



Cameroon is a middle-income central African country of about 475 440 km² an overall 20 million population. Women represent **51** % of the population







Cameroon – Economic growth 2008 - 2011

Comparatively Slow growth and low investment in health

- Cameroon is one of 25 countries which spend less than 5% of their GDP (ref UA, Minsanté) on health in Africa.
- The health budget account just for 20% in the total health expenditures of the country.
- 80% of the health expenditures of each Cameroonian are still provided by families.
- There is no health insurance system



Health worker crisis

"Cameroon without Doctors by 2009" was the title of an article of the Africa research bulletin in 2006 (volume 43) which highlighted the issue of mass exodus of Medical Practitioners



Medical schools and professional development 8 Schools of Medicine now exist in Cameroon (6 of which are private)



An estimated 6000 students

An estimated 6000 students are enrolled in the various medical schools in the country

Over subscribed medical schools unable to cope with demand


- Of over 1,300 applicants only 85 are admitted to CUSS (oldest and most prestigious)
- CUSS, now the Faculty of • Medicine as Biomedical Sciences (FMSB) – Yaoundé until 2007 was the only medical school
- CUSS is the only Medical School with basic infrastructure for practical training







The Dilemma of the authorities



Government

- The authorities have to balance the reality of shutting down below standard medical training with reality of lack of enough medical institutions
- All medical institutions suffer from underequipped and poorly maintained facilities
- Lack of training on new diagnostic techniques like ECG, Sonography
- Faculties and Medical Council do not have continuous medical education (CME) programme

A study shows only 2 of the 6 private University-level Medical Schools, met "the minimal functioning norms" of a medical school. (MINESUP, 2013)





Basic Problems within the System

- Inadequate training institutions
- Inadequate training staff (capacity)
- Poor infrastructure
- Poor working conditions
