After a brief audio glitch, Ronda Metszies, ESO cellist, closed out the event speaking eloquently about her experiences with YONA and delivered a passionate speech about the support needed to carry on the good work in the program. "I would particularly like to give a shout out to Ronda, who maintained her grace and poise during the brief technical difficulties that occurred," remarks Ayles. "It was wonderful to get to showcase YONA-Sistema and the important work they do, especially after an extremely challenging year."

While a return to an in-person event is hoped for in the coming year, YONA Site Manager at St. Teresa of Calcutta School, Kristin Swirles, sees the silver lining in hosting a virtual event. 
This summer, four YONA students will be taking part in an exciting virtual summer camp opportunity hosted by Sistema Toronto.

Q. What do you love about YONA?


