave me heart failure, as I tried to get around them, but to no avail. In the end Tania had to bring the ball up to break the pressure. The latter caused us to make many mistakes which gave them a handy 25-13 lead at halftime. We came back in the second half to get within three points, but unfortunately they came out the eventual winners 48-41. We weren't totally out of the running as we could still advance to the top eight by defeating Porirua College. We managed to do just that, in the afternoon, winning 40-37.

Our next game was the big decider against Nayland College of Nelson. If we could manage to beat them, we would advance to the Semi-finals. Alas, we fell victims to their extraordinary skills, speed and conditioning. This team was truly amazing, eventually emerging as the 1989 champions by downing Logan Park H.S. in a tough final. They MUST have been on steroids or had some major surgery to implant springs into their limbs, as they played only six players, game in and game out. Needless to say we lost 55-34!

This meant that the best we could place was 5th. We would need two BIG wins to do this. As it turned out, we defeated Waihi College in a gruelling 27-20 encounter. This was the lowest score posted all tournament and contrasted with the game on court two where Aotea College just defeated A.G.G.s 92-68.

So our last game was against Aotea College of Wellington for 5th and 6th placing. One of their players was a personal friend and ex-W.H.S. pupil, and, after years of hearing tales of 80+ scores, while we struggled to score 30 points, I wanted to beat them badly. We did so, winning 51-42 in a brutal game, four of our players finishing on four fouls each.

This was really good, especially for me, as this was my final chance to play for W.H.S., and this was the best I had experienced. All the girls played well and the younger ones deserve to be congratulated on their effort, as some were playing basketball for the first time, and I think they did really well. Special mention must go to our excellent Captain, Tania Katene, who was absolutely unstoppable at Nationals and gained a place in the Tournament Team. But our coach Darrell Pene deserves the most praise as without his knowledge and expertise we wouldn't have got anywhere near as far as we did. A great coach with a great dedication to his team and his sport.

Not to forget our Manageress, Mrs. Kaye CLyde, without whom we wouldn't have had such an excellent tournament or the endless supply of cheese rings. Kelly Ryan's grandparents must also be thanked for allowing us to use their homes for the

week. A big thank you to you all as well.

Well, all in all, this year was the best for me in terms of basketball, and the most enjoyable. But by the time Nationals were over I got heartily sick of Bobby Brown and Milli Vanilli. Some basketballers are renowned for their bad taste in music, I must be an exception!

Good luck to you all next year and have a good tour.

The 1988-89 season began with much the same team as the previous season. Kerry Smith took over as captain but, along with other seventh formers Lee

This meant we had to promote a number of junior players into the team for the second half of the season, with Jason Willis becoming the new captain. The mix of seniors and newcomers seems to have worked as it has been since Christmas that most of our important wins have come.

The strength of our batting is shown by some impressive totals: 339-6 v United, 280-6 v Kaierau, 272-3 v Coll. Colts A, 203-3 v Rangitikei. Often the top and middle order batsmen were the only ones required to bat.

The most significant individual contribution was from fourth former, Eric Austin, whose three unbeaten first eleven centuries (150 n.o. v United, 135 n.o. v Coll Colts A and 119n.o. v Kaierau), together with 176n.o. and 112 scored earlier in the season, while playing in lower grades, must be one of the best batting performances for many years. Darren Hartley was our most effective bowler after Lee Tyson left. Three performances in particular stood out. His 7-85 v WCS 2nds, 6-35 v WCS 3rds and 5-40 v WBC helped to win games. His man of the match performance against Boys College in the day-night competition was outstanding. 


