Road to Joy 2024: YAY for YONA

On behalf of the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, thank you to everyone who attended our 11th annual Road to Joy concert presented by EPCOR, on May 29, 2024. We were fortunate to share this special evening with our community, with more than 1200 tickets distributed for this event, to watch the performance of over 200 YONA students from all five sites.

At the end of each school year, Road to Joy brings our students together to proudly share what they have learned with family, teachers, volunteers, and community supporters. The concert is an important annual opportunity for teamwork, sharing, and confidence-building, while raising much needed funds for the program.

The evening was a tremendous success, raising \$127,000! This would not have been possible without the generosity of our audience and presenting sponsor, EPCOR.

This year's Road to Joy theme was mentorship, a key element of our program's philosophy. One of the most rewarding aspects of YONA is seeing our older students mentor their younger peers. As always, we saw this heartwarming behaviour displayed at Road to Joy as our more advanced students helped direct others on and off stage, turned pages for their stand partners, and reminded their peers of what notes to play if they got lost.

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Our concert began with an upbeat performance featuring every level of YONA. For the first time on the Winspear stage, the La Bruyère Orchestra accompanied while the YONA Juniors and Community level youth sang, and excitedly performed a song together. We were also pleased to welcome the KEC Singers back to the Winspear Centre to perform an "Honour Song" on behalf of Kipohtakâw Education Centre (KEC) and Alexander First Nation.

Understandably, it did not take long before parents became emotional watching their children play their instruments on the Winspear stage; some could not help but film every moment. For many families in our region, learning to play instrument is not an option without YONA. Knowing this, the impact of Road to Joy cannot be overstated.

It is always a pleasure to see all our YONA sites come together at the end of the year to collaborate and contribute to Road to Joy. We were treated to a traditional performance of "Kahkiyaw Oskâyak" by our violin and flute students from KEC, as well as excerpts from "The Carnival of the Animals" by our hard-working junior flute and double bass students from St. Alphonsus. We also saw performances by our Community and La Bruyère orchestras, which

demonstrated the power of ensemble playing and the flourishing musicianship of our intermediate and advanced students.

ESO musicians proudly joined our YONA students on stage for the evening's final two performances, "The YONA Medley" and "Happy" by Pharrell Williams – an adjective used by students throughout the evening to describe how YONA makes them feel. As this music played, an overwhelming sense of community overtook the hall. The audience clapped along while younger students waiving streamers danced through the aisles. At this moment, everyone understood the value of YONA.

As our students entered the Winspear lobby after the concert, they were met with big hugs and high-fives from their supporters. To celebrate the conclusion of an extraordinary evening and year, the kids were treated to wagon wheels, flowers, and balloons from loved ones before heading home for some well-deserved rest.

YONA's First Post-Secondary Scholarship to be Awarded

Thanks to the generosity of two YONA donors, Phyllis A. Arnold and Maurine Maslen, YONA is getting set to award its first scholarships to students heading into post-secondary studies.

Both ladies share a belief that the value of YONA extends far beyond the musical teachings the students receive.

"As an educator I support any program that helps children, especially from the inner city, further their talents. It was YONA's code of conduct for participants ("the YONA way") that convinced me to support the program," says Arnold.

Maslen, having attended multiple YONA concerts and events, notes the teamwork and inclusion she's witnessed over the years.

"That young adults, who have been part of the YONA program, return to be mentors to give assistance to the present YONA members, clearly indicates to me that YONA is like a family that helps each other. A family helps its members to go out into the world as contributors of society. Higher education may be needed to achieve an individual's aspirations. That takes financing.

I believe that music is the key to the success of these children as they go out into the world. Helping them financially to advance their dreams beyond the YONA program will help them become citizens of the world. I am also certain that each one of the benefactors of the scholarship will pay it forward to assist many others following in their footsteps."

Students were able to apply on the YONA website and alumni were personally invited to apply. To be eligible, students/alumni must have completed at least one year of YONA, intend to pursue a program of study leading to a recognized license, certificate, diploma, undergraduate or professional degree in a program that is at least 9 months long. Applications closed on June 24th and successful recipients will be notified this summer.
